


The drum majoring and twirling faculty will be coordinated by Jerry Tate, Jefferson Junior High School,

Democracy

The essence . . . of democracy is that it is the one system devised to date premised on the manifest fallibility of man, the one system which asserts that all men and women (not just nobles, rich man, or Party members) are full members of the community entitled to a say in its destinies. Thus the leaders must look for public sanction and the people always retain the right to reject one set in favor of another. This may on occasion lead to demagoguery, "father images," and sheer incompetence, but the alternative is a frozen, self-validating, and inevitably dictatorial system. As Winston Churchill once observed in a moment of pessimism, "democracy is the worst system ever invented - except for all the rest.'






