The Stratford Independent Schoolboard met in Regular Session on December 11. 1987 at 7:00 a.m. The Board approved the minutes of the previous meeting and approved expenditures for the

Mrs. Lugenia Carter, High School English Teacher, met with the Board to present several new ideas that she had learned from a three day Writing Seminar that she had attended at Amarillo Service Center. This seminar was presented by Texas A&M University.

Chris McAdams, Special **Education Teacher at Mary** Allen Elementary, met with the Board to discuss a Special Education Seminar that she attended last month. She gave a very informative report in the various areas of Education.

Long Weekend **Coming Up**

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Unlike last New Year's holiday, this New Year holiday period will make for a long weekend for many Texas motorists. The additional highway traffic and the traditional New Year celebrations could lead to tragedy for some Texas motorist."

Major Cawthon said, "All available Department of Public Safety Troopers will be on patrol throughout the holiday period in an effort to prevent traffic accidents and fatalitites. The troopers will be watching for traffic violators, especially the drunk drivers, which is the leading cause of traffic fatalities in the State of Texas. Department of Public Safety Troopers will also be available to assist motorists with any problems they might have."

Major Cawthon stated, "If the campaign to reduce fatalities is to be successful, then motorists must do their part." He suggested that adequate travel time be budgeted in holiday plans, stop frequently and rest, reduce speed for road conditions and drive defensively, always watching out for the other driver's mistakes, buckle up and don't drink and drive.



Waterfield Announces **Re-Election Plans**



State Rep. Dick Waterfield R-Canadian, stating that his work in the Legislature is just beginning, filed this week for reelection to the House of Representatives.

"I look forward to serve the people of my district with another term of responsible representation in Austin," Waterfield said. means that my open door policy will continue as always, for anyone who has a question or problem. For me, the calls and letters we have received are the most rewarding thing about the office. I encourage people to continue to stay in contact."

In looking ahead to the 71st Legislature, Waterfield expects a continuation of the most debated issue of this session: taxes and state spending.

'What we saw this year on taxes was only the beginning," he said. "We have the select committee on tax equity currently meeting around the state to develop tax reform policy. This could set the stage for a major debate over our present taxing structure. On the spending side, the Edgewood suit, which if it goes against the state, would drastically change our current system of funding public education."

With this in mind, Waterfield believes the dominant theme of the past session, setting spending priorities and generating sufficient revenue, will again be a major point of debate next session. Through all of this, his legislative goals have not changed, he said.

"the priorities of the people of my district remain my priorities in the Legislature, 'Waterfield said. ''When they want a lid placed on taxes and government spending, that's what I fight

Waterfield serves on the House committees on Agriculture and Human Services. He was recently appointed to chair the special committee to investigate security interest in farm products.

He was voted the top first-term Republican of the 70th Legislature and was named one of the top conservative legislators by the Young Conservatives of Texas, and the Free Market Coalition.
