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

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



If you have to borrow the money to put into it, as most of us do, the difference between 5th you receive from the preferred stock (all over \$25) and the amount of interest you have to pay is only \$3 or \$4 per hundred, so if you are out \$15 or \$20 on \$500 investment per year and if you sell 300 bushels of grain and receive 10 cents per bushel more you are ahead \$10 already.



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



The Texas Water Plan is a must for West Texas. Without immediate action toward importation of water into West Texas, this vast, productive area is doomed to a role of semi-arid rangeland.

The present-dayphilosophy of consumer protectionism is simply another name for that weary old doctrine, statism,

Runnels Water Samples Up Following Report

BALLINGER (RNS) - The Runnels County Agent's office is being flooded with water samples from all over the county following the disclosure last week that a number of underground water wells in the county were high in nitrate concentration, Alen Belk, assistant to Runnels County Agent C. T. Parker, reported.

The initial disclosure of the danger was made last week when County Judge W. H. Rampy called a meeting of local and state health officials and county officials.

A heavy loss of cattle in some the areas instigated testing of the water wells. Tests showed a nitrate concentration as high as 2,600 parts per million in one well where there had been a sudden death of 15 head of cattle.

The State Health Department said that 45 parts per million was considered unsafe for human consumption and that over 100 parts per million was unsafe for cattle.

At the meeting Parker requested that Runnels County residents using well water bring samples to his office to be tested. An estimated 2,000 wells are in operation in the county, and by noon Wednesday 135 samples had been brought to Parker's

The samples are being sent to a testing laboratory in Lubbock. Belk said the affected farms were being mapped.

Each person is asked to have his well tested at least once each quarter. Parker said that nitrate travels faster than water and that flow is erratio. making the quarterly testing advisable.

The State Health Department has recommended that wells high in nitrate be abandoned other sources of water be


