Biologists Give Reason For Oyster Closure

In a prepared statement, biologists of the Texas Game and Fish Commission have stated their reasons for closure of oyster reefs in Aransas Bay. The commission's

"This action was taken by the commission because of a depletion of the number of market size oysters on the Aransas Bay reefs. The decline of these oysters can be attributed to several causes. A delivery at any office in the area heavy summer die off of the larger oysters occurred in the area. This die off is believed to be caused said, "proved the mail pattern to by a fungus parasite which is associated with similar oyster mortalities in Louisiana and some of the Atlantic states. This parasite is prevalent throughout Aransas Bay. The reefs in Aransas Bay were heavily worked last season by oyster fishermen and this in association with the high summer kill has limited the number of available market size oysters in Aransas Bay.

"While Half Moon Reef last year had an oyster population of which 25.7% was of marketable size, this year the market size oysters constitute only 1.2%. Jay Bird Reef has similarly dropped from 15.8% last year to 1% at present. Paul's Mott dropped from 33.4% to 3.0%. This is the general pattern for the majority of the reefs. These reefs now contain 30% to 50% empty shells of recently killed oysters.

"In spite of the depletion of the market size oysters a very successful spawn of young oysters occurred during the late spring months. These younger oysters can replenish the reefs and be of market size next fall under favorable conditions.
