The Jayton Jaybirds Win Over Spur Bulldogs 28-13 Friday Night

The Jaybirds went on the field to play Friday night, and they ended the game with a happy 28-13 victory over the visiting Spur Bulldogs.

Spur too, the kickoff, and moved well down field until there was a fumble, and this marked the most of their activities of the night. They lost the most of the breaks in the game, and many of their fans seemed to blame the officials for it.

The teams went in at the half with the Birds leading 7-6. Soon after the half, a Spur lad intercepted a Jaybird pass in the end zone and ran it 105 yards into the other end zone, only to have it returned to the Spur 40 on a clipping call. After this Spur team, coach and fans seemed to be running mad the most of the time.

Harold Judy made the Birds score from the 3, and Kim Nichols added the 1 point kick.

Dusty Smith scored the next Jaybird TD with Nichols adding another PAT.

In the final quarter for the Jaybirds, Harold Judy carried to about the six inch line, where he was jarred loose from the ball. Nicky Williams fell on the ball in the end zone to get credit for the next tally.

Jayton's final drive ended with Lyndal Favor picking off a Bulldog pass and running it in.

On a fake kick, Harold Judy passed to Favor for the 2 point conversion.

The Jaybirds will be host to Rochester here Friday night.

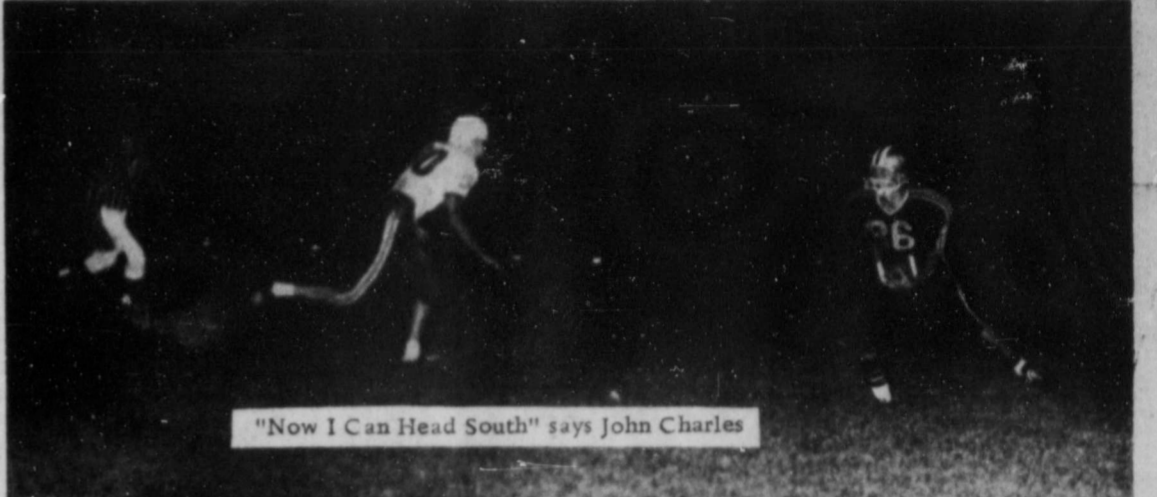

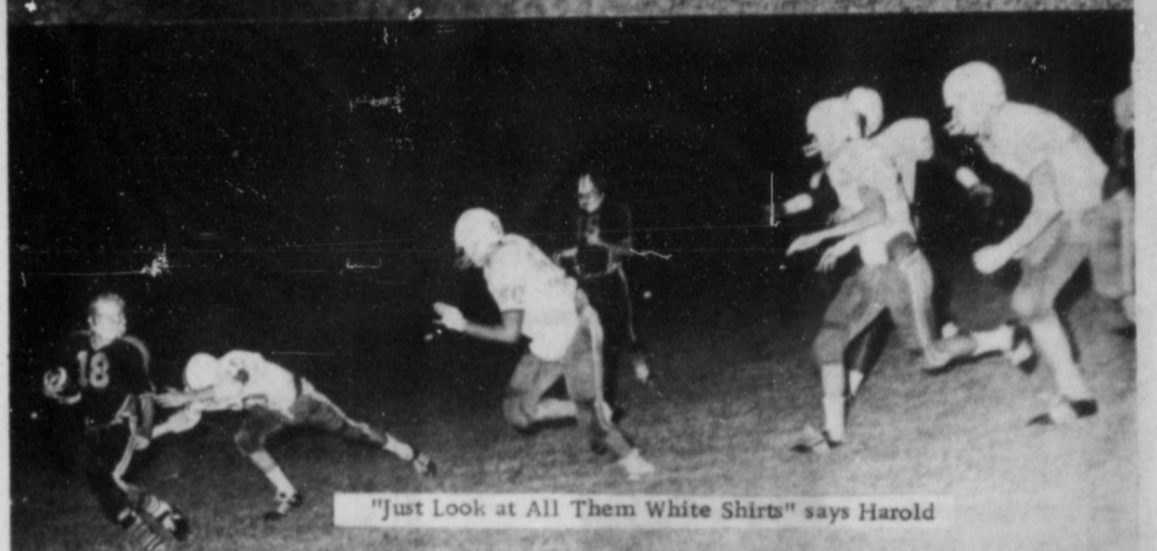

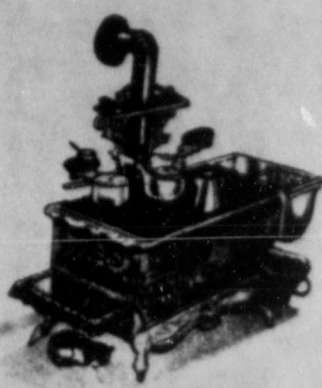

SAUSAGE LOAF

1 1/2 pounds pork sausage meat
1 1/2 cups bread or cracker crumbs
1 tablespoon grated onion
2 tablespoons tomato catchup
2 tablespoons horse-radish
1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup milk

Mix sausage and crumbs. Add onion, catchup, horse-radish, mustard and egg. Moisten with milk. Shape into a loaf and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 1 hour. Serves 6.

SOUTHERN SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

4 large sweetpotatoes, cooked
1 pound pork sausage meat
4 large apples, unpared
Salt
Water
Brown sugar

Peel potatoes, cut into thin slices and place half in bottom of greased casserole; cover with sausage shaped into 4 cakes and add apples cut into thick slices. Sprinkle with salt, cover with remaining potatoes, brush with water and sprinkle with brown sugar. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 1 hour. Serves 4.

SAUSAGE BALLS

1 pound pork sausage meat
1 pound fresh pork, ground
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup uncooked rice
1 cup boiling water
3 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon cloves, Salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Combine sausage, pork, salt and rice. Shape into balls about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Brown slowly, cooking 10 to 12 minutes. Add water and simmer 1 1/2 hours or until all water is absorbed. Remove balls, blend flour into fat in pan; add milk, spices and salt and cook until thickened. Pour over meat balls. Serves 8.

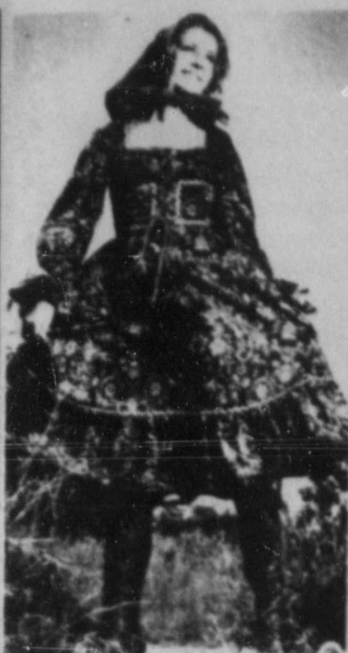

2 tablespoons vinegar

1 cup chopped celery
1 pimienta, chopped
2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
Mayonnaise
Salt

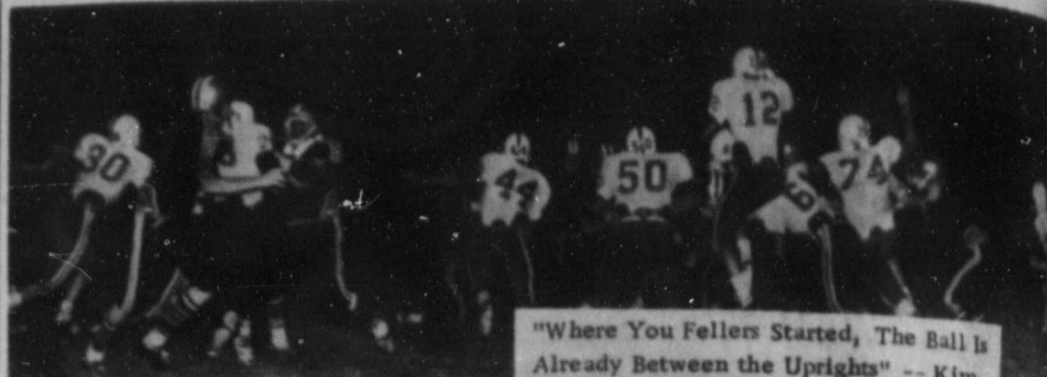

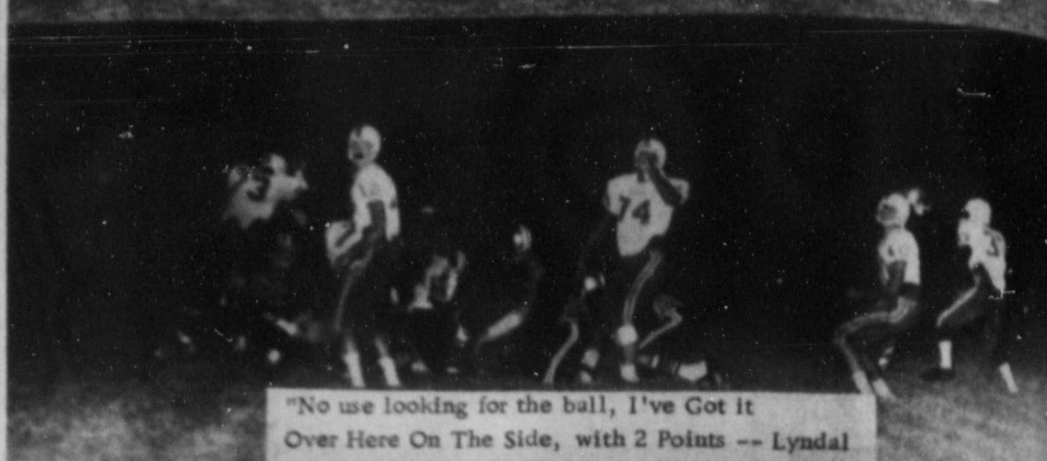

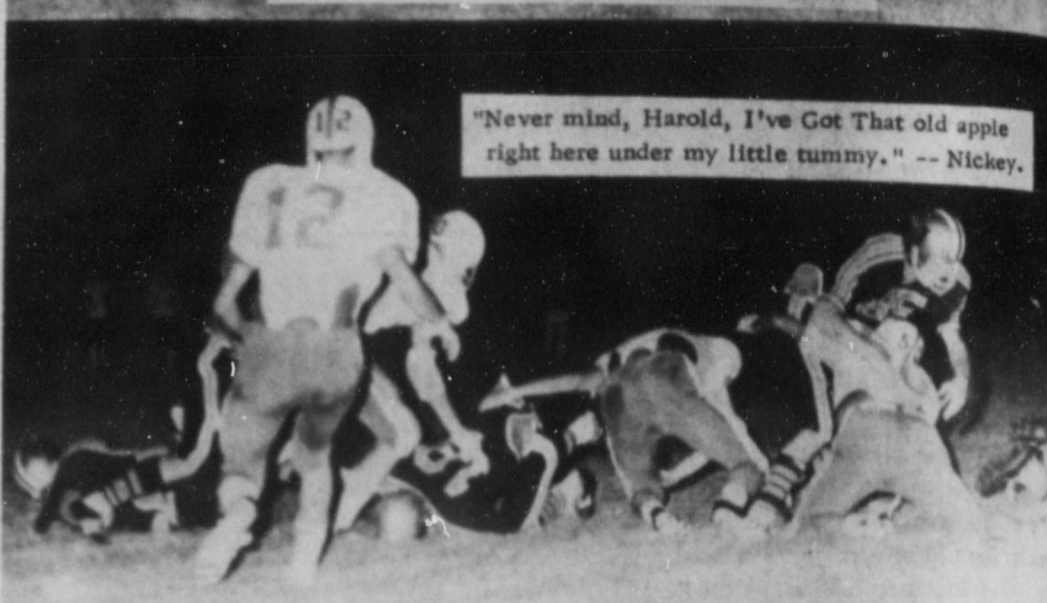

NOTICE OF HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

The Texas Highway Department offered an opportunity for a public hearing to be requested, by publication on August 21, and August 28, 1970 of notices reporting the proposed construction of Farm to Market Highway 1083 in Kent County from the end of present F.M. 1083 to U.S. and S.H. 70. The proposed highway is located about 4 miles southwest of Jayton.

No requests for a public hearing were received; therefore, the District Office of the Texas Highway Department, at Abilene, has submitted all of the engineering data and information received in connection with the development of this project for approval of the proposed Route and Design by the Administration of the Texas Highway Department.

The proposed highway project will provide for a two lane highway consisting of a 20 ft. asphalt surface within 100 ft. of right of way. The proposed highway is located about 4 miles southwest of Jayton.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the office of Mr. Ben R. Wilkerson, Resident Engineer, on North S.H. 208 Colorado City, Texas.

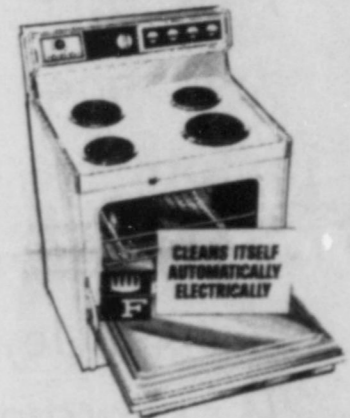

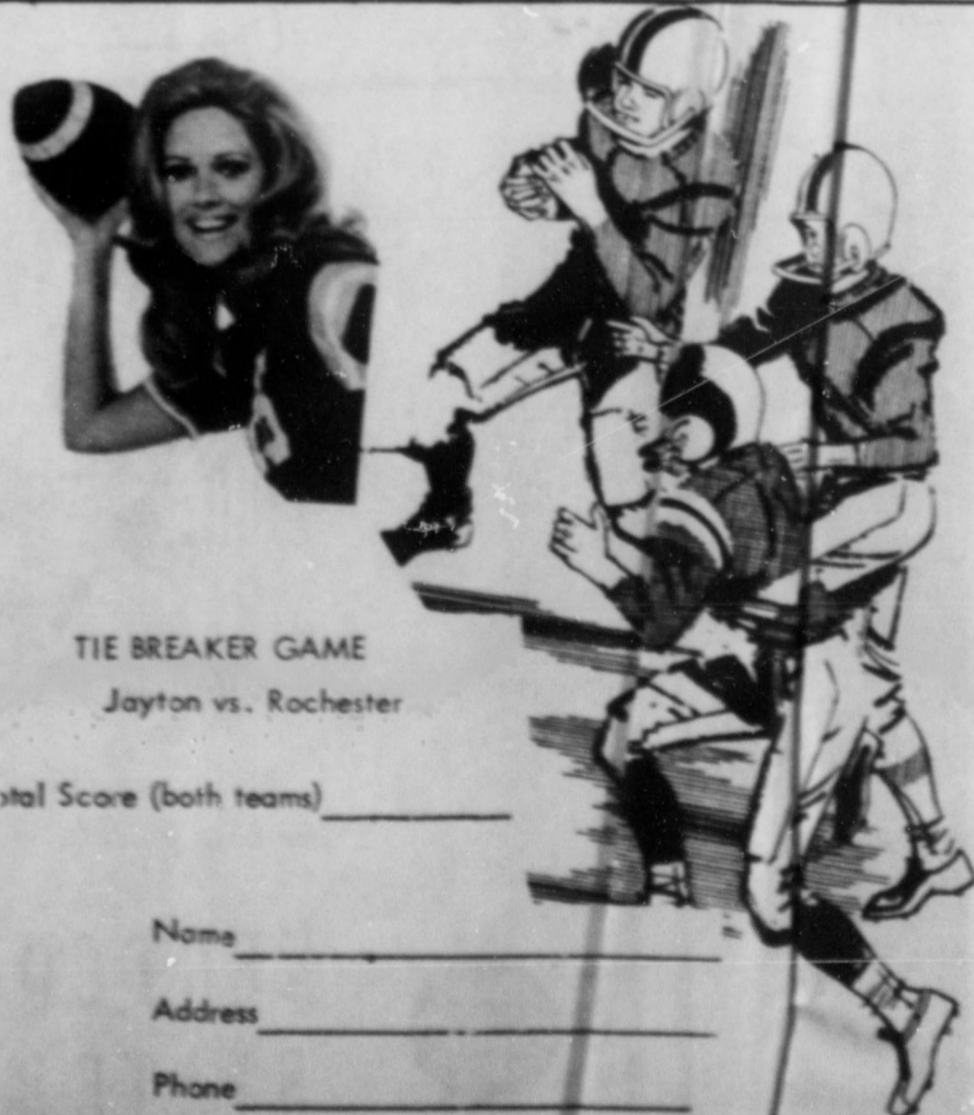

To Give Rubella Shots

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When considering the real danger of rubella, that being to be unborn baby, it becomes readily apparent that expectant mothers who have never had the disease need to be protected. However, herein lies a very serious problem. To date, there are no conclusive facts as to whether or not the vaccine will have the same deleterious effect on an unborn baby as the natural disease. The task then is to protect women in the childbearing age without actually giving them the vaccine. In order to accomplish this, it is presently recommended that both boys and girls in the one through ten age group be given the vaccine, thus preventing them from contracting the disease and exposing and expectant mother. The new vaccine is both safe and effective. It is expected that one dose will give lifetime protection.

commonly called German or three-day measles, and should not be confused with the vaccine that has been offered in the past few years for regular red or 10 day measles which does not protect against rubella. Also, since many childhood diseases look and act like rubella, it is impossible to know for sure that a child has had the disease without a special blood test. So it is recommended that all children ages one thru ten years be given the vaccine even though it is believed that a child has already had the disease. It is safe for a child who has had the disease to receive the vaccine.

No Questions Asked

Many a conscientious husband seeks peace of mind by buying life insurance to protect his family in case he dies.

But he may also have a nagging worry: will the insurance company really pay off when the time comes, or will it find some flaw making the policy null and void?

To cut this worry to a minimum, most policies now contain what is known as an "incontestable clause." Under this clause, after a stated period (usually two years), the insurance company can no longer raise technical ob-



jections about the validity of the policy. It must generally pay off "with no questions asked."

Suppose, for example, that a man applying for insurance fails to mention the fact that he has a drinking problem. And suppose, after his death, the insurance company finds out about it. Under the incontestable clause, the company could not raise this point to escape paying the insurance to the widow.

In fact, the incontestable clause applies in most states even if the applicant told a deliberate lie. Take this case:

A man filling out an insurance application was asked if he was in good health. He said he was—even though he knew he had serious heart trouble.

After his death, the insurance company tried to cancel the policy on grounds of fraud. But a court ruled that, despite the fraud, the company would still have to pay off—because more than two years had gone by. As one judge explained:

"Even though dishonest people are given advantages under incontestable clauses, still the sense of security given to the great

MEAT, POULTRY OR FISH



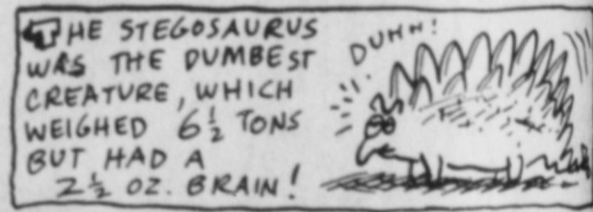
These items should be served twice daily. They include beef, veal, poultry, fish and eggs. Alternates may be dry beans, dry peas and nuts.

CEREAL PRODUCTS

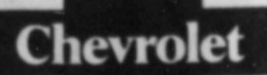

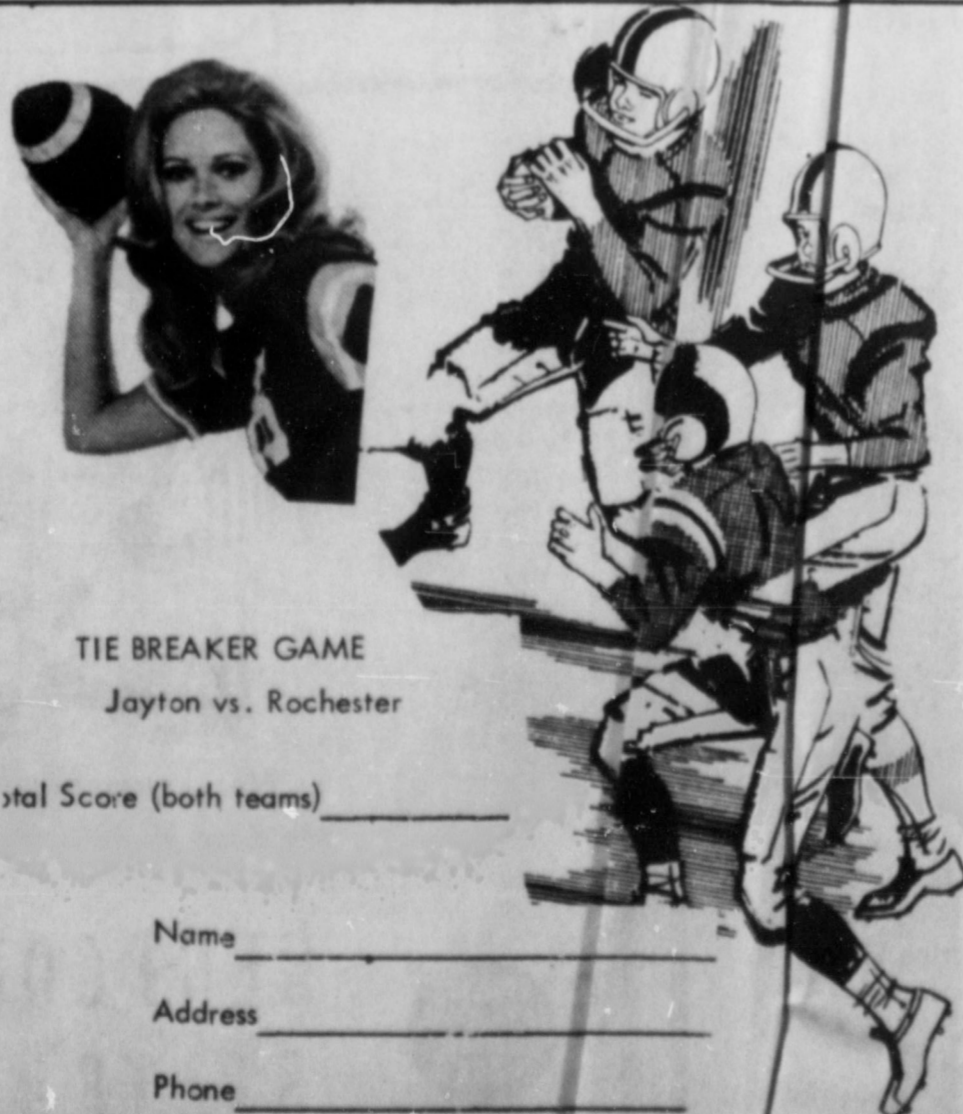

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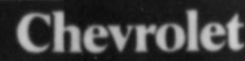
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
