

### PHASE ONE OF PROPOSED LITTLE BAY PROJECT



PART OF THE \$8 MILLION DOLLARS in construction now going on in the Rockport area is represented by the first phase of the Little Bay project, on which the Loyd Richardson dredge has been working about two weeks. This will eventually consist of an entrance channel, 1800 feet long and 80 feet wide at the bottom, and an inner basin, 125 feet at the bottom, 4 feet deep, and 1340 feet long, with a 4boat launching ramp on the east side. This ramp is reached from the road that will crown the levee separating the basin and Aransas Bay, which is being constructed from the spoil cast out by the dredge.

### Copano Bay Gas **Plant Is Planned**

Bay Petroleum Co. plans to build a natural gas processing plant on Copano Bay near Rockport.

Construction of the stripping plant by the Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. subsidiary is to begin March 15. Awarding of the contract to the O. L. Olsen Co., of Houston was announced Wednes-

The plant will have a capacity to process 50 million cubic feet of gas daily. Daily producton of propane, normal butane, iso-butane, and natural gasoline will approximate 32,800 to 42,000 gal-

All production will be delivered Galveston Bay. A 12-mile, 4-inch the Copano Bay site to Bay's Gulf Coast pipe line.

The new plant will be constructed on a 30-acre tract about eight miles northeast of Rockport and just off State Highway 35.

One home being built is estinated in the \$100,000 plus class. The Aransas County Navigation

District is at work on its fourth harbor, which will cost \$122,668, and will let the contract soon on another, which will cost roughly \$225,000. Another channel in the region is the Cedar Bayou fish pass, being constructed by the Commission, costing \$198,300.

Streets and highways will contribute a considerable chunk to the total, also. The low bid on the Highway 35 business route through Rockport was \$387,000, and this work is due to start as soon as the weather clears up. Streets and sewers in the newly opened Little Bay Shores Unit 2 will add another \$50,000, and seal coating of various highways and farm to market roads within the county will up the total still more, although no figures are available on this work.

The Coastal Transmission Company is building approximately 30 miles of 6-inch pipeline in Aransas County, at an estimated cost of \$360,000, and the Tennessee Gas Transmission, in addition to work on the stripping plant already mentioned, has purchased a right of way paralleling their present line from the Fulton Beach oil field to their main line in Refugio County.



Some Texas cities set their own tax deadlines. These are the cities of more than 5,000 population which have incorporated under the "Home Rule" provisions of our statutes. All other cities are governed by the general laws of Tex-

In towns operating under the general laws property must be rendered for taxes between January 1 and April 1 each year. A number of home rule cities set up the same requirements in their ordinances, while others prescribe different periods.

For state and county tax purposes, property must be rendered to the County Tax Assessor by April 30, and homestead exempions must be claimed by the same

If property is not rendered by the tax payer, it may be placed upon the unrendered tax roll, and the taxing agency places such valuation thereon as it considers fair. Then, if the county or city decides a higher valuation is in order, you will be given an opportunity to appear before a board to explain why the higher figure should not be used in computing your taxes.




