City Council Ups Water Minimum at **Regular Meeting**

The City Council, at its regular meeting Monday night, revised local water rates, upping the minimum from \$2 to \$3 within the city, and without the city, from \$3 to \$4.50 per month.

This charge, which will bring appreciable revenue to the city, was made in order to help defray expenses of expected extensions to the present water and sewer sys-

There was no other change made however, and all rates for more than the minimum three thousand gallons are exactly the same as they were before.

These are: For the next additional seven thousand gallons over the minimum the rate is 35 cents per thousand or fractional part thereof within the city, and 521/2 cents per thousand outside the city's boundaries.

For the next ten thousand gallons, the city rate is 30 cents, that outside the city limits is 45 cents. For all water over 20,000 gallons, the city rate is 25 cents a thousand, while users outside the city pay 371/2 cents for the same amount.

Water connection rates remain at \$25, and this fee constitutes payment in full for furnishing and installing no more than 63 feet of water pipe by the city. Water

Innis, Corpus Christi head of Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, the engineering firm which designed the new harbors at Little Bay and the Cove, Wednesday inspected progress made by the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Co. dredge now working on

the approaches to Little Bay. The dredge, which started about a week and a half ago, is now out Rockport Lions Club; Junior first of Aransas Bay and cutting through the swampy islands south of Frandolig Island, just prior to making the southerly turn that will lead into the sheltered harbor planned to parallel the levee made by the spoil. 





No flower of the Southwest excels these yuccas in spectacular each Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. The beauty, from small ones that top Woman's Auxiliary meets the first mere rosettes of leaves to bells that crown plants towering twice

In full bloom this plant of the arid regions justifies the name given it by early Spanish explorers and settlers - "Our Lord's Candle." Then the flowers are plumy panicles of creamy white dants. and very fragrant blossoms radiant in clear sunlight. But only at night, when they have an ethereal luminescence, are the blooms fully

Yuccas - desert lilies, for they belong to that family - live, flower and reproduce because of a tiny moth. This is a strange relationship and ancient, and for each species of the plant there is a separate and corresponding species of the insect that pollinates the wax-like bells, causing them to bear seeds.

Indians made good use of yuccas they ate the buds, flowers, fruits and young flower stalks, and made a fermented drink from the 7:45 p. m.; Sunday School workers fruit; they made baskets, mats, meeting, Wednesday, 7:00 p.m.; cloth, rope and sandals of the fiber, and soap of the roots.

From some of the thirty or more varieties comes cylindrical sheathing to protect the bases of young trees from gnawing rodents, and the wood of others makes excellent wrap-around splints for surgical uses, since it can be peeled off the trunk in sheets.

It has even been used in manufacturing artificial limbs, and has been experimented with as a possible source for paper pulp.

But such uses should never be encouraged to the point, conservaionists say, of threatening anyone of the many interesting species of yuccas, which contribute so much to the beauty of our southwest.

AN ORDINANCE SETTING


