

These glass balls are fish net floats, broken loose from the net of some Norwegian or Portuguese across the wide Atlantic, to be deposited on Texas sands.

They are of all sizes, shapes and colors, ranging from a scant ing buoys with a circumference of

Most of them are crude, bubblefilled glass, and of a bluish or milk white or crystal clear. Some are egg-shaped; others are cylinfor fastening to the nets. These fishermen, for obvious reasons,




