County Unity Is A Good Thing

In recent years, there has been a feeling of community friendliness and harmony in Kent County, not ever known before. At the present time, people from all parts of the county get together and visit and have a good time, and outwardly, at least, have forgotten some of the old community sores that once existed. And I am sure they all like it this way.

Much credit for this good feeling now existing in the various communities of the county, is due the leaders of the Jayton School, and at the Kent County Court House.

Particularly, the Kent County Commissioners Court, in the past ten years, to my certain knowledge, has been careful to represent all the communities and not just one.

The court has spent much money in all the communities, giving them some of the social and civic things they needed.

In extreme southwest Kent County, Polar has a nice little community building. They mainly use it once a year for homecoming, but they wanted it, and they have it.

At Clairmont, the old courthouse has been changed into a museum. It is not used often, but it was restored after the fire, because they wanted it, and the court fixed it for them. It is used as a place to hold elections, and other functions. Also, at Clairmont, the school premises have been converted into a 4-H club center, and community center. Picnicking facilities have been fixed, and it is a popular place for family reunions. Also they wanted a new fire truck, and the court purchased it for them, and

maintains it.

At Girard, they also wanted a fire truck, and it was purchased for them. They have a small park, which the court helped to fix up for them, and fixed them a well and water supply.

Also, at Girard, the school premises are being used as a community center. The Bi-County, Kent and Dickens County Fair is now going on in these facilities. School officials have approached the commissioners court, with the proposal that they take over the Girard school premises, as they did Clairmont, and make it a permanent place for the fair and other community functions. It is very likely this will be done, the Chronicle is advised.

In the past ten years, I have personally examined the minutes of every meeting of the Commissioners Court, and if they at any time ever refused to spend any money in these communities, that either Commissioners Elwood Byrd or Carlos Dickerson asked for I fail to find it.

And now, Commissioners Hamilton and Dibrell have asked for a county library and community center, and to build some recreational facilities in and near Jayton. And, really, they are not locally Jayton projects, but are for people of all the county, merely located in Jayton, as the county seat.

The library, as everyone knows is extremely overloaded and crowded in its present location. Members of the library committee, which includes people from all over the county, have urged the court for many years to build a new library, and to greatly extend its facilities.

The location of the place

where the two parks installations are proposed, are in Jayton, or near Jayton, but they would be used primarily by the young people who attend the Jayton-Girard School District. They would be available, and usable, and enjoyable, just as much by school children, or preschoolers, as the case might be, from the extremes of Polar or Red Mud, as those who live in the heart of Jayton.

Commissioner Hamilton told the Chronicle Tuesday he had been promising the people a new library for a long time, and working toward that end.

He said the county had funds available to build all of these proposed facilities without a bond issue. He said they could have built them and paid for them at a great savings, by the non-bond issue route, and that he and Commissioner Dibrell favored doing it that way. But the other commissioners, and the County Judge, he said, preferred a bond issue, and a vote of the people. And, so, he said, "We decided if we couldn't have it our way, we would try to get it their way."

I have never checked a book out of the library, but I have donated a number of books to it. I will probably never check one. My children will probably never use any of the park facilities. But I do still have a sizeable investment in Kent County, and do have taxes assessed against me in Kent County, and I think these facilities will help the community, socially, morally, and financially, and I hope the people go to the polls next Tuesday and give them a sounding majority. This is the wise and proper thing to do.

Who Will Pick Up the Tab?

Kent voters will go to the polls Tuesday to pass their judgment on a \$175,000,00 bond issue. The question each voter is probably asking, is, "What will this cost me? This is a good question. This may help you get the answer.

The local residents who actually vote on the issue will probably have to pay about ten percent of the total cost, or about \$17,500,00. The complete cost would be about \$10 per person for each county resident.

The other ninety percent of the cost would be paid by holders of oil, gas and mineral properties of Kent County. Do you think they are able to pay their share?

Well, the Chronicle was told Monday of this week by an employee of General Crude Oil Company, who owns more

than half of all this type property, that this month of September, 1970 General Crude will move out of the county and sell more than nine hundred thousand barrels of crude oil. At \$3.25 per barrel this would be about \$3 million in this one month.

A representative of the firm of Pritchard and Abbot that works for Kent County evaluating these properties said recently that owners of mineral properties in Kent County will sell during this year of 1970 probably between 50 and 60 million dollars of minerals.

The total value of all these properties, for tax purposes in the county amounts to only about \$25 million. They will sell off \$50 million this year, and no one knows how much will be left.

Do you remember how it

was in Kent County BC (Before Oil). I am told by people who worked for the county, back then they had no money at all to do anything with. If they owed you, they gave you a voucher, which you could not cash. We don't know when it will be this way again, ten or forty years from now? Who knows?

But we do know that oil properties in Kent County are very, very low for tax purposes, and this new bond issue will place no hard or unusual burden on them, but is fair and equitable in every way, and less than it is in any of the surrounding counties.

The things of public nature the people of the county need they had better get it while it is practical. Don't you agree with me? ---The Editor.

Jaybirds Surprise Roscoe Tackle Spur This Week

For many years the Jaybirds have been wanting to renew the annual football clash with the Spur Bulldogs. This year, for the first time in many years, this game will be played. The homecoming game will be with Spur who lost to Rotan last week.

The Jaybirds pulled a mild upset last week in defeating favored Roscoe, on their field, 26-14.

Lyndall Favor, Kim Nichols and John Paul Davis shared in the scoring honors. The line play for the Jaybirds was good, and they held on pass plays and opened up good holes for the backs on the running plays.

In the statistical department, the game was fairly even. Jayton led in first downs 10-9 and in scrimmage 154 to 112.

The Birds superiority was especially shown in the aerial department: as they connected with 8 of 14 for 188 yards, while the Plovers could connect with only 5 of 17 for 21 yards.

Jayton won in spite of themselves, having two passes picked off and lost 4 fumbles. The birds were penalized 10 times for 90 yards, and Roscoe took 7 penalties for 35 yards.

In the three year exchange between the two schools this is Jayton's first victory.

The Court Sets Tax Rate

The Kent County Commissioners Court met Monday and set the tax rate. The ad valorem tax rate was 75¢, the special Road and Bridge tax rate 15¢ and lateral road rate 30¢ making a total rate of 1.20 per \$100 of valuation of property.

The ad valorem rate is broken down as follows: General 54¢, Permanent Improvement and Interest and Sinking 10¢, and the Road and Bridge Interest unanimously on motion made by Elwood Byrd and seconded by Carlos Dickerson.

BE IT REMEMBERED that on this the 24th day of August, 1970, the Commissioners' Court of Kent County, Texas, convened for a called session of said Court, pursuant to notice duly issued by the County Judge, which was posted for the time and in the manner as prescribed by law, at the Commissioners' Court Room in the Courthouse in Jayton, Texas, with the following members present and in attendance, viz:
Bobbie T. Gallagher, County

G. L. Hamilton, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1
Carlos Dickerson, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2
Elwood Byrd, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3
W. C. Dibrell, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4
Hartense North, County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk of the Commissioners' Court,

and with no one absent, constituting the entire membership of said Court, whereupon, among other proceedings, the following order was adopted by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners present:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Kent County, Texas, deems it necessary, advisable and to the best interest of said County and its inhabitants that the bonds of said County be issued for the purposes hereinafter stated, and has determined to submit the propositions for the authorization of such bonds to an election as hereinafter set out:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF KENT COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 22nd day of September, 1970, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this Order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE

SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Kent County, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$100,000.00) of the general obligation bonds of said County for the purpose of making permanent public improvements, to-wit: acquiring land for and of purchasing, constructing, repairing, equipping and improving

such buildings and other permanent improvements to be used for county library purposes and as a community center library; said bonds to mature serially over a maximum period of not to exceed five years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners' Court at the time of issuance; and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO

SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Kent County, Texas, be authorized to issue SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$75,000.00) of the general obligation bonds of said County for the purpose of making permanent public improvements, to-wit: acquiring and improving land for park purposes; said bonds to mature serially over a maximum period of not to exceed five years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices, and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners' Court at the time of issuance; and to provide for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?

SECTION 2: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with VERNON'S ANNOTATED TEXAS STATUTES ELECTION CODE so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

3. In Election Precinct No. 3, the election shall be held in the Community Center Building in Clairmont, Texas, with Mrs. Lock Wall as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Bell Dyess as Associate Judge.

4. In Election Precinct No. 4, the election shall be held at the Courthouse in Jayton, Texas, in the County Court Room, with Estelle Luna as Presiding Judge and Mrs. J. T. Leech as Associate Judge.

Each Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist in holding said election.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 O'Clock A.M. to 7:00 O'Clock P.M.

Absentee voting shall be conducted by the County Clerk of Kent County, Texas, at the office of the County Clerk in the Courthouse Building in Jayton, Texas, for the time and in the manner as prescribed by Chapter 5 of the Election Code, and the officers for counting the absentee votes shall be Robert Hall and Ralph Goodall.

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of Kent County, Texas, including those who own taxable property in said County

and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. That at said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of these boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

SECTION 5: That a substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted within each election precinct in the County and at the Courthouse Door not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in Kent County, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for the election.

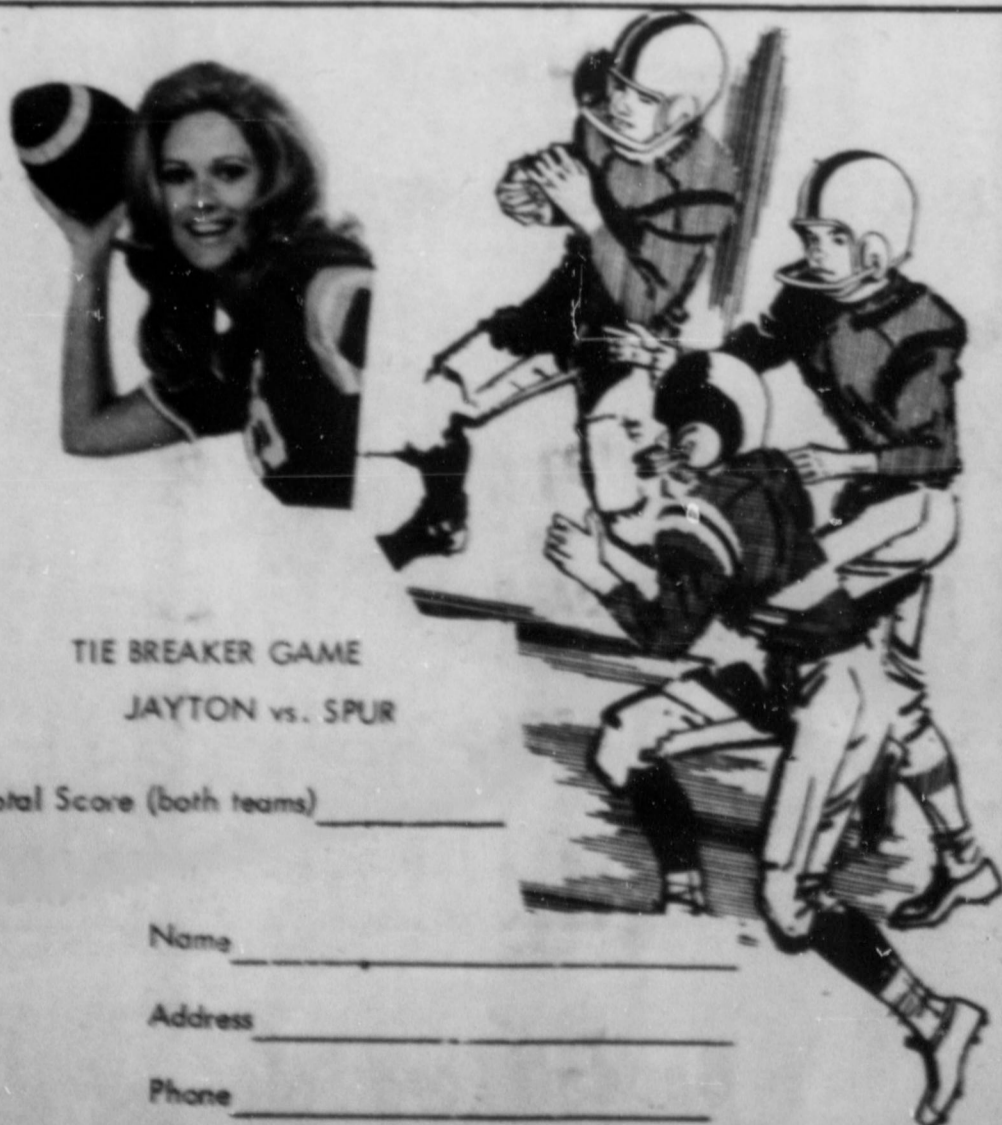

 Mix sugar, flour and egg. Then add lemon juice and rind, salt, raisins and water. Cook over hot water for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool. Line piepan with pastry, pour in filling and place strips of pastry over filling in lattice design. Bake in very hot oven (450°F) 10 minutes, reduce temperature to moderate (350°F) and bake 20 minutes longer. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

PRUNE PIE

2 cups stewed prunes, pitted
 1 orange, divided into segments
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 2 tablespoons butter
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup prune juice
 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 1 baked Pastry Shell
 1 recipe Meringue I

Cut prunes into quarters. Add orange segments (freed from membrane), sugar, butter, salt and prune juice. Heat to boiling. Mix cornstarch with equal amount of cold water or prune juice, add to hot prune mixture and cook 5 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to keep smooth. Cool, pour into pastry shell, cover with meringue and bake as directed. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.
