Haskell County polled 1,501 votes in the Second Democratic Primary, Saturday, June 6, in comparison to 2,523 ballots cast in the First Primary on Saturday, May 4th.

Only one race faced Haskell Countians in the run-off, that of County Clerk.

Mrs. C. W. (Lee) McKelvain, who was appointed Haskell County Clerk, August 15, 1969, and seeking her first elective term, defeated Mrs. Mary (Seig) Lowe.

Mrs. McKelvain polled 808 votes to Mrs. Lowe's 693, and will be the Democratic nominee in the General Election on November 3rd.

Potential vote in Haskell County, based on registrations is 4,319, according to figures from the office of Jimmy Owens, tax assessor-collector.

SS Took \$76,855 Increase Over Past Ten Years

Although early census estimates for 1970 show Haskell County declined in population during the past ten years, figures just received by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, show that the number of persons receiving monthly checks rose by 847 in those years.

The dollar amounts increased even more as a result of raises in 1965 and 1968.

The recent 15% raise in January 1970 is not reflected in the table comparison December 1959 with December 1969.

As of December 31, 1969, the number of persons in Haskell County receiving Social Security was 800, in the amount of \$41,145, in comparison with 1,647 receiving Social Security as of December 31, 1969 for the amount of \$118,000.

Mr. Zelisko was married to Mary Elizabeth Harvey, November 24, 1924, in Haskell. He was a member of Herman Lodge No. 241, Haskell.

Survivors include his wife of the home; two daughters, Mrs. C. A. Nipper, of Iowa Park, Mrs. A. L. Roden, Jr., of Bay City; one brother, Rudolph Zelisko of Temple; one sister, Mrs. Otto Peiser, Haskell; eight grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Local Boys' State Delegates Are In Austin

The thirtieth annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the Campus of the University of Texas, got underway Saturday, June 6th, at Austin as 785 high school boys from all parts of Texas, and two from Mexico, began registering. Henry H. Hill, Department Commander, announced.

Among those from Haskell registering were Andy Gannaway, James Harris, Keith Everett, and Johnny Fouts who were sponsored by Rogers-Cox Post 221, of the local American Legion.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties, the National or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

In Boys State, the American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing."

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol, Friday morning, where each elected Boys State official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 14,939 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Haskell County Farmers, Ranchers Complete Installation of Practices

Conservation practices established on the land by cooperators of the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts have exceeded expectations for the winter and spring period, reports Harry G. Koehler, Soil Conservation Service Technician of Haskell.

The following farmers and ranchers who cooperate with the California Creek SWCD have completed installation of these practices: Eugene D. Rose, Rochester, 18,256 feet of parallel terraces; Giles Kemp, Haskell, 16,189 feet of parallel terraces; Clinton Kimbrough, Haskell, operating the Crawford Estate, 62,590 feet of parallel terraces; Emil Dukatnik, Paint Creek, 18,915 feet of parallel terraces; M. E. Overton, Paint Creek, 8,980 feet of parallel terraces; Leon Burson, Haskell, 46,305 feet of parallel terraces; Norman Nanny, Haskell, 17,285 feet of parallel terraces; Virgil Sonnamaker, Haskell, 27,252 feet of parallel terraces; Albin Kokanson of the Cobb Community rebuilt 16,784 feet of standard terraces.

Citation Is Awarded Weinert Water Supt.

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Robert M. Walker, water superintendent for the city of Weinert.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Walker's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

Mayor H. V. Woodard Signs Water Purchase Contract

Mayors and members of the city councils of Haskell, Munday, Knox City and Goree met at the Chamber of Commerce office in Munday, at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday.

The city officials met to consider a water contract with the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

On August 14, 1969, voters in the above four named towns overwhelmingly approved two issues (Water Contract Proposition) to enter a contract with the Authority to purchase water stored in the reservoir and to provide a tax and revenue bond issue to clear the way for building a water contract reservoir by the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

The City Council, of Haskell, with all members present, voted and passed an ordinance approving the signing of the water contract. Mayor H. V. Woodard signed the water purchase contract attested by Ira Hester, secretary of the city of Haskell.

Haskell County Draws Location For Test Well

Haskell County has gained site for a proposed 5,100 foot well in the area four miles north of Rochester.

The venture is Medders Petroleum Corp., of Wichita Falls No. 1 Draper, located on a 102-acre lease.

Drill site is 467 feet from the south and 830 feet from the west lines of Section 25, Block 14, H&T Survey.

The grain is turning out good and is making from 25 to 30 bushels per acre.

Serious observers are questioning the durability of the American system. One of these is columnist Alsop who commented recently that, "A good many normally sensible people are beginning to ask themselves whether the American system might not come apart one of these days, rather like Oliver Wendell Holmes' wonderful one-hoss shay. The one-hoss shay, it will be recalled, 'was built in such a logical way, it ran a hundred years to a day.' But it 'went to pieces all at once... all at once, and nothing first, just as bubbles do when they burst.' Mr. Alsop concludes that the odds are high that the American system will surmount present difficulties as it has other difficulties in the past.

These reflections of a leading and highly competent viewer of the contemporary scene should make everyone pause and search for little ways in which to exhibit a reaffirmation of faith in the U. S. An obvious opportunity will present itself on June 14 during the nationwide observance of Flag Day. It was on June 14, 1777, that the United States Flag was adopted. For nearly 200 years, it has been a symbol of freedom and justice. On countless occasions, it has rallied the patriotic and unified the nation in the vast crucible of human existence where only the fittest can survive. The right to fly the American Flag before our homes and places of business is a high honor at anytime...and doubly so on the Anniversary of the birth of the Flag.

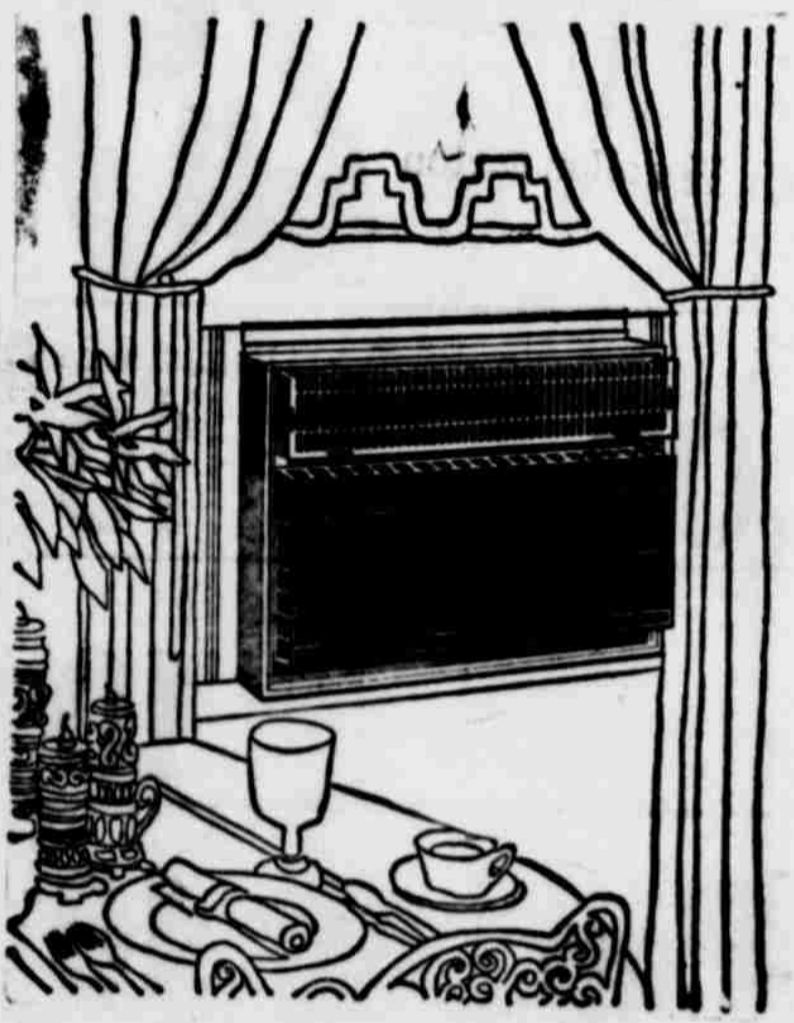

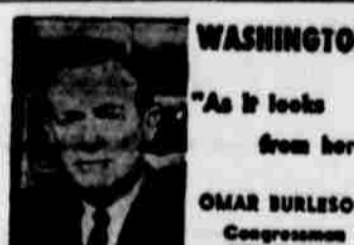

From observations, military flights from the big Soviet naval base in Murmansk are bringing submarine replacement crews to Cuba where they board Russian submarines, which are known to cruise off our shores.

Reports of nuclear missiles in Cuba in 1962 were delayed for a considerable period of time which made the late showdown most serious. This appears to be the case at this time.

Perhaps the Russians think that internal dissension in the United States has weakened us to a point that we will not react to a shift in nuclear deployment and that a nuclear presence in Cuba, and in the Caribbean generally, will be ignored.

It is, of course, publicly known that the Kremlin has recently sent into the Caribbean Sea a naval task force believed to include missile bearing cruisers and destroyers. When this was officially known, and it was, the Administration should have taken the issue up publicly and forced out into the open that which has seemingly been

ignored. This has been an invitation for the Russians to continue to probe for a strengthening of their position as close to the Western Hemisphere as possible. The official attitude seems to be to "play it cool" nearer to home than on the other side of the World.

It was while we were absorbed in controversy at home and elsewhere that the Soviets first sent naval units to within only 90 miles from our own shores. There has been no direct repercussions which are perceptible.

Whatever the reasoning behind it, it is pretty obvious that Russia's military is taking advantage of extending her forces in a most vital strategic position. When it has been necessary

for the United States confrontation with the Soviet Union, their capability to attack from there should be near-by weapons should follow to force so near as er or later we under blackmail

J. J. Ballard's Life Story Reads Like Something From T.V. Western Series

Junior G. A. Camp Stated At Lueders

When J. J. Ballard passed away in Reno, January 16, 1970, at the age of 98, it marked the end of the trail for a colorful Texas trail driver. His life's story reads like something from a television Western series.

When the railroad came in and the last of the big trail drives went out in 1891, Ballard took to the ranges. He worked as a cowhand during the period when that occupation was at the peak of its glamor, through Colorado, Montana, Idaho, Eastern Oregon and Nevada.

For the last 42 years, Ballard lived in the Winnemucca area. He had owned extensive ranch holdings in the area and in Pershing County, and Malheur County, Oregon.

John James Ballard considered himself the last of the living Texas drivers. Born January 15, 1872, in Missouri, the son of a Confederate major, Ballard moved to Grandbury, Texas, with his parents when he was 11.

In his early teens, after some schooling there, Ballard began riding for several cattle outfits in that area, then signed for his

first drive out of Central Texas to a railhead at Quanah, Texas. There, unexpectedly, he just kept moving north.

Railroads were rapidly replacing them, but trail drivers were still much in evidence in the plains at this time. Ballard had memories of stampedes, of perilous fordings of mighty rivers, of at least one cowboy killed in a fight, of thousands of cattle on the hoof, and up to 45 days on the trail.

At the end of a drive to North Dakota, Ballard returned to Texas for more moving work. In December, 1891, the requiem year for the great trail drives, he moved to the Cimarron strip at Kronton, Okla., spending the next few years as a wandering cowhand, getting his first experience buying and selling ranch property.

Odyssey Ballard married a Texas girl, a longtime sweetheart, in Haskell in 1900, and a nephew, Marvin Post, states he attended the wedding.

He never again returned to Texas. Then began his odyssey as a cowboy in the western states.

"He followed the frontier," his son, Joaquin Ballard, observed. And when the last frontier vanished, J. J. settled in Nevada, where the wide open spaces seemed widest.

Unlike many cowboys of his time, Ballard led a life of rectitude. He never drank in his life, and never smoked until he was about 60, thereafter indulging in a cigar now and then.

He was trim and tough until the time of his death, and stuck to oldtime conservative attitudes all his life.

Do It Himself "He resented government intervention," recalls Joaquin. "He thought every man should do it himself."

In 1948 J. J. retired and moved to Winnemucca, selling his ranch holdings. He lived there until he moved to Reno with his son.

In later years, J. J. spent a lot of time telling stories, recalling old times or the range. He even had a few articles published in Old West magazines, and had his life story recounted in the Amarillo, Texas, Daily News.

Healthy throughout his life, Ballard finally succumbed to the infirmities of age at 98. Sarah, the wife he took back in Texas died in 1952.

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THINK BIG

Why not start the new fishing season by deciding that this is the year to catch a fish big enough to make the record books?

Almost all state conservation departments record large fish taken from a state's waters. Eligible species include almost every fish in the United States, and how you catch the fish isn't important as long as it was by a legal sport fishing method.

How do you go about finding and catching a trophy fish? Well, the angling authorities at Mercury outboards suggest that there are proven techniques for locating big fish, methods followed by expert anglers.

An important first step is to decide which record you want to break. Study information about your state's present record catches, and decide which fish you intend to pursue. Then concentrate all your efforts toward catching that kind of fish. Read all available material about your quarry. Visit state fishery biologists and learn what they know about your fish, and where the best angling might be found.

Next, narrow the number of places you intend to fish to several promising bodies of water. Limit all fishing to those places which are the most likely spots for big fish. Study each lake or stream keeping in mind the things you've learned from prior reading and discussion.

As for fishing methods, try everything! Record-breaking fish from one mid-west state last year were taken by a number of techniques including lures, live bait, fly rods and bait casting equipment.

Of course, be familiar with your state's requirements for having a fish checked for possible entry in the record book. One precaution from the boys at Mercury: don't clean the fish until its weight has been verified.

The rewards for catching a record-size fish aren't much beyond personal satisfaction, admiration from other anglers, and expertise gained as a result of your effort. The big reward is the fun you had going fishing.
