

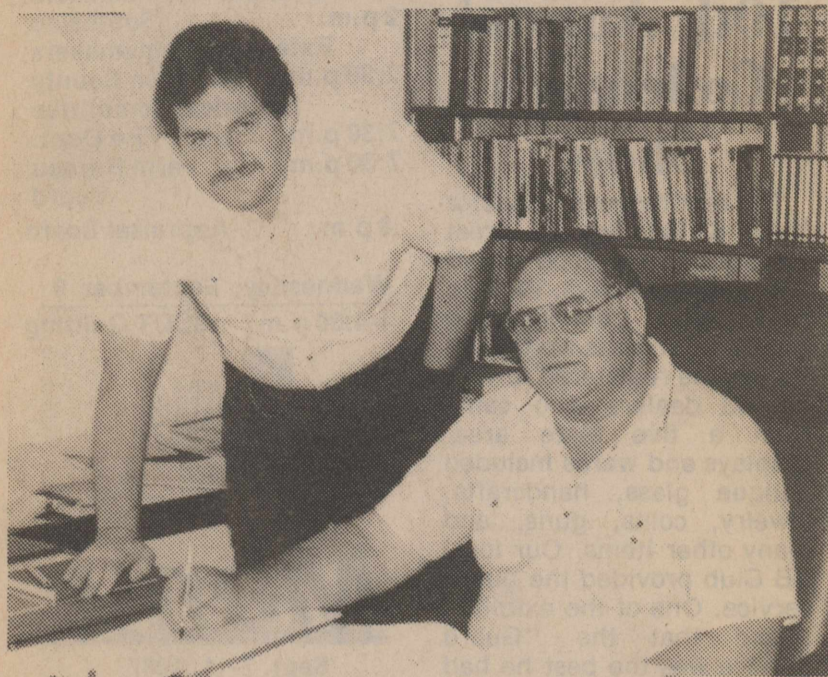

First Baptist Church Celebrates 85th Anniversary

Sunday, Aug. 23, 1987 was "a great day" for First Baptist Church of Stratford, Texas. The Lord smiled on it by sending a lovely windless, cloudy, cool day for the occasion so that the church and guests could comfortably rejoice and enjoy celebrating the 85th anniversary of the organization of First Baptist Church.

Rev. Derrel Lewis, the pastor of F.B.C. began the day by "feeding the Lord's sheep" at Coldwater Manor on the Word".

Registration at the church building of all attending the celebration began at 9 a.m. The people were greeted by deacons and wives throughout the day.

Everyone present at 9:45 a.m. were invited to attend Sunday School. The morning Worship service was introduced by a Prelude by

organist Mollie Griffin and pianist Mike O'Brien. The call to worship "Victory in Jesus" was rendered by the choir directed by minister of music, Dan Street. Throughout the opening exercises he led the congregation in singing "Faith is the Victory", "A Mighty Fortress is our God" and "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

"I Saw the Lord" a solo by Neil Harris was a fitting introduction to the Pastor's Rev. Lewis, message entitled "Give Me This Mountain" based on Scripture reading Numbers 13:30-14:10,30 and Joshua 14:7-14. In the message the Pastor commended F.B.C. founding fathers on their consecrated fellowship and dependence on the Lord for the ability to scale the "mountains of problems" encountered dur-

ing the past 85 years and on the Lord-directed leadership to bring First Baptist Church successfully to this good day. "Praise the Lord" sung by all closed the worship hour after the benediction by Wm G. Hart.

Everyone was invited into the fellowship hall where they feasted on visiting and delicious food. People were seated at tables that accommodated six for the sake of better communication. Said tables were placed throughout the building and under the tent covering the patio area. Visiting at tables and in especially arranged conversation areas continued until 2:30 p.m.

The afternoon program was introduced by a prelude by Organist Molly Griffin. Music Director, Dan Street again led the congregation in singing a medley of old songs; "Shall We gather at the River", "Rock of Ages", "On Jordan's Stormy Bank; "When The Roll Is Called" "When the Saints Go Marching In" "That Old Time Religion". The theme for the program was "The Vision" based on the Scriptures, "Where there is no vision, the People perish." Prov. 29:18.

The program itself was a continuous account of the growth and development of First Baptist Church of Stratford from a church composed of twenty-eight charter members in 1902 to a church body of over 500 members in 1987. DIAMOND SHAMROCK BUILDS HYDRO CRACKER JOBS AVAILABLE

M. W. Kellogg Construction, Inc. and KCI Construction, Inc. have been chosen by Diamond Shamrock Refinery and Marketing Co. to build a 20,000 barrel per stream day Hydro Cracker at it's 95,000 barrel a day McKee refinery near Dumas Texas. Kellogg a unit of The Henley Group, Inc. will supervise all direct hire labor and related sub-contracts, and will handle a portion of the procurement. The new unit includes: 2-500 ton reactors which will be lifted into place in the spring of 1988, 2 modular furnaces, 2 large reciprocating compressors, all associated and piping and equipment.

The first field staff will be mobilized and foundation work will begin in September. Field forces are scheduled to peak at approximately 300 in early 1988, with completion scheduled in the summer of that year. M. W. Kellogg, one of the world's largest engineering contractors and KCI are both head-quartered in Houston. Applications will be available at the Texas Employment Commission in Dumas Texas on Monday, August 31st.

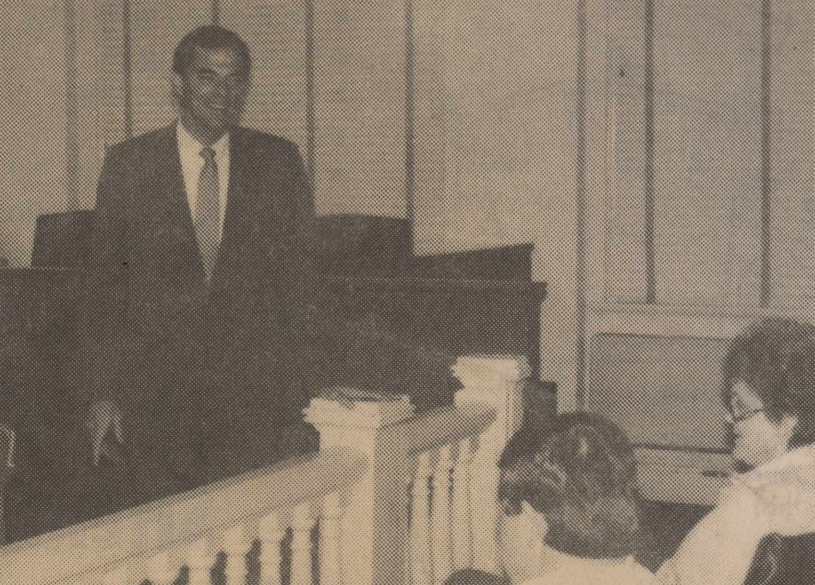

"This Is The Way"

In this time of momentous and bewildering events, we are eager to learn the facts behind the headlines. Even though we cannot see the point of exit from our confusion, we crave to know whether we are on the right road.

Some twenty-seven hundred years ago the prophet Isaiah was concerned for his nation. Israel was threatened by Assyria. In her peril she sought alliance with Egypt. The nations were trying the old but fresh policy of balance of power. Isaiah pointed out the danger of such a program. He called on the people to seek divine guidance. In Isaiah 30:21 "...This is the Way, walk ye in it."

How can you and I personally know when we are going his way?

1. We must start with a surrendered will. God does not leave us in the dark as to what His will is. In prophecy and gospel God revealed his terms. He does not bargain with sinful men. In the parable of the prodigal son, the father sent no emissary to the boy to promise different conditions if he would return. The boy said, "I will rise and go to my father and will way unto him, 'Father, I have sinned!' 'The wayward son surrendered his stubborn will unconditionally. There is a difference between unconditional surrender to God and the mere acknowledgment of defeat; to admit that it is impossible to fight against God, for He is too strong for me. It is quite another to come to ourselves and say, 'Why have I been resisting my Father's love? I gladly surrender my will to His, for He is the God and Father revealed by our Lord Jesus Christ and I can trust His terms.'"

2. The second condition made clear in Scripture is that Jesus said, "Come unto me....Take my yoke upon you, and LEARN OF ME." More next week on "learn of me."
