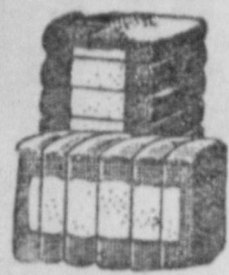

A little over two years ago on April morning, we made the decision to buy the Jayton Chronicle and move to Jayton. It was not an easy decision to make, but after a family council, we decided to do it.

It required a tremendous effort, that of completely picking up a printing plant and moving it across the country. It also required adding to the size of the building to hold the machinery after combining two plants. More than this it meant taking on new responsibilities. The town was dead, and there was nothing that anyone could do to bring it alive except ship out all the old soresheads, and that would be a terrific job. He said the town was gone. That during the oil boom instead of building, like it should, they got so greedy they drove everything off. And when on top of this they got in a fight with the rest of the county and lost all of that business. Just a dead little town and getting deadier.

Then, on top of this, even the merchants would ask, "How come you to decide to move to Jayton, anyway?"

And, to further add to the discouraging situation, a soon as we hit town, people began to tell us about the big community battles and the like.

But in it all, we never really became discouraged, as any one knows that reads this column. You know, you have to have at least a few brains to be able to worry; and we have never been accused of that.

To be honest, our first aim has been to make money with which to feed our family. But we have tried to put out a readable paper. One that the people would look forward to getting. This is vital with any newspaper. First, if you do your advertisers any good, you must have readers. Secondly, if you expect to have any effect on public opinion, you must have readers.

We would be the first to admit that we have not put out a paper that would win any big press awards. In fact, we have not been trying to impress other newspaper people. The other newspapers do not help very much with the expense of this paper, so we feel no obligation to try to put out a paper that will please them.

Socony Mobil Oil Co. Inc. has announced plans to re-enter a 6955 foot dry hole in this county, the No. 1 B. W. I. Branch and clean out to 4000 to test the Noodle Creek. Location is four miles north of the Rough Draw (Noodle Creek) field of Northwest Fisher County, 11 miles north west of Rotan and 656 feet from the north and west lines of Section 334 Block 2 in the H&TC survey.

A person goes to school for many years, and works and studies and hangs on, and finally he sees his dream materialize, and he graduates out of school, and they call that a commencement. That is the situation in Jayton. We have reached the place to where the community can begin to grow. Certainly, we can see the fruits of progress -- we have some good solid, down to earth growth, things that are the back bone of a community, and we are all proud of them. But if this is the end of growth, then the end of progress, growth, this is the end of progress, growth, then we have accomplished nothing -- nothing at all. These three buildings that are being dedicated Saturday, just the work involved in their erection, has practically created boom town conditions. It has caused business to be good here, when otherwise it would have been very dull. The Barfoot Hotel, which only two years ago, went days at times without a roomer, many times in the past year has been full up and turning people away. Many times we have gone into the cafe late in the evening and seen it full of working men, the most of them eating steaks. These are some of the benefits of progress. The new bank, in getting its personnel, already has brought three new families to Jayton, and one of these families is occupying a new brick home. Three new families, and perhaps others later, mean several hundred dollars new money in the community each month -- Money that every merchant in town has the opportunity to vie for. The new old folks home already has brought one new family to town, with the promise of others. Also it very likely will give good employment to a number of housewives, which will enable them to raise their living standards with this added revenue. This too means progress. Recently, another dream was fulfilled in Jayton, and that was the location of a doctor here. Dr. A. R. Mancille now maintains offices in Jayton daily. The editor of the Chronicle can vouch for the doctor as to his professional ability. He was our family doctor for a great many years, back in the 40's. We don't think he can be beat when it comes to diagnosis and treatment of disease, and general practice. Right now, there are petitions being circulated in the county calling for an election to vote bonds to build a clinic for the county. This, the proponents of the plan, say it is needed to enable the county to keep a good doctor. More progress -- the Texas Highway Department has announced its plans to spend several hundred thousand dollars in this county to improve our roads, both FM and U. S. 380 that crosses our county east and west. This will bring many people into the county, and will cause much money to be spent right here among our people. More progress, the Jayton First Baptist Church is moving right along with its building program. Land has been purchased, blue prints drawn and they hope to soon be able to give the go ahead sign. Already they have a large portion of the funds raised. More progress -- within the past two years at least eight new brick houses have been built in our community and a number of good frame houses, many more than the normal want. More progress -- only a short time ago there was no long term money available to home builders. So there was very little building. But now there are lending agencies that want to lend money on Jayton houses. More progress, a group of men, known as the Kent Co. Development Corp. has been working tirelessly toward trying to locate industry in our county. They have devoted a great lot of personal time and effort and money to this project. A lot of people have heard of Kent County through this group that otherwise had not known or cared. They have high hopes of accomplishing a high goal, but already have done a lot of good -- this too is progress. Progress -- how does it come? First with a dream, and then with a lot of work and sweat and toil, set backs, and renewing of efforts and a never-say-die spirit. There is no easy road to progress, and some times the wheels turn slow, but they turn sure -- and there is no substitute for hard, honest work. Progress! The way? Just keep on keeping on.

NEW HOME FOR OLD FOLKS SUPPLIES ANSWER TO NEED

One thing for sure, the people of Kent County will not have to travel a distance to find a good place to care for their fathers and mothers. We have the very best right here in Jayton. Kent County Voters approved a bond issue to finance the new building, and other money has been spent to complete and equip this new home of the aged which will be known as the Kent County Nursing Home.

The Kent County Commissioners Court has leased the home to Pike Nichols, now of Jayton, but who also operates a similar home in Spur. Nichols' reputation with the Spur home, we feel sure, was largely responsible for him getting the lease on this home. Built to accommodate 40 patients, it can house as many as 46 with no discomfort at all. It will be operated by Nichols like any other business, the only restriction on him being a clause that in the event the home is full that Kent County people will have priority on the waiting list. Situated in the north edge of Jayton on Texas Highway 70 it adds much to the beauty of the town and to viewers who may be passing through.

POST OFFICE BUILDING FEATURES EVERYTHING NEW

The new post office in Jayton is a very beautiful - brick building that was built to postal specifications and all the fixtures, and boxes and everything in it is new, ordered just for Jayton.

Everything in it is modern and it has year round air conditioning, an electric water cooler, and even wired for a television antenna. Two local men, John H. and J. W. Montgomery built the structure according to postal plans under a lease agreement and employed A. J. Wally as contractor.

It is located on Texas Highway 70 in downtown Jayton just one block north of the Kent County Court House. HEARING CALLED ON THE CLOSING OF LOCAL DEPOT

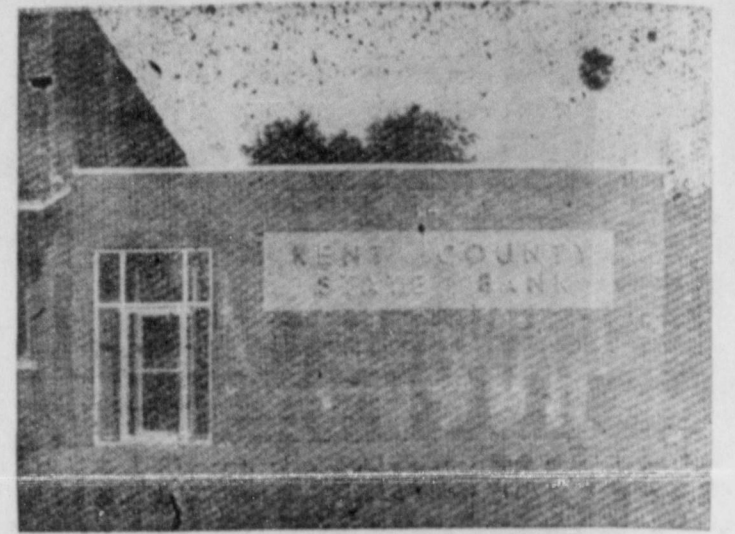
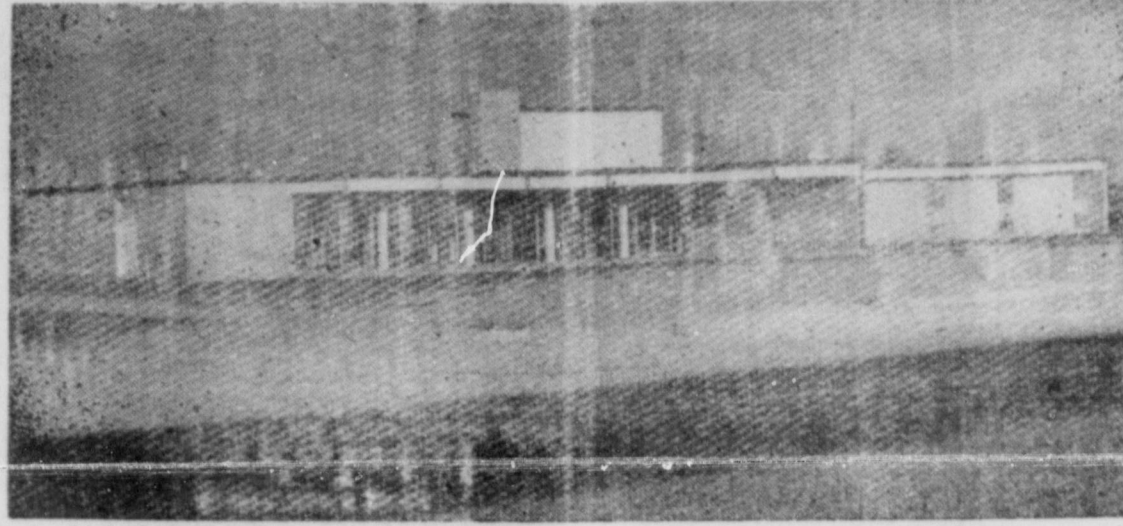
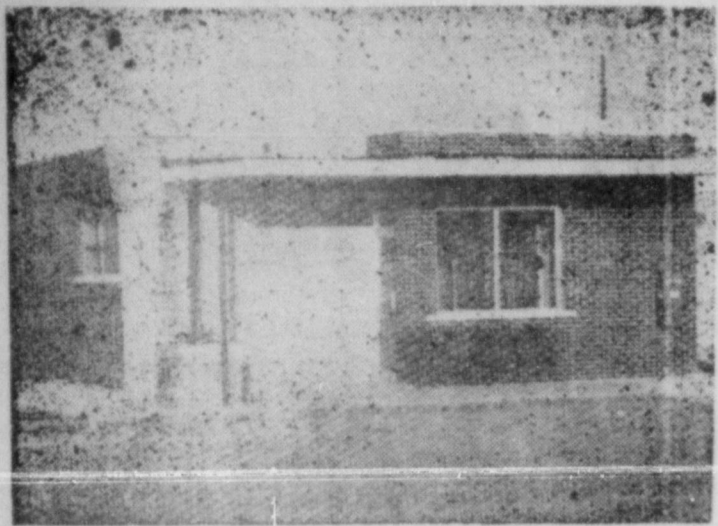

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary suspension of public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency operations resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows: "Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency operations resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power to provide for the temporary suspension of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable, and to provide for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of such offices."

The Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights," shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state as an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the 7th Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency operations resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable.

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency operations resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 49c, providing that school taxes levied in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, may be levied in any such district, but unassessed, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries, at the time of such change, as provided in this section.

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following: "Section 49c. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, may be levied in any such district, but unassessed, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries, at the time of such change, as provided in this section. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purpose of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or use to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body so shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, for the payment of principal and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted, in those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinafter authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted by the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 49c providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuation of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto Section 49c providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuation of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49d, authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs and dispose of such storage facilities and water such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe, providing for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water; providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character, providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 49d, as follows: "Section 49d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of reservoir sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 49c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream, constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies: by the United States Government or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies public and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions in which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any other government, or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof, for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas, in the same manner and with the same effect as if such bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49c of this Constitution, and the provisions of said Section 49c with respect to payment of principal and interest on

State bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid on such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall not exceed the term of the bonds authorized by this Constitution.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Board of Water Engineers to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any such storage facilities at a price not less than the direct cost of such facilities in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board of Water Engineers to sell any unappropriated public waters of the State that might be requisite in the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Board of Water Engineers or its successor authorizing the acquisition of such storage facilities and the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities shall be used to pay principal and interest on State bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness of interest to accrue thereon, any further moneys received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49c. Money received from the sale of storage facilities shall include standby service, which shall include operation and maintenance of such facilities and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact an enabling law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be void by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on November 6, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49d, providing for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs, and authorizing the continuation of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Law, subject to the restrictions and limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature, for the assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, or who are totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicap, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have received the assistance for at least an additional five (5) years during the time (1) years immediately preceding the application for assistance, and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this section for the period of time when he is receiving assistance under any other law of this state."

The qualified electors of the hospital districts, by majority vote of each such hospital district, consolidate the Brainerd School District and the West Columbia School District, and the other to include all or part of the Brainerd School District and the West Columbia School District, and the other to include all or part of the Brainerd School District and the West Columbia School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two, providing a mode of funding and also authorizing the construction, equipping, maintenance, and financing of a home for the aged in Tipton County."

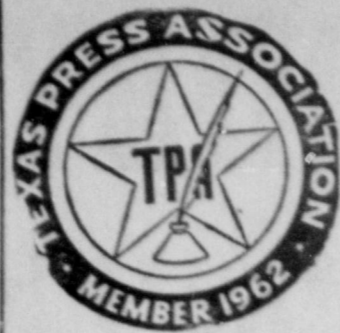

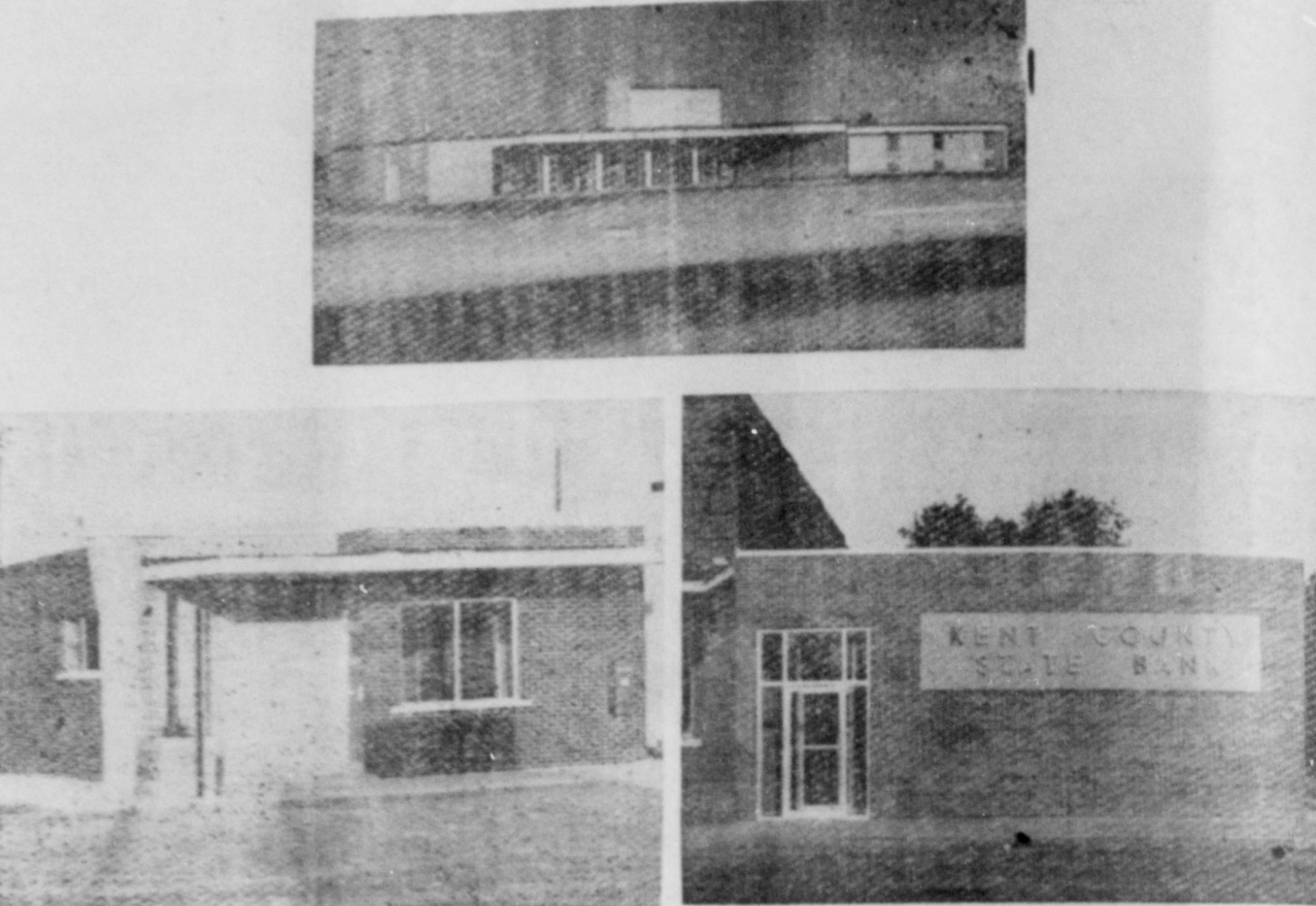

BANANA RAISIN LOAF
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup mashed ripe banana (2 to 3 bananas)
1 tablespoon grated orange peel
2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup milk
1 cup dark or golden raisins
1/4 cup coarsely chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg and beat well. Blend in banana and orange peel. Resift flour with baking powder, salt and soda. Blend into creamed mixture alternately with milk. Stir in raisins and nuts. Turn into greased loaf pan (about 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches). Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 1 hour. Let stand 5 minutes. Turn out onto wire rack to cool. Makes 1 loaf.

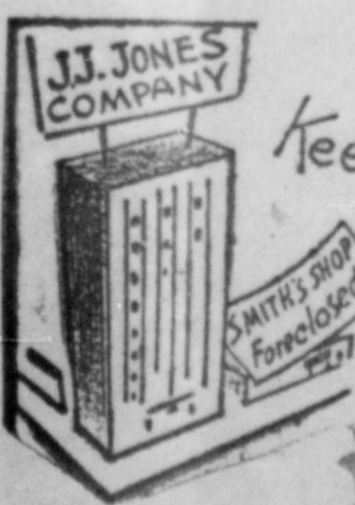
