

While many new people were coming to St. Mary's and other parts of the county to make their homes, there were at least three prominent citizens who felt that they could no longer live in a land ruled by the dam-yankees. 

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH ISSUES HEATER WARNING

The Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare has issued the following warning against a small gas burning butane heater for trailers which the Michigan Department of Health has reported as exceedingly dangerous. The heater in question has apparently caused deaths of eight people in three separate incidents in recent weeks, and the department is afraid that with the advent of the hunting season, deaths from such heaters may be expected to increase.

The department says: "The brand name is 'Thurmheater.' It is a wall panel unit, 8,000 BTU capacity usually labeled 8M or 8MNS with 13x19 inch opening and using bottled gas. There are some 2,000 of these heaters in use and they are installed in 82 makes of travel trailers, which are from 10 to 18 feet long and normally used by campers and hunters.

Subsequently manufacturer and trailer dealers sought to modify all heaters by altering orifice plate and firebox but our understanding is that not all trailers have been located. Moreover, evidence from manufacturer is that it is not always possible to tell from label whether or not heater has been modified.

"Manufacturer also says that model number is not always obvious. Suggest, therefore, that your warning be aimed at owners of trailers of 10 to 18 foot length with a bottled gas heater having an opening of about 13 inches by 19 inches. Heater may be labeled with decal specifying thurm, or Elkhart, Indiana, but also may not have label."

"Most employers require a new worker to show his social security card when he makes an application for employment, or at least before he is paid the first time."

All employers are required to remit social security taxes and make wage reports for their employees as provided by the Social Security Act, Cleveland explained. The law applies to part-time and temporary workers and to regular workers too.

It is from the wage reports of employers that each worker builds the right to retirement, disability, and family insurance. Eligibility for the social security benefits is based on the record of each worker's earnings.

Original account numbers, and duplicates for those who have lost their card or changed their name, are issued by the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water Street, Corpus Christi. Application forms may be secured from that office or from your post office. You may apply for a social security number in person or by






