Area shrimp production funneled about \$1,236,840 into the Rockport-Fulton economy in 1958, or about half a million dollars less than in 1957, according to preliminary figures compiled for this survey by C. E. Nickerson, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service statistic-

Finfish for the area amounted to 53,955 pounds, valued at approximately \$10,207, a drop attributable largely to decreased landings of red snapper.

Bait shrimp was estimated by other sources as reaching approximately 120,000 pounds, with a value to the fishremen of around \$25,000, and in addition local shrimp companies paid out contwo communities for work such as shrimp heading, and there were also substantial sums expended for maintenance and repair of the fishing fleet.

32,380,000 of this came from shellfish, and of the shellfish production, 98% was shrimp, for this has become far and away the most

important fishery in the state. Shrimping contributes to the livelihood of greater numbers of Texans than do all other fisheries.

This growth has been particularly noteworthly during the past two decades. The first expansion occurred at the conclusion of World War II, when seafoods began to be a heavily-emphasized component of the civilian diet.

Another stimulus was given when brown shrimp gained in popularity with the consuming public. 

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TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

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Among the many "tall Texans" who lived too courageously ever to be forgotten, and too quietly to make the headlines of history, the name of Cap-tain John York stands out. In 1829 John York came to Toxas with his family, settling near San Felipe de Austin, at the future site of Industry, in what is now Austin County.

First, there was Indian fighting to be done. Then, there was Texas inde-pendence to be won. John York led a company of his neighbors, volunteers, to San Antonio where he joined Ben Milam in the historic seige of Bexar. In 1848, for a sale price of just \$1 cash, his had became the site of Yorktown,

in the newly formed county of DeWitt. But Captain John had only a rew weeks

in which to watch the settlers and their families coming in to build his town, and his dream of the new Texas. Marauding Indians soon threatened little Yorktown, and the Captain's leadership was needed again. He didn't return from the first retaliatory expedition. Captain York was killed on October 11, 1848—a champion of freedom to the lest freedom to the last.

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



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
