Suspect Now In Jail

Kent County Sheriff B. J. Stanley, reports they have a man in custody in Lubbock, charged with the recent robbery of the Spot Grocery in Jayton. Stanley notified the Texas Rangers in Lubbock to be on the lookout for merchandise stolen in the robbery here. The Rangers searched a place for narcotics, and found what they thought to be the Jayton merchandise. Mike Owen was notified and went to Lubbock and identified the merchandise as coming from his store.

The suspect has been charged with the Jayton burglary and is awaiting trial, he said.

Accidents Running Low

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of May, according to Sergeant Frank Jirck Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$500.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of one accident resulting in no persons killed, one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$500.

Making Weevil Survey

Cotton survey teams are finding overwintered boll weevils in young cotton in Kent County. Survey team members Dan Dibrell and Terry Moore are working with the Extension Service Entomologist and the County Extension Agent in Kent and parts of Stone- wall County.

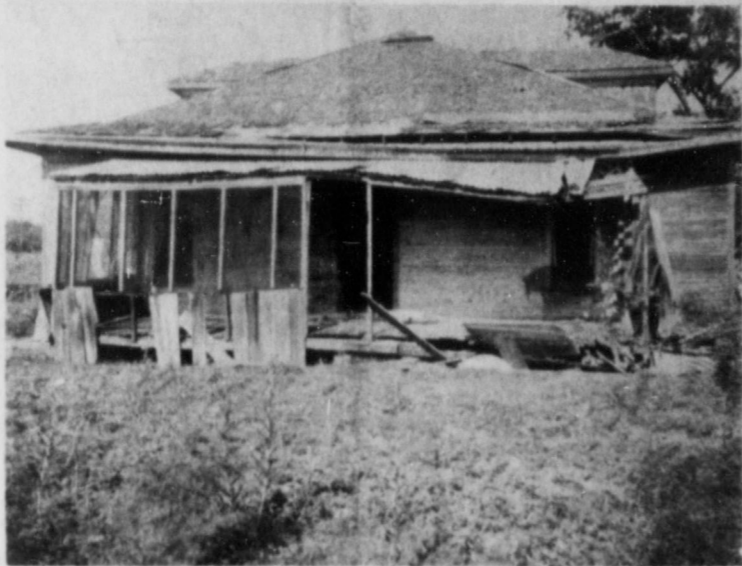
For the sixth year, part of Kent County is in the High Plains Boll Weevil control program. Survey teams make regular checks of cotton fields during the growing season. The control of diapause weevils in the fall has caused a decrease in the overwintered weevils.

Many acres of cotton were damaged Friday night by the hail. Some cotton will make a recovery, but several hundred acres of cotton west of Jayton were destroyed by the hail.

Generally cotton in the rolling plains area of Texas is up to a good stand and growing well. Aphids, aphids and fleahoppers are causing light to moderate damage. Various beneficial insects will attack aphids. Fleahoppers generally cause moderate damage to early crop cotton.

Make CHEM Study

John R. Nauert of Jayton is one of 35 high school chemistry teachers who will attend the eight-week National Science Foundation Summer Institute in Chemistry starting June 23 at Texas A&M University.

Nauert, an instructor at Jayton Independent school district, will study the CHEM-Study program at A&M according to Dr. Fred Sicilio, professor of chemistry at A&M and institute director.

CHEM-Study is the coined name for the chemical material study program started 10 years ago in California, Dr. Sicilio reported. This method of high school chemistry teaching puts emphasis on the student discovering chemistry, rather than the classical approach.

The institute work is applied toward a Master of Education degree in Science Education, Dr. Sicilio said.

GIRARD — When the doors of the Girard public schools were closed at the end of the school term this year, Moody H. Galbreath, superintendent for the past 19 years, also closed the door on his 38 years of teaching, coaching and serving as superintendent.

The Girard School District has been annexed to Jayton to form the Jayton-Girard Independent School District.

At the time the decision was made to close the Girard school, Galbreath had a three year contract. Even though he was willing and offered to work out his contract, it was decided to honor his contract and let him "go fishing" for the next three years.

AND GO FISHING is just about what he is going to do after 38 years in the teaching field. Galbreath and Mrs. Galbreath are building a new home at 1901 Ave. G in Anson with his "contract money" and he will raise night crawler fishing worms at his worm farm in addition to fishing and making a few speeches around the area and perhaps do a bit of Methodist lay preaching.

Mrs. Galbreath, who has been teaching in the Girard school for the past 19 years, hopes to continue teaching for another five years.

Some of Galbreath's most pleasing experiences date back to the 50's during which time he headed the Texas Small School Association. He piloted a number of programs to help the small schools of the state. He did a lot of lobbying in Austin and rubbed shoulders with a number of high state officials while heading the TSSA.

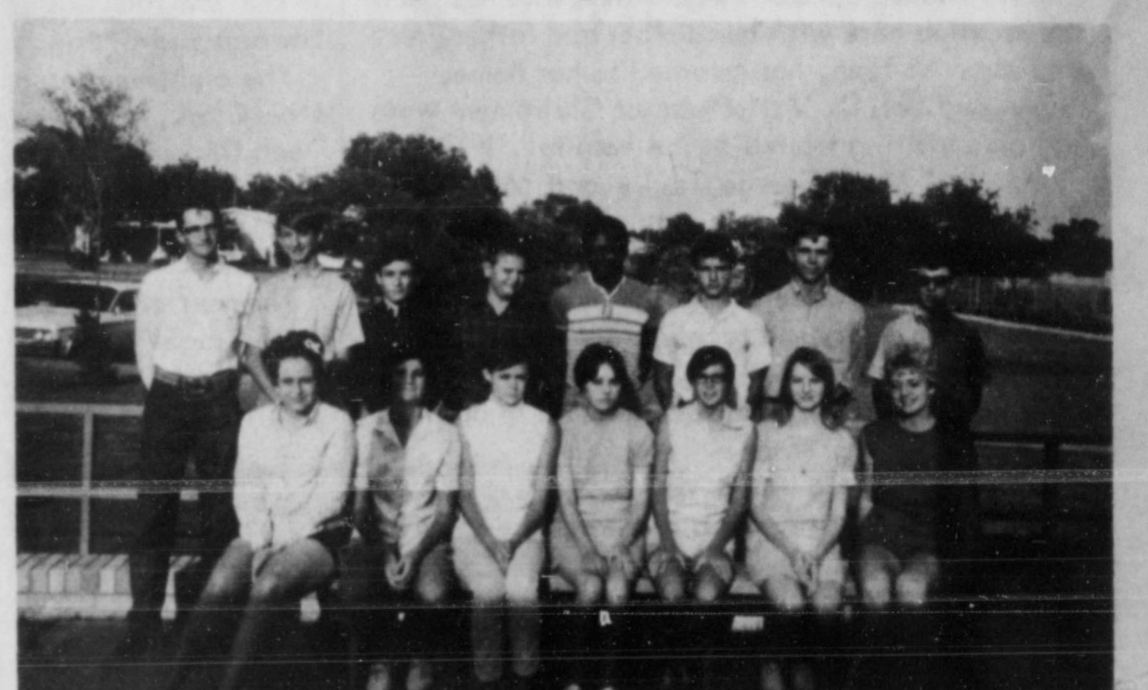

18 Take Driver Ed Course

Eighteen students, four from Rotan, two from Girard and 12 from Jayton are taking the driving course in Jayton High School this summer being taught by high school principal, Roy Dodds.

Dodds reports that eleven students made a grade of 100 on the State sign test, and the lowest grade was 90. This test is written by the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin. A student must be 15 years of age the date of the class. All of the students have taken the sign test and the road test and will take the driving test when they get 16 years of age.

The class period of driver education will finish the Friday of June 20. It will take another two weeks, Dodds said to finish the student driving.

THE GIRARD SCHOOL which has the same birth year as Galbreath will be used as a community gathering place on occasion.

Galbreath said the flag and pole and the Lueders stone base have been moved to the Girard Cemetery where the flag will be flown in honor of servicemen buried there.

Two of the Girard board members, Garth Gregory and C. V. Hagar, are now on the new board. Both were former students of Mr. and Mrs. Galbreath.

"See, I even raised my own school board," he laughed.

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TEACH YOUR CHILDREN SUMMER SAFETY

It may be true that for every joy in life, there is a corresponding hazard. The activities of a summer camper certainly make it look that way.

Playful ducking in the water may be a delight, but it's also a danger. A hike through the woods can be entertaining, and even educational, but the path through the woods can also be the road to poison ivy, insect bites and falls.

One of the biggest hazards, and one of the least recognized, is that impressionable children will pick up unfortunate attitudes toward safety from their parents. It's not what you say, but what you actually do, that determines your children's attitudes. Talk all you want about road safety, but if you speed, the children with you are likely to do the same when they grow up.

If you play roughly in the water, why shouldn't the children? If you ignore pool-side safety rules, don't be surprised to learn that Junior is a chip off the old block.

Happily, by both practicing and preaching better attitudes and activities, you can help a lot.

According to the American Camping Association, safety requires that a summer camp have at least one counselor for every eight campers; one for every six when the campers are younger than eight.

Also, says the association, most of the counselors should

be at least 19 or 20 years old. If your child must take some special medication, be sure to tell the counselor about it. And no matter how well stocked the camp's first aid department, see that your child has with him, in his own trunk: an extra pair of eyeglasses if he needs them; a can of Rhuli-Spray, good for non-poisonous insect bites, poison ivy and mild sunburn; some adhesive bandages to put on if one from the camp's infirmary comes off; and a small can of foot powder to catch athlete's foot early if it strikes.

Such foresight on your part, plus a few precautions, will not only keep your offspring safer, but also teach a safety lesson that will last a life time.

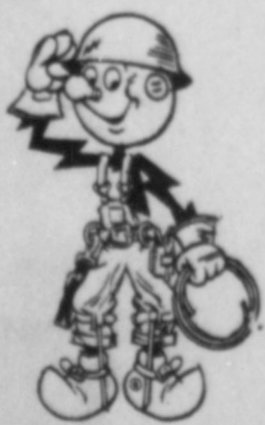

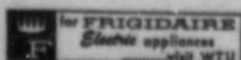
