ceed themselves as trustee candidates in the April 4 election. The board, in other action, decided to redeem \$25,000 of bonds offered to them by the First National Bank, making a total of \$65,000 in school bonds that have been retired ahead of time.

The school bond debt now stands at \$465,000 as against \$675,000 on March 1, 1957.

Supt. J. D. Gray told the trustees that the scholastic census just completed showed a rise of 10%, against the 2% that had been expected when the building program was started in 1957, and that another 10% rise could probably be expected next year.

Transportation problems are multiplying, and the new 72 passenger bus ordered for delivery at the beginning of the next school year, to replace a smaller and outmoded bus, will be placed in service on the Lamar run, to take care of the increase in pupils brought about by increased personnel at the radar base.

Two additional teachers will be needed in the coming school year, due to expanding enrollment, Gray told the board, one for senior high school, the other for junior high. Mrs. Katherine McLester, in her report, showed that 96% of all school taxes for this year have been paid.

Have you ever thought about how many telephones you can call right from your own home. Each year a report of the World's Telephones is published by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

You can call 118 million telephones in the world. The surprising thing is that almost 64 million are in the United States, which is about 54%. Of the 64 million telephones in the United States 89.4% are dial operated. No other country in the world comes close to this number of telephones.

There are only fifteen countries in the world that have over one million telephones. The United Kingdom ranks second in the world with only a little over seven million telephones and only 79% of these are dial operated.

A notable addition to the World's Telephone Report this year is the official information about the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic's. Since we like to compare our standard of living to Russia's, I thought you would be interested to know that there are only three and a half million telephones in the entire Republic of Russia and that only 46% are automatic operation.

This all proves that the United States' progress in the field of communication exceeds all other countries of the world.

A PART OF GOOD LIVING

Nowadays, we hear the term "good living" quite often. I have a few ideas about it, but to find out what it means to other people, I brought up the subject with a group of friends a week or so ago.

Before the "ood living" talk was over and the coffee served, one of the women made music for my ears by saying that the telephones in color in her home are certainly an important part of good living.

Everyone seemed to agree, and that gave me a chance to point out that extra telephones in bedrooms and kitchens are low in cost, too — just \$1.00 a month plus installation. For color, you know, there's a one-time charge of \$10.

P. S. I sold a couple, too.

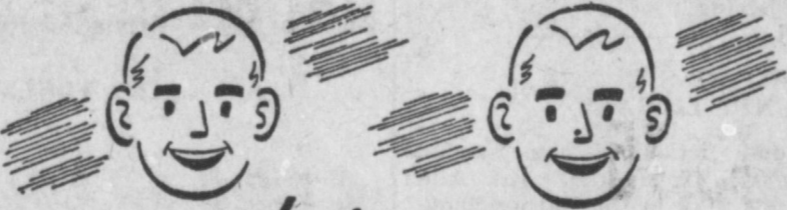

returned to Rockport by Aransas Pass police chief Felix Turnbough, who happened to be in the Alamo City when they were arrested. Arraigned before Justice of the Peace F. Iansen, they were charged with burglary in the night time. Iansen set their bonds at \$1,500 each, and they are being held in the jail's juvenile ward, pending court action.

Next arrivals in the juzgado were Goe Lee Creech and Robert Gerald Stevenson, arrested by Mundine and Deputy Slim Haynes for alleged theft of a camera valued at \$100 and a .32 caliber revolver from a shrimp boat in Conn Brown Harbor.
