This applies to children entering the first grade, and to children entering the school system by transfers from other schools to any other grade in the Aransas County schools.

The Power and Hewetson contract was due to expire June 11, 1834, and up to the spring of 1832, the empresarios had done little toward accomplishing the fulfillment of the contract; having been prevented from so doing by endless disputes between them, the other empresarios and the Mexican government. On March 22, 1832, the government granted Powers and Hewetson a three-year extension of time in which to perform. Unknown to Power, the extension was later revoked, but James Power started his journey to Ireland in ignorance New York, while awaiting passage to Ireland, he learned that the decree extending the life of the contract had been annulled. Power sailed for Ireland on October 14, 1833. He had handbills printed, advertising for immigrants, and posted them all over Ireland. Power gained about 350 recruits, the bulk of which left Liverpool, England, for Copano Bay in 1833 and 1834. The trip was beset with tragedy, and only eight survived in one shipload. Two of the schooners transporting the colonists were wrecked at the Aransas Bar on May 3, 1834. Although Refugio was in close proximity to the garrisons at Goliad and Lipantitlan, and discretion had to be observed, a committee of safety and correspondence was organized in Refugion Municipality early in 1835. Its members were Martin Power, John Dunn and John Malone. Colonel Power kept in close touch with it.

On September 20, 1835, when Colonel Power was at his home at Live Oak Point, his attention was observation and saw it anchor off Power's Point, and evidences of military debarkation begin. He and his great and trusted friend, Walter Lambert, got into a sailskiff and tacked across the bay to the landing to find out what was transpiring. Here they found the Mexican army of 500 men, together with its supplies, being unloaded. General Cos they found at the old customs house where he and his staff had established themselves. Cos and Powers were well acquainted, and the youthful general hailed the empresario most cordially, no doubt believing him to be loyal and trustworthy. Cos, with his usual abandon, spoke freely of his plans. His army was to march to Bexar and from there to San Felipe de Austin. The general exhibited to Power with much pride a manifesto which he had had printed at Matamoros for distribution in Texas. The document was as follows:

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ARANSAS PASS

Writes Again

Harry Carter, now at sea, has found time to write again, and his charming letter is given below.

Nautical Notes "S.S. Hastings" way off the east coast, bound for Norfolk, Va., just now keeping pace with the S.S. "Pioneer Tide," a smart looking freighter of the U.S. line.

As the white sands of the Virginia coast come into view the ocean changes from deep blue to

Turning to port we now pass between the twin capes, Charles and Henry, take a look at Old Point Comfort and come to anchor in Hampton Roads, with the broad waters of Chesapeake Bay stretching away into the distance. The predominating color here on

ship and plane is battleship grey. The pilot who brought us into the Roads is now going over the side to his waiting launch.

Nattily dressed in dark blue suit, raincoat, homburg hat, yellow gloves, glasses, he looks incongruous on a rope ladder. "Dropping the pilot" says a passenger "there goes Count Bismarck." "Well," remarks another kibitzer, leaning on the deck rail, "He looks too cheerful for Bismarck, but could pass for a Count or for the Chairman of the Board of some bank!"

Here comes a speedboat to take the Captain and the Chief Steward ashore. "We, the people" are gratified to observe that the mail bag is also going with them.

Nothing to do now for a few hours; the engine is silent, there is a siesta atmosphere aboard with a hot and humid air to match. We look for Norfolk and other landmarks and watch the busy air and water traffic.

Out to sea again as the sun begins to dip over Chesapeake Bay. Still in view is the tall hotel at Virginia Beach.

The solemn tone issuing from a nearing bell buoy greets us as the Hastings heads for London, England, some 3450 miles away north-

Fortunately, enough daylight is still with us to enable all on deck

to see a rare and pleasing sight. Coming our way on the scarboard bow is a three-masted schooner loaded with sail. Square rigged forward, scudding along merrily, all canvas bellying out before a north-

As she passes we see the black, white and red national flag of Germany flying aloft.

Probably a training ship on a goodwill tour, now on its way to Hampton Roads. Doubtless by the time she dropped anchor "Darkness was upon the face of the

Twenty years on this trans-atlantic run plus previous marine experience can make a friendly person an entertaining conversationalist. 
