- 1 qt tomato juice.
- 1 qt. carrote. 1 qt. beets.
- 1 qt.okra.
- qt. English peas.
- pt. greens. 1 pt. kraut.
- 1 qt. plums.
- 1 qt. peaches.
- 1 qt. pears. 1 qt berries.
- 1 qt. pickled watermelon rinds.
- 1 pt. pepper relish. 1 pt green tomato relish.
- pt. other relish.
- 1 qt. pickled beets.

1 qt. brined cucumber pickles.

All entries must be in by 5 o'clock October 23. The following are standards on scoring that will be used in judging the products:

General - all containers should have a good seal and should be attractive. Jars should be filled within one fourth inch from the top and the lable should be placed one fourth inch from the bottom of the jar. The contents of the jar should not be crowded enough to destroy the texture or shape of the products so that the product would not be attractive for serving. There should be a full pack. The liquid in the jar should come over the product. Fancy pack will not be considered for judging.

Plums - Shape held, skin unbroken, good even color, graded for size, syrup clear.

Peaches - Pack halves in overapping layers. The concave surface, of each half should be downward. Color should be good for type of peach. Even ripeness, uniform size, shape held, syrup clear.

Tomato Juice - A rich red color with not more than one inch seperation per pint or one and a half inch seperation per quart.

Canned Tomatoes - Even, rich red color, packed in their own juice with only a few seed visible. Greens - Good, even color, stems









