Although there is still some doubt as to the number of ducks and geese coming to Texas this year, a liberal hunting season has been authorized.

Duck season opens noon Friday, Nov. 13. Shooting is permitted from sunrise until sunset through Jan. 1. Bag limit is four per day or eight in possession after the first day. Because of the extreme shortage it will be illegal to kill more than one of either red head, canvasback or ruddy duck.

Goose season opens at noon Oct. 26, and runs through Jan. 8. The limit is five geese per day, with a limit of two Canadas, or one speckled belly, or one Canada and one speckled belly.

There will be a 30-day season from Dec. 3 to Jan. 1, on Wilson snipe, with a bag and possession

A \$3 federal duck stamp is required of all persons hunting migratory waterfowl.



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


