#### **County Agent's News** Letter

#### COMPLIANCE POSSIBILITIES

Grain sorghum either left on the ground or plowed under is a soil conserving crop. Due to the complexities of the sorghum, the farmers of Kent County ere urged to follow the instructions mailed to them in regard measuring their land and to discuss their compliance possibilities with the local Couty Agent.

A number of farmers have expressed the opinion that they could not comply because they had not planted the sudan and peas as shown on their work sheets. Yet these farmers had sufficient acreage planted to grain sorghum which they were not intending to harvest. These farmers were in compliance and did not know it. Others have left idle a number of acres with the intention of planting to peas and sudan, but were unable to do so on account of the drought. If the farmer will terrace this idle land prior to November 1st., this land will qualify as soil Saturday, October 3rd. conserving acres. SHORT EXPLANATION OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

#### S. J. R. No. 3-A

The first proposed Constitutional Amendment to face the voter on November 3rd is S. J. R. No. v-A. which provides for a State dispensary system to have exclusive sale of distilled liquors and all profits from sale of such liquars would go to the State. The sale of spirituous distilled liquors for private profit, as is now the case, is prohibited with in this State, by this Amendment, except when such sale is made to the State, according to B. P. Matocha The body was found by George Secretary of State. The difference between the proposed plan and that now in effect would simply be lone of ownership - i.e. by the State rather than the individual.

The State would maintain various places of business for the purpose of the sale of such liquor direct to the consumer. > would not be changed by adoption of the amendment. The sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol which has been legalized in such political sub-divisions shall not be prohibited by this section.

This Amendment further provides that the open saloon shall not be re-established.

#### S. J. R. No. 18

Proposal No. 2 offecting a change in the State Constitution is S. J. R. No. 18 providing that the Legislature shall have the right to levy taxen to provide a Retiremene Fund for school teachers and persons employed in public school colleges and universities, supported wholly or Fully by the State. According to the interpretation Secretary of State, B. P. Matocha it is provided that the State shall contribute to such Retirement Fund an amount equal to that paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person. It is a atching plan. Each person so employed in such State schools, colleges and universities will likely be required to set aside so much of their salary and the State will set aside a like amount This Amendment further provides that the amount contributed to such Retirement Fund by the State shall not exceed at any time five per cent of the compensation paid to each such person by the State or school district, and shall not be more than One Hundren Eighty Dollars for any one person in one year. No person shall be eligible for s penson under this Amendment who has ot taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but those who retire before they have taught for a period of twenty years in this State and who have been contributing to the Retirement Fund shall be entitl-Last Friday night a number of ed to a refund of the moneys paid All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State, for such Retirement Fund, as State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States Government. Persons who are the recipients of pensions from such Retirement Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State.


