OKLAHOMA - TEXAS COTTON MARKET REVIEW

Trading in spot cotton showed some increase in Oklahoma and Texas last week compared with the previous week, according to the Production and Marketing Adm tion, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sales at the 10 spot markets reflected this increase with 414,000 during the same week lost year. Sales at Dallas alone counted for 108,593 of the 414,000 bales sold at the 10 spot markets.

a narrow range of about 5 points between Monday and Thursday. Markets were closed Friday for Armisthe Day. Thurs lay's quotations on Middling 15-16 inch offerings ranged from 29.10 cents per pound at Dallas to 29.30 at Galveston.

Last year on the same day cotton ranged from 30.95 to 31 cents per pound at Dallas, Houston and Galveston, or \$8.50 to \$9.25 per bale higher than this year.

Domestic and export demand for spot cotton continued to be very good last week. Best demand was mostly for the better grades and staples.

Cottonseed prices averaged slightly higher in Texas but slightly lower in Oklahoma last week. Texas farmers received an average price of \$43.80 per ton at the gin and Oklahoma farmers \$44.80.

New Highway Sign

AUSTIN. Nov. 21-A few months ago a new type of highway sign, an advisory speed sign designed to aid ir. traffic safety, made its appearance on Texas main highways. This was part of the Texas Highway Department's program of informing motorists of the maximum safe and comfortable speed on curves and turns New Radio Station which are not considered safe to travel at speeds above 50 miles per hour. It is a sim with a yellow background and black numerals and letters and is placed below curve signs.

The speed indicated on the sign is not the maximum at which a turn may be taken, but is the maximum at which the ave. age car can make the turn without an uncomfortable side-throw of its passengers and still stay on its side of the road.

The Governor's Highway Safety Hereford. Conference held last spring recommended that the Texas Department institute a program of speed zoning and marking curves with safe spends. and these signs are a result of that recommendation.

Watch That Cold It Can Be Dangerous

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer declares there's hardly anyon who hasn't caught a cold at one time or another. The common cold is comnon indeed! Besides making you feel miserable, colds steal your time and your money. They fool you, too. ecause the early signs are often the some as those of more serious it resses. And long-continued colds may pave the way for an attack of neumonia, tuberculosis, or a cronic refection of the nose, throat, ears, or sinuses.
