\$1.75 per front foot for curbing and gutters, from individual property owners.

For convenience in assessing and for handling tax suits if necessary, the property along the right of way has been blocked off into units.

Unit One includes Church Street between First and Market, where there is a total of 7345 feet to be curbed and guttered, along either side of the new pavement. The footage and assessments of the various property owners in this section are as follows:

The Navigation District, with frontage on the east side of the street, will pay \$1751.75 as its share, and the balance will be split between Leon Carlton, 130 feet, \$227.50, and the Sinclair Refining Company, 228 feet, \$399.58.

Bill for Laboratory At Port Aransas Signed

Improvement of the Institute of Marine Science at Port Aransas and construction of a new \$300,000 laboratory is authorized under SB165 which has been signed by Gov. Daniel.

The enabling legislation is to be effective 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature. The bill was sponsored by Sen. Bruce Reagan and William S. Fly.

Also signed by the governor is Rep. Maurice S. Pipkin's HB340 to authorize the Brownsville Navigation District to employ certified public accountants instead of the county auditor in auditing its books. This bill is effective immediately.

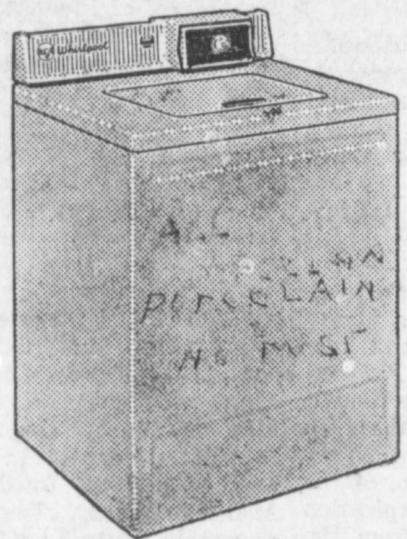

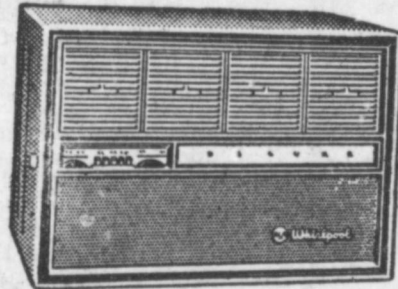



Mrs. Nickerson Reports on PTA District Meeting

Mrs. C. E. Nickerson, president of the Rockport Parent-Teachers' Association, who recently attended the District meeting at Port Lavaca, has been kind enough to furnish the Pilot with a synopsis of the proceedings, for the reading of those P-TA members who could not attend. It is given below:

The Fourth Annual Spring Conference of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers was held April 7, in Port Lavaca, Mrs. Wm. E. Smith, District President, presiding. The conference was welcomed by Mayor John Clegg of Port Lavaca and Mr. Carl S. Chilton, Superintendent, Calhoun County Schools.

A report from the credentials committee showed an attendance of 383 members to the conference. Other committee reports were also heard.

Mrs. Smith, District President, then spoke on the conference theme—namely "Education—Passport to Freedom." She pointed out the great need "within the structure of democracy" . . . that we must learn the discipline of freedom and its entailing responsibility of choosing to do the right thing. Our educational system, she said, if it is to meet present needs of students, must be constantly revised towards the right kind of education that we want our children to have. She further stated that our educational system must be built on scholarship, leadership and service so that each individual child can be able to develop to the utmost limit of his capabilities.

Her speech was followed by assembly singing and a roll call of local units before Mrs. Smith presented the guest speaker, Mrs. T. W. Whaley, First Vice President, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.
