# REAGAN—BUSH TAKES COUNTY

Callahan County voters turned out in record numbers Tuesday, to cast their ballots in the General Election. Out of 6,260 registered voters, 4,364 turned out. This is 69.71% of all voters in the county. According to Judge Mack Kniffen, this was the largest turn out in the history of Callahan County. The totals are listed in the boxes below, with Precinct #1 being first, going through Precinct #8, with the absentee votes and grand total in the last two boxes respectively.

In regard to the Amendments, Callahan County voters approved four of the amendments and rejected five of them. they are as follows:

Amendment #1- Unmanned teller machines: 1,859 for and 1,828 against.  
Amendment #2: Appeals by the state or the accused in criminal cases: 1,151 for and 2,093 against.  
Amendment #3 Single appraisal and board

of equalization for tax purposes: 1,519 for and 1,928 against.

Amendment #4 Bingo on a local option basis: 1,803 for and 1,901 against.

Amendment #5 Granting the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds: 972 for and 2,538 against.

Amendment #6 Granting the governor power to remove appointed officers with senate advice and approval: 1,957 for and 1,602 against.

Amendment #7 Authorizing private road work for counties of 5,000 or less: 2,148 for and 1,396 against.

Amendment #8 To change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals: 1,308 for and 2,021 against.

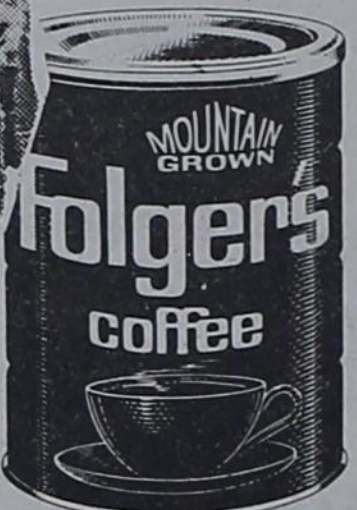
Amendment #9 Allowing spouses to have separate properties: 2,145 for and 1,393 against.

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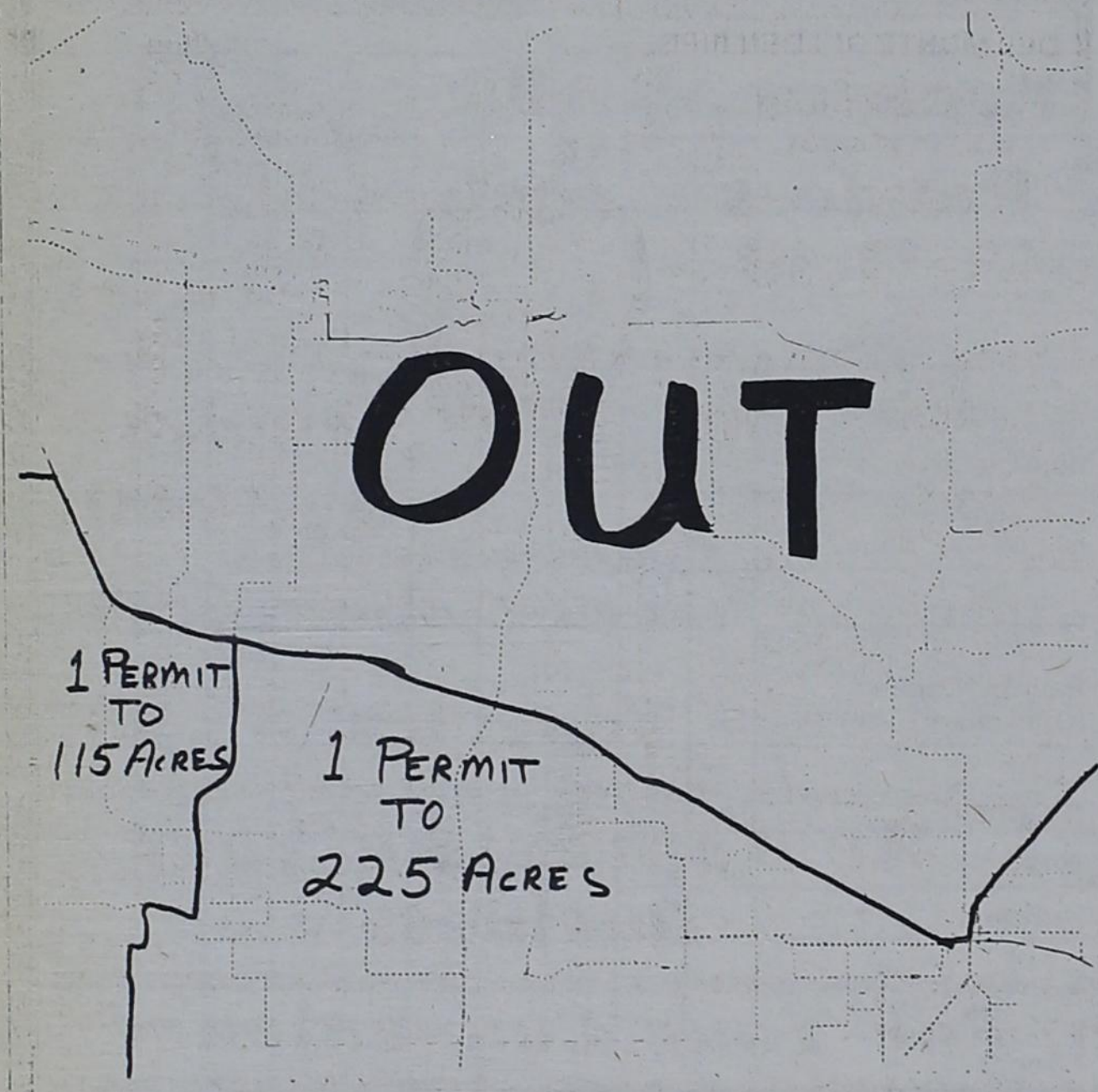

"The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits for Callahan County on Nov. 3, 1980 from 8-12 noon and 1-5 p.m. in the Sheriff's office. A map with antlerless deer permit issuance rates and issuance compartments will be posted in the Callahan County courthouse prior to the issuance date. To qualify for at least one permit, a landowner must own or control acreage at least equal to one half of the permit issuance rate of the compartment where the tract is located."

### Reduced Dosage Recommended

Recent major changes in the Texas brucellosis program include a reduced dosage of Strain 19 vaccine and a change in vaccination ages for heifer calves, explains Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The reduced dosage is believed to be as effective as the larger dose formerly given, say officials of the Texas Animal Health Commission. They point out that the larger dosage has been credited with causing some animals to be diagnosed as having brucellosis, when it may have been reaction to the vaccine itself.

"The reduced dose will help eliminate the confusion over levels of antibodies in the blood of the vaccinated animal," notes Gerngross.

Some animals have developed persisting residual blood titers after vaccination with the larger dose.

Titers, the agent explains, are measurements of antibodies resulting from vaccination or brucellosis infection. Titers induced by the vaccination using the reduced dose are lower and recede rapidly, although the degree of immunity is not different from that produced by the higher dosage.

With the reduced dosage comes a change in vaccination age. Previously, official calfood vaccination ages were 3 to 6 months for dairy heifers and 3 to 10 months for beef heifers. Now, the vaccination ages are 4 to 12 months for all heifer calves. The state will

provide funds for the vaccination of eligible calves.

Additionally, the use of whole herd vaccination is available for producers raising cattle in areas where there is a high risk of brucellosis. More details on this program are available from practicing veterinarians or the Texas Animal Health Commission.

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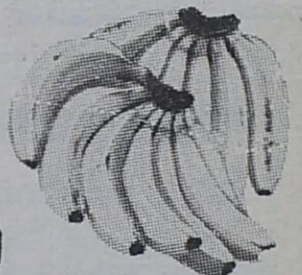
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# Junior Livestock Show FmHA Supplies Financial Aid Planned For Feb.

The Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will be held February 27 and 28, 1981, according to Jack Landers, chairman of the group.

According to the general rules and regulations of the show, all 4-H and FFA

projects must be certified to the County Agent or the Vocational Agricultural Instructors in the county.

Certification forms available from the County Extension office for 4-H members and from Vo. Ag. Instructors for FFA members.

Certification for all projects must be completed prior to December 1.

4-H'ers must be at least 8 years of age to compete in the county show and all exhibitors must be attending school in Callahan County. More information on the certification of projects is available from the County Extension office in Baird or one of the Vocational Agriculture Departments in Callahan County.

Temple, Texas received \$837 million during fiscal year 1980 in loans and grants by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Farmers Home Administration, (FmHA) supporting farms, home improvement and community development in rural areas, FmHA State Director, W. H. Pieratt, reports.

The agency's farm loan services, which supplement private credit available in rural areas, added \$524 million to Texas's resources for operation of farms during a year of emergency and commercial credit shortage for many farmers.

FmHA home loan programs accounted for \$134 million to build or improve 3,847 homes in town and countryside areas.

Loans and supplementary grants to improve rural community water, sewer, health, fire protection and other public facilities totaled \$78 million for 164 projects throughout the state.

FmHA's service in guaranteeing commercial loans for business and industry that employ rural people accounted for \$101 million in the year ended September 30.

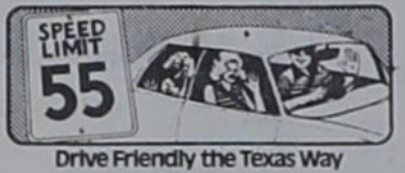
The Eastland FmHA office, which serves Callahan, Eastland and Stephens counties, provided \$3,940,230 for the various loans in fiscal year 1980.

W. H. Pieratt said FmHA's improvement as a multi-purpose rural financial agency, serving rural localities through county and district offices, has resulted in \$1.75 billion more farm credit and community development in rural Texas during the past two years.

The state director emphasized that FmHA has been given a lead responsibility in the system introduced this year to coordinate the Federal Government's rural development

assistance with goals adopted in local and regional areas of the states.

"This action to implement the Rural Development Act has provided a clear channel of communication from localities, through their state development organizations, to highest levels of Washington for finding resources to meet the greatest needs of rural areas," W. H. Pieratt said. Pieratt added, "We expect to further improve this system of cooperation during the coming year."

Navy Aviation Antisubmarine Warfare Operator 2nd Class Paul W. Cosson, son of Carl W. and Evelyn L. Cosson of Route 2, Box 241 Clyde, Texas, has helped his squadron earn the Battle Efficiency Award.

## FIRST METHODIST CHURCH CELEBRATES CENTINNIAL

The Baird First United Methodist Church will celebrate its centennial in a very special way November 8 and 9.

Festivities will begin at 5 p.m. with registration at the church. A sandwich supper will be held in conjunction with registration which will conclude at 7 p.m. Afterwards, the group will move to the sanctuary for a song service and a great time of fellowship.

Sunday school and the morning worship service will be conducted as usual. Guest speaker for the morning service will be Dr. John English, who served as pastor in Baird from 1946-1949.

Dr. English was admitted into the conference in 1938, became an elder in 1940, and retired in 1976 after 37½ years faithful service. During his ministry, English served as a District Superintendent. While pastoring the St. Marks Methodist Church in Midland in 1974,

Dr. English was forced to leave the ministry due to ill health.

Presently, he resides at Blackwell.

Following Dr. English's message, the congregation will proceed to the fellowship hall for a covered dish luncheon and the opportunity to visit with old and new friends.

Methodism came to Baird in 1879, a circuit from Belle Plains. In 1884, the present church was organized under the pastorate of B. J. H. Thomas. The group met in a rock building in west Baird.

In 1885, lots located where the present parsonage stands were deeded to the church by the Railroad Co. A long frame building was constructed there. In 1909, the Church was moved to the adjoining lot south where the present church now stands.

A new white brick church was built in 1923, under the pastorate of R. J. Rea,

and is still in use today.

No history would be complete without a list of pastors who played an important part in developing and securing a firm foundation for local Methodists to follow.

### F.M. 18 TO BE EXPANDED

Bids for improving a 2.7 mile section of Farm to Market Road 18 in Callahan County are expected to be received during November by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

FM 18 will be widened and resurfaced from Clyde southeastward 2.7 miles. The existing 18-foot roadway lanes will be widened to 24-foot lanes with six-foot shoulders.

The completed project will provide increased traffic capacity and a safer facility for motorists.

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# Joint Venture Auction Huge Success

The Joint Venture for Crippled Children auction for 1980 was an outstanding success, announced Dick Bowen, JVCC chairman.

Two oil wells were the focus at the second annual Joint Venture for Crippled Children oilfield equipment sale Wednesday, October 29, 1980.

The first was the "Black Gold Prospect," one-eighth interest in an oil well to be drilled this year in Nolan County, donated and auctioned by Abilene geologist John Chalmers, which sold for \$42,000 to

Wayne Moore - Guy McCarty and Associates.

The second was a model of a gold-plated pumping unit complete with production derrick, heater treater and stock tanks. The model, donated to the sale in 1979 by Gray Roberts of Triange Supply, has been designated as an "Annual Special." Purchaser, West Texas Marketing Corporation of Abilene, will keep the model for a year and return it to be sold in the 1981 JVCC sale.

In 1979, the model was purchased by Mr. and Mrs.

C. B. Taylor, re-donated and sold to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L. Brown. Purchase price this year was \$25,000.

Beneficiary in the sale of oilfield equipment, supplies, services and products is the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, a non-profit treatment facility for handicapped children and adults. More than 8,000 patients will receive treatment in 1980 without charge at WTRC's three campuses in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder.

Proceeds from Wednesday's Sale will add \$363,395 to the 1980 Joint Venture.

The JVCC kick-off event, the Bob Hope & Friends Benefit Dinner, brought more than \$119,000. The LaJet Golf Classic and cash donations, totaling more than \$294,255 will help WTRC to meet its \$2.7 million budget.

Donating their services and staff for the auction were auctioneers Col. Rocky Ash of Clyde and Col. Stiles Belcher of Albany.

One of the highest selling group of items was 176,000 gallons of diesel fuel sold for an average of 88¢ per gallon. This

fuel was donated by refineries throughout the nation for a total of \$154,880.

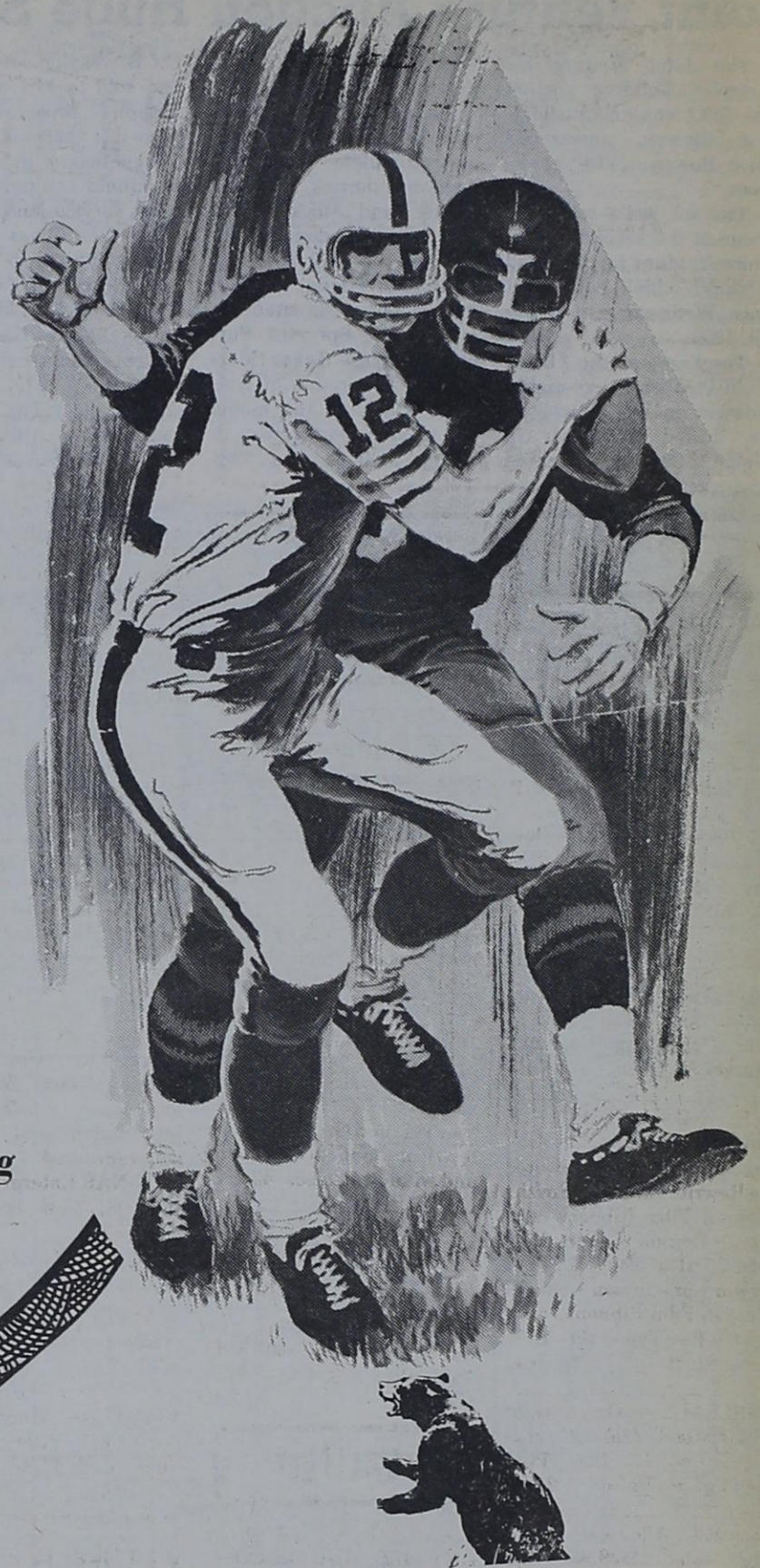

**Newcastle Disease Concerns Disease Committee**

Farmers and veterinarians should keep abreast of the African swine fever and exotic Newcastle disease situations, since these are the two foreign animal diseases most likely to get into the United States at this time. This advice comes from Marguerite B. Snyder, Baird, Texas, consumer member of the Secretary of Agriculture's Advisory Committee on Foreign Animal and Poultry Diseases, which met this week in Hyattsville, Md.

Concern over exotic Newcastle—a foreign disease affecting poultry and other

birds—was prompted by a recent outbreak in which movements of exposed cage birds into 45 states had to be investigated. African swine fever has become a major issue because this viral disease has become established in the western hemisphere for the first time, which makes the possibility of introduction into the United States a greater threat.

A recipient of numerous country music honors and recent nominee for four Country Music Association awards, Gatlin will join thousands of ACS volunteers in Texas to encourage smokers to give up their cigarettes for at least one day—November 20.

As part of the fourth annual one day event sponsored by the ACS nationwide, Texas is planning activities in most cities and towns to recruit smokers to commit to quit.

Rallies with local celebrities are planned in Fort Worth, Houston, Austin and San Antonio while Dallas is aiming at corporate involvement with over 40 major companies planning in-house promotions.



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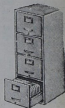
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
