We planted twenty crocus not long ago: I can't help but won-der if this rain will bring them There were large buds on the bulbs when we set them inthe soil. We have put out twenty Daffodils in the last few weeks too, but what we really need is some sunshine so we can finish our flower beds.

Bulbs may have shorter stems when planted late, but if you haven't planted any, and are still eager to do so, the bulbs may still have flowers for this spring. We should not have any premature blooming of bulbs this year due to so many hours of hard freezing weather.






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
