Haskell Voters To Have Say On City Sales Tax Dec. 15

House Destroyed; One Man Injured From Explosion

Citizens of Haskell will be given the opportunity of deciding whether or not they want to adopt a sales tax to be used in helping to finance city operations.

The city council has set Monday, December 15th, as date of the election and if approval is given by the majority of the voters, starting April 1, 1970, a 1 per cent sales tax will be collected along with the present 3-1/4 cent levy now being collected by the state.

Conservative estimates are that the city will receive from \$30,000 to \$40,000 annually from the tax which is already being collected by a number of cities in the state and many both large and small, in this area.

The election will be held at the City Hall Annex. Polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 7:00 p. m. Eldon Anderson will serve as election judge and Fred Boon, alternate.

Every registered voter, who resides within the city limits, is eligible to vote, and a simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.

As a growing city, Haskell needs substantially increased revenues for improving and strengthening services, and to finance much needed capital improvements. Present methods of financing and complete dependence on the ad valorem property tax for revenues are insufficient to provide for present needs and future growth.

Additional revenue is needed to hire more policemen; street lighting must be increased; street maintenance must be accelerated; pensions for firemen must be properly financed; vital city departments must be better manned and equipped; capital improvements must be made on a planned basis.

Funds obtained from the sales tax could solve the needs pointed out above and bring about numerous improvements.

Contract Let On New Highway Dept. Building

On November 25th, the Texas Highway Commission awarded a contract for the construction of a maintenance building and warehouse at Haskell, to Gabeart Construction Company, Abilene, according to A. L. McKee, of Abilene, Texas Highway Department Maintenance Engineer.

Gabeart Construction Company submitted the low bid of \$104,987.00.

McKee said that construction on the 236x85 ft. modern concrete block masonry building, to be located on a 10-acre site one-fourth mile west of the city limits on the south side of Highway 24, will get underway prior to January 1.

McKee said that the building will be modern in every respect and will include offices, equipment and storage sheds, with ample space on the 10-acre plot.

Ray Lusk is the local maintenance foreman.

Rainfall For 1969 Is Well Above Normal

Normal rainfall for November is 1.33; however only .88 of an inch was gauged during the month.

Normal rainfall to date is 21.87, but Weatherman Sam's figures reveal that a whopping 32.76 inches has been gauged here through November, 1969.

Here is how the rains came during November: Nov. 2, .51; Nov. 3, .06; Nov. 10, .02; Nov. 27, .29. Total .88 of an inch.

A low of 27 degrees was registered on November 28. Highs of 83 were registered on November 8th and 11th.

The never-say-die fighting Haskell Indians saw a 27-14 half-time lead melt away in the third quarter as they lost a 28-27 heartbreaker to Reagan County in the Class AA Regional tilt at San Angelo last Friday night.

The Indians, who at one point led 27-7, started the game as if they were going to pick the feathers of the Owls clean. Fleetefted Charles Franklin returned the kick-off 62 yards to set up the first Indian score.

Franklin raced into the promised land from 20 yards out to cap the drive and Haskell took a 6-0 lead with only three minutes elapsed in the first quarter. The try for the extra point fizzled.

Two minutes later, following a pass interception, Haskell scored again and "Little Charlie" raced 20 yards.

The Owls finally got on the scoreboard in the action-packed first period when all-state candidate "Bad News" Barnes leaped over the line of scrimmage from the three-yard line to score Reagan County's first TD. Barnes kicked the extra point.

Reagan County narrowed the gap 27-14 just before halftime when "Bad News" Barnes leaped four yards for the tally. Nunnally kicked the extra point.

The Owls came storming back in the second half and exploded for 14 points in the third period.

The food you brought here, and in Rule, the flowers you sent, the phone calls and cards, the expressions of sympathy, the many fine tributes you paid our little daddy, Lennis Jones, and the giving up a part of your Thanksgiving day with your families to attend the services in Rule meant more to Mother and us

than we can ever tell you. The front page of the Free Press was almost ready to go to Press when we learned that Daddy had gone, and Mr. Hinds rearranged it to put Daddy's obituary on the front page. The ladies of Paint Creek Methodist Church and the Order of the Eastern Star sent enough food so that I was able to have a meal for all our family. Brother Rodney Dowdy came all the way from Meadow and brought us the most comforting and beautiful funeral service.

We have known all our lives what a wonderful man our Daddy was, but it is so good for every day's mail to bring letters and cards telling us of some of the many good things he did for people, and to know that so many others feel as we do about him. Especially do we appreciate the many living memorials that have been given in his name. The L.V. Scout program has been enriched by many generous donations, the building fund of the Rule Baptist Church, the Methodist Children's Home in Waco, and the Mission program of the Methodist Church have all benefited from your donations in Daddy's name. Our mother, my sister, Mrs. McBeath, my brother, Lennis, Jr. and I, and our families as well as Daddy's brothers and sisters, thank you! Our Gene Overton family want to thank the Red Cross and Mrs. Buster Shelton for getting the word to Mike and Linda that they had lost Pawpaw.

One of the strangest things happened to us last week. I went to Rule Wednesday afternoon early so I could be there when Mother brought Daddy home, and Gene and Waller were to come as soon as they could. Just before they left they heard a plane in trouble circling the house. Finally, it landed in the wheat field just north of our house, missing all the terraces that might have caused it to turn over, and taxing about 20 feet before stopping. The pilot was Lynn Burks from Houston. He had been to Denver to buy this plane for his boss, and was flying back to Houston when it when he ran out of gas short of the Stamford Airport. He knew he was close to Stamford but the ceiling was so low, he couldn't tell where he was. He flew down close enough to see the green field, and landed. He was pretty shaken and panicky when he got out. Waller went to the airport for gas, and Gene pulled the plane into the yard with the tractor. They put on a pan of chili for him, showed him the house so he could find the TV and a bed and they had to leave for Rule.

He told us later there was a standing joke among pilots about having to land in a farmer's field, and he would come out with a gun to run them off. This was the first time he had ever had to land a plane in trouble, and he couldn't believe there were people who trusted other people like Gene did him. He thought he should sleep in the plane because there was \$8000 worth of radio equipment in it, but Waller assured him nobody would bother it. This amazed him, but what really floored him was that while he was sitting at the table eating his supper, neighbors began bringing in all this luscious food for us to have while we had extra company for Daddy's funeral. Nothing like this ever happened in Houston he said, or in California where he was reared.

The next morning the wind was blowing, but he was able to taxi out of the yard and take off from the gravel road to the

highway. We all held our breath until he was airborne. He assured us he would come back some day to see us, and I'll bet he does. We haven't heard if he arrived in Houston in time for the Thanksgiving dinner his company was having that afternoon.

If that ever happens to Mike, I hope there is some friendly South Vietnamese family who help him get himself and his plane back to Saigon.

Cotton Classing Report

Harvest was slowed by damp weather and only 3002 samples were classed at the Munday Classing office which is operated by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service.

According to A. D. Peebles the predominant grade was 42 accounting for 47 percent of the weeks classing. Other grades were as follows: 32, 10 percent; 52, 11 percent. White grades accounted for 19 percent of the

weeks classing.

Staple lengths ran 19 percent 28 and shorter, 38 percent 29, 15 percent 30, 5 percent 31, and 20 percent 32 and longer.

Micronaire readings remain good with 89 percent in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Pressley strength results on cotton tested has been 100 percent above the 70,000 pounds per square inch level.

Only a small amount of cotton has moved into trade channels to date but reported offerings range from 250 to 350 points over loan rates.

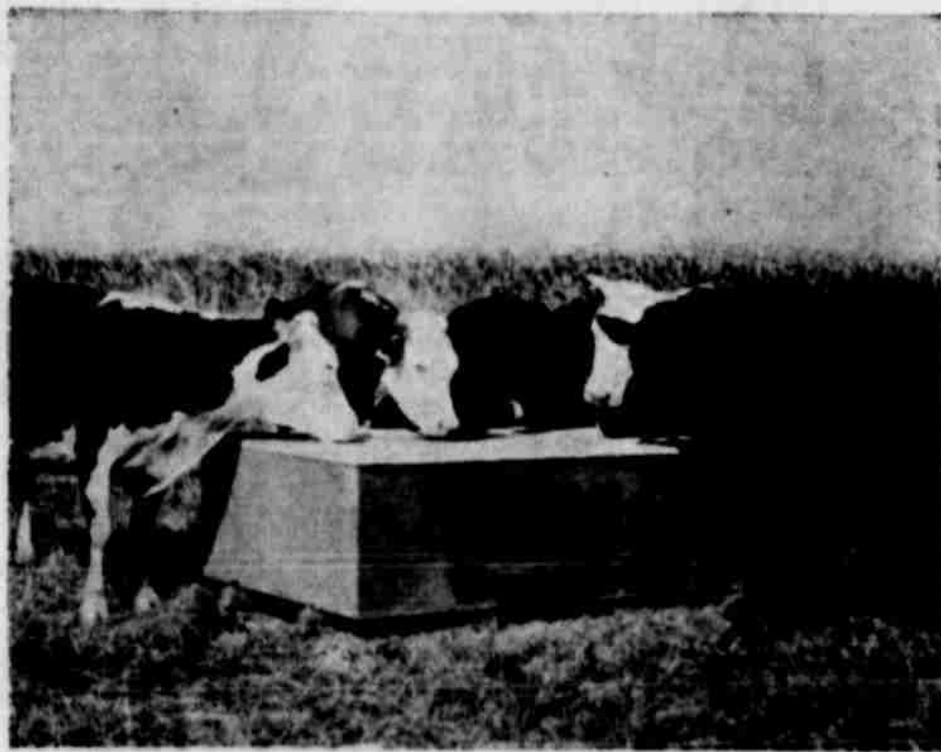
