

The city council has set Monday, December 15th, as date of the election and if approval is given by the majority of the vo-ters, starting April 1, 1970, a 1 per cent sales tax will be cola four-room stucco house was lected along with the present 3-1/4 cent levy now being collected by the state.

Conservative estimates are that the city will receive from \$30,000 to \$40,000 annually from the tax which is already being collected by a number of cities in the state and many both large and small, in this area.

The election will be held at the City Hall Annex. Polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at :00 p. m. Eldon Anderson will serve as election judge and Fred Boon, alternate,

Every registered voter, who resides within the city limits, is eligible to vote, and a simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.

As a growing city, Haskell needs substantially increased revenues for improving and strengthening services, and to finance much needed capital improvements. Present methods of financing and complete dependence on the ad valorem property tax for revenues are insufficient to provide for pres-

ent needs and future growth.

Additional revenue is needed to hire more policemen; street lighting must be increased: street maintenance must be accelerated; pensions for firemen must be properly financed; vital city departments must be better improvements must be made on a planned basis.

Funds obtained from the sales tax could solve the needs pointed out above and bring about numerous improvements.



People who complain that inflation has not been curbed fast enough and demand more radical measures, such as wage and price controls, may tend to forget that for most of the time since the great depression of the 30's, when we were encouraged to believe that federal deficit spending was a good thing, the government has rarely "balanced its books."

For more than 30 years, except for short intervals, promoting inflation has been a policy of government. Reversing this policy will be difficult...even if the hardships it entails are accepted. The real question is not whether inflation can be controlled, but whether the people will want to give up the illusion of the joyous ride that it has created.
