CONTINUED RAINS SOAK INTO THE GROUND WITH LIBERAL SUPPLIES OF RESERVE MOISTURE

Beginning Monday night, after one of the prettiest Fall days we have enjoyed in this country in many years, a slow, gentle, steady rain fell in the trade territory of our town. The rain, continuing until Wednesday noon, added tons of water to the already good season in the ground.

From all indications, this last rain will sink into the underground soil as reserve moisture and adds greatly to the possibilities of next season's crop prospects.

Farmers who have their land up already, will benefit most of all, but all will be benefitted to a great extent as it is the moisture that is deep in the ground which carries this territory through the hot, dry summer months.

The great area of pasture lands in this country will also be benefitted many thousands of dollars worth, as the weed crop is growing and cattle are thriving on it. Wild rye is also growing good and with a continuation of the warm, damp days, pastures will soon be the best we have had for many winters.

The hundreds of acres of wheatlands are turning velvety green under the gentle rains and prospects are fine for the best wheat year in the history of this county.

Old Age Assistance News from Austin

Austin, Nov. 20.—The Texas Old Age Assistance Commission is starting an autograph collection which will eventually contain more than 88,000 signatures, acting director Orville S. Carpenter said today.

Washington officials told Carpenter that the federal government wanted the Texas commission to have a signature card upon each assistance recipient. The purpose of the collection is to have for the federal authorities a method of checking endorsements written on the back of pension warrants when cashed, and to assist them in verifying the eligibility of each person. However, the cards will be kept in file by the Texas commission.

It was estimated by the statistical division of the commission that this new requirement would necessitate approximately 30,000 extra hours of labor by investigators in addition to the work being done re-investigating recipients and investigating new applications.

People now upon the assistance rolls will be brought cards to sign during the next sixty days, Carpenter stated. He stressed the fact that even present recipients eligible under the "necessitous circumstances" requirement of the new law would be asked to sign cards.

NOT A "PAUPER'S LAW"

The new pension law is not a pauper's law nor can it be so construed as to mean that an applicant must take a pauper's oath to receive aid, declared Orville S. Carpenter, acting director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission.

"The entire criteria of eligibility is 'need' and there is no legal formality whereby an aged person must embarrass himself by declaring to the world that he is a pauper. Such a method of administration would be wrong and unfair," the Director said.

"Our workers have been instructed to be courteous. Each of our investigators knows that immediate discharge will result if he is discourteous or harsh in his dealings with the aged of his county.

"Investigations by the employees of this commission will be conducted in a dignified and quiet manner. If we find an old person in necessitous circumstances, we will see that he receives help from the State, provided, of course, he meets constitutional requirements. The fact that he will be given a pension is his own affair," Carpenter added.

H. D. Agents Report

Mrs. O. C. Lowrance of Jayton has canned a beef recently to supplement cured and fresh meats when these are not available.

Other than chili, sausage, and stew, she used tender cuts for plain roast. The pieces were cut just large enough to fit in the cans after the shrinkage of precooking. These are placed in the can so the muscle fibres will run lengthwise the piece of meat.

Butchering should be done when the weather is so cold the dressed meat will become thoroughly chilled over night.

Leafy Vegetables Provided For Year's Food Supply

The food budget for a family of four calls for 120 containers of green, leafy vegetables. Some of these are more accessible for canning in the fall and winter months.
