



The annual commencement of the University of Texas Medical Branch was held at 8:15 p. m. Wednesday, June 9, in Moody Civic Center in Galveston. James L. Norman, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Norman of Rule, was among the 133 candidates to receive the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

Degrees were conferred by a member of the University of Texas board of regents. William P. Deiss, M.D., professor and chairman of the department of internal medicine, administered the Hppocratic Oath to the new physicians.

Dr. Norman is a 1963 graduate of Rule High School, and received his B. A. degree from the University of Texas in 1967. His extra-curricular activities include an internship at Fairfax County Hospital, Falls Church, Va., and internship at Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas.


