## License Law

A new state law which went

The law pertains to the issuance of marriage licenses and is

As to minors applying for lisenses, they must have a parent or legal guardian present to sign consent in person, and if either party is a minor, the application and all other papers must be one file by the county clerk for three full days before the license can be issued.

The minimum ages for getting married without the consent of a parent are 21 for men and 18 for women.

There is one exception to the requirement of a minor's parent or guardian. That is, if he or she is unable to appear because of a notary public or proper official -provided, however, that the consent is accompanied by a doctor's certificate, under oath, that the parent or guardian is physically

#### Rockport Tragedy Hero Honored by Foundation

Pittsburgh - Encarnacion T. Tamez, 34, Rockport fisherman, who received bronze medals from the Carnegie Hero Fund Foundation Friday.

Tamez won the medal for an attempt to save the life of Mrs. Mary M. Bailey, 27, in a swimming accident that took the lives of seven persons—one of them Tamez' 10-year-old daughter, Oralia-at Rockport May 25, 1958.

The chain-reaction drownings began when Mrs. Bailey's 9-yearold daughter stepped into a 12foot underwater hole and screamed for help. Mrs. Bailey attempted to save the girl as did the Rev. Leonard Berry, 40, a Catholic priest. All three drowned.

Tamez swam to the hole and tried to rescue the three, but went under himself. He was pulled from the water and revived. Four other persons, including Oraliz Tamez, followed Tamez to the area and were drowned.

About this time the prospects of the town of Lamar began to The Founding of St. Mary's of look up. Colonel Pryor Lea, who had been a congressman in Tennessee, moved to Goliad after annexation. His purpose in coming to Texas was to promote railroads. He found that a West Texas port was greatly desired, and he believed that the Aransas Bay area was the most logical for such a port. In 1847 he made preliminary surveys for a raliroad connecting Goliad with Lamar. From Goliad the railroad would be extended to San Antonio. He shortly became associated with Captain Byrne and his partners in the projected building of a great western port at Lamar (which was renamed Treport), and the railroad line to Goliad. The fate of this venture will be told later. Captain Byrne then transferred his affections back to his first love and induced a number of his islanders to leave St. Joseph's and move to Lamar or Treport. The most substantial development in the county, during this fugio. After annexation, the town government was re-organized under the congressional charter of February 1, 1842. Captain Isaac W. Johnson became Mayor in 1847, and between frontier services with his ranger company, found time to have the sub-division of the four-league grant into farm tracts begun. The area on both sides of the Mission River, below the town, was surveyed by George Lyon in 1847 or 1848; and the first auction of farm timber lots was held in 1848. 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

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## Fort Ringgold Celebrates 111th Birthday Oct. 26

The old Fort, established by Captain J. J. Lamotte, on October 26, 1848, at Davis Landing, a steamboat stop on the Rio Grande, was named after Major David Ringgold, who died of his wounds at the Battle of Palo Alto, during the Mexican War. Later the post came to be known as Ringgold Barracks.

"We had to hold fire drill every day," Captain Peters said, "and, oddly enough, the water always seemed to fall on the yard or garden that needed it the most desperately. Thus the ladies were saved from tears and the vegetables and grass from dessication, cavalry officer stationed there although it would have been a lot cheaper for the sprinkler system."

One of the most effectivelyplanned military installations in the South, many famous men have served at Ringgold. General Robert E. Lee, then only a colonel, spent some time there between 1856 and 1860, and other officers whose names occupy a place in history were also stationed at the post.

The old fort was landscaped with tree-lined drives and streets; well-kept, massive stucco homes which formerly were officers' quarters and now are occupied by Rio Grande City School faculty members and their families; and vast stretches of green lawns.

In the center is the parade ground, where Starr County residents customarily terminate political rallies and other parades held in Rio Grande City.

On January 23, 1948, the federal government relinquished control of the historic old fort to the Rio Grande City Independent School District, which gave the Federal Works Agency a check for \$205,-889 for the property.

At the time of the transfer, the fort consisted of 46 permanent and 40 temporary structures. These in cluded barracks, hospitals, garages, stables, a veterinary hospital, theater, swimming pool, service club, telephone office, a complete sewer system and other utilities, including electricity, gas and water.

Many of the buildings are being used as classrooms and administrative offices by the school system, while others are being rehabilitated for similar use.

#### MANY LOCAL PEOPLE RECEIVE SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS

More than 395 of Aransas County residents are receiving monthly payments of retirement, disability, and family insurance under provisions of the Social Security Act. H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi District of the Social Security Administration, says that total payments to beneficiaries in this county will exceed \$266,172 this year.

The social security insurance provides financial protection for a worker and his family when earnings are reduced or cut off in older years, disability, or death.

The payments are all based on a worker's average monthly earnings for work on social security jobs, Cleveland pointed out. Payments to a retired worker with no dependents average about \$67.50 a month; for a retired couple, the average is around \$119.40 a month. The monthy average for a widow with two young children is \$165.00. Maximum payments to a family can go as high as \$254.00 a month.

For the entire State of Texas. a monthly amount in excess of \$26,093,144 goes to some 488,026 beneficiaries. Social security benefits totaling \$283,466,000 were paid to Texans in 1958.

Cleveland says that in this area, eligible persons should get in touch with the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water Street, Corpus Christi, to file their applications for benefits.




