ssuming ressonably favorable weather t 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cottion Growers, Inc, ha ve current prospects for harvesting $1,840,000$ bales of cotton this year, about 450,000 more than were produced
in 1969 . Including price support payments. lint and seed, such a erop would be worth in the neighborhood of $\$ 338$ million to area farmers. Potential production was estimated in a joint effort by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and PCG Each year the two organizodons collaborate in compiling crop estimates on the first of eacl month, August 1 through December 1. The es timates, of necessity, are based on crop con"reasonably favorable"
PCG's breakdown of figures on the crop's value show that the lint from a 1.84 million bale erop, a t a bout $\$ 90$ per bale average, would come to $\$ 165,600,000$. A total of 759,000 tons of seed, at a "guestimated" minimum $\$ 50$ per ton price to the farmer. would net another $\$ 37,950,000$. Price support payments, most of which have already been made, are based on projected yields and this year add up to about $\$ 834$ million.

The LCE-PCG estimate sets planted acreage for the 25 counties at $2,218,000$, of which it is calculsted thet $2,104,500$ were "standing acres" on August I. This leaves about 113,500 acres, little over 5 percent, that has been abandoned because of hail, drouth, windstorms or other weather phenonena. Acreage planted but never harvested in 1962 figured about 28 percent. About 30 percent of the cotton on the High plains is not irrigated, and rewching the 1.8 million bale estimate will depend much on rainall. Most areas of dryland cotton are now reported to be holding up well but badly in need of rain within the next to days or two weeks. Irrigeted cotton, through late in some a reas looks extremely good almost everywhere, ob servers report.
