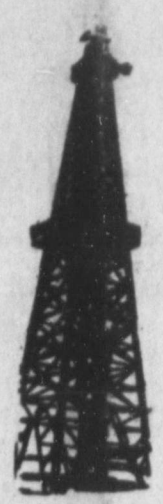

City of Jayton Sewer Grant Is Approved

WASHINGTON, D. C.-- Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of a \$5,025 Environmental Protection Administration grant to the City of Jayton for preparation of facilities plans and studies for wastewater treatment works construction. The total project cost is \$6,700 and the Federal grant amounts to 75% of this cost. Congressman Burleson has worked with Jayton City officials for the past several years in efforts to obtain financial assistance for this project through EPA and indicated gratification at this action.

School To Sponsor Adult Education Plan

The Jayton School is in the process of developing an adult education program. It is the desire and hope of the administration to offer the people of Kent County a program that is needed and beneficial to all. This program will be designed to meet vocational needs of adults and those who did not have the opportunity of attending or finishing school. The areas we are prepared to offer at the present are: Vocational, Wood Working, Welding, Auto Mechanics, Arts and Crafts (leather, ceramic), Typing, Business Machines. Basic Education for adults with limited education reading, writing, math. Advanced Secondary Education for adults studying for the G. E. D. test. The Jayton Jaybird Invitational Track Meet was held Friday, March 22nd with 13 teams competing in the meet. Although Jayton did not win the track meet, some of the boys did very well. Morris Attends Federal Land Bank Meeting

Coy Morris of Afton, has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Spur at the annual Stockholder's Meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston. The meetings, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 66 Federal Land Bank Associations located in Texas. There were about 500 persons in attendance at this meeting. Stockholders and guests heard President George W. Cunningham present his annual report to the stockholders in which he reported that in 1974, the 254 million dollars in loans closed were the most credit ever extended to Texas farmers and ranchers in a single year in the Bank's 57-year history. Also, those attending heard addresses by Governor Dolph Briscoe and Dr. James A. Byrd, Economist, First International Bancshares, Inc. of Dallas. The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term loans on farm and ranch property throughout Texas and is currently servicing over 35,000 loans for more than 867 million dollars. The Federal Land Bank Association of Spur makes and services loans in this area. Members of the Board of Directors are R. H. Farris, Jr., Crosbyton, Donald Wooten, Crosbyton, Arvil C. Do It Yourself Is TV Series Theme

"Do-It Yourself" Series to Premiere in Local Viewing Area. A weekly television series for local and area "do-it-yourself" will premiere on KTXS-TV (Ch. 12) at 11:30 a.m., Thursday April 12 for residents of Kent County and four surrounding counties. "You Can Do It" featuring hostess Cindy Kidwell, is a 13-part educational series on home care and repairs, aimed at helping viewers learn simple, money-saving techniques for home care and maintenance, according to its producers. Cablevision viewers in Spur will see the series on Channel 4 and viewers in surrounding counties will see it on the channel designated for KTXS-TV by their local cablevision companies. Surrounding counties include Stonewall, Fisher, Jones, and Some of Dickens counties. Viewers of the first program will learn how to do simple electric repairs. Other programs include how to make and use low-cost cleaners and how to repair leaky faucets. Also, viewers will learn how to make toilet repairs and adjustments, how to caulk and weather-strip, paint interiors and exteriors, repair walls and care for wood finishes and carpets. In addition, the series explains care and maintenance of ranges and refrigerators, and how to make storage space. "You Can Do It!" a 30 minute program, will be aired each Thursday for 13 weeks, starting on April 12. Sponsored in each county by the County Family Living Committee and KTXS-TV the series was created and produced by home economics specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System, through a special grant from the United States Department of Agriculture, for airing throughout the state. Viewers are urged to check local program listings during the series for any changes in programming.

Lady Jay Track Meet Draws Some Good Talent

The Lady Jays finished third in the Lady-Jay relays with some season best terms. The 880 relay (Vickie McMeans, Kathy McMeans, Debbie Baker and Valrie Panter) ran a 1:57.4 to improve their best of last week. By 1.1 second, Cindy Garcia threw the shot 34'3" for her season's best and Pam Trammel bettered her 880 run by .3 of a second in winning first. The mile relay consisting of Valrie Panter, Cindy Garcia, Debbie Baker and Vickie McMeans ran a 4:31.8 to better their time of last week by 13 seconds. Debbie Baker and Minnette Geeslin ran low 28's for their times in the 220 dash which were excellent times. In the junior division Danella Sartain won the triple jump with a fine 31'2".

Jaybirds Win The Roby Track Meet

The Jayton Jaybirds rolled up a total of 114 points to take first place in the Roby track meet over the weekend. Other point winners were Loraine 105, Hawley 70, Blackwell 64, Hermleigh 38, Rochester 37, Highland 19, Westbrook 8, Hobbs 4, Guthrie 4, and Trent 0. Point makers for the Jaybirds were: Senn, second in long jump. 440 relay team first 47.0. This is a new record. Jayton held the old record also at 47.4. Baker second in half mile or 880 yard run. Hanke second in 120 high hurdles. Billy Johnson first in 440 or quarter mile. 55.0 Senn second in 220 high hurdles. Garcia second in mile. Mile relay team second. The Jayton junior High team had a total of 78 points.

Five Finalists to Compete in Cook-Off

AUSTIN—Five Texans will compete for the championship in the state's annual chicken cook-off on July 31 at Austin's Municipal Auditorium, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced.

The winner will be sent to Winston-Salem, N. C., where he will vie for \$25,000 in prizes with representatives from 50 other states July 25 to 28 at the National Chicken Cook-Off Contest. Top prize will be \$10,000.

The Texas Broiler Council is sponsoring the state contest. "It is one of many ways Texas agricultural products are promoted," White said. State finalists will be selected from entries submitted to National Chicken Cooking Contest headquarters in Washington, D. C. Rules and entry forms are available at supermarkets. Entries must be postmarked April 1 and received by April 8.

Contestants must be at least 18 years old by July 25 and residents of the states they represent at the time of the national cook-off. Recipes must be prepared exactly as submitted and ingredients must include a fryer-fryer chicken whole, up or in parts. Trade ingredients described in the entry rules are required also.

The national contest is sponsored by the National Chicken Council.

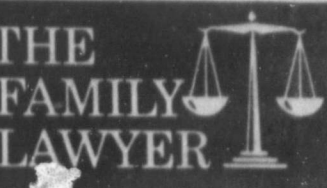

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots



Visit to Washington

Millions of American tourists will be visiting the nation's capital this year for a close-up look at their government. Although most of them won't realize it, they should be grateful for an unusual law called the Federal Tort Claims Act.

This Act, overturning the ancient doctrine that "the King can do no wrong," allows a citizen to hold the government liable in case he gets hurt on federal premises. For example, claims have been filed by:

a man who stumbled on uneven flooring in a Senate corridor;

a woman who skidded down the steps of the National Gallery of Art;

a woman who fell on ice behind the White House during a Christmas pageant; and,

a woman who slipped in the lobby of the Smithsonian Institute.



True, payment under the Act is not automatic. The victim must be able to establish some measure of fault on the part of the government.

ment.
Thus, a woman tourist who stepped into a hole beside the Washington Monument won her claim because she proved governmental negligence. It seems that some faulty plumbing, installed by a government crew, had undermined the paving and caused it to sink.

But a man who stepped into a hole near the Jefferson Memorial (at Cherry Blossom time) was denied damages because he had ventured into an area where the public was not supposed to go. The court said the government was not required to be as careful in places where visitors were not expected.

Of course, the Act applies equally to federal premises all over the country. You have its protection in courthouses and post offices, military bases and national parks.

In one case, a boy won damages under the Act after a wobbly mailbox toppled over on him. The court felt that the mailbox was a federal "place of business," just like the post office, and should be kept just as safe.

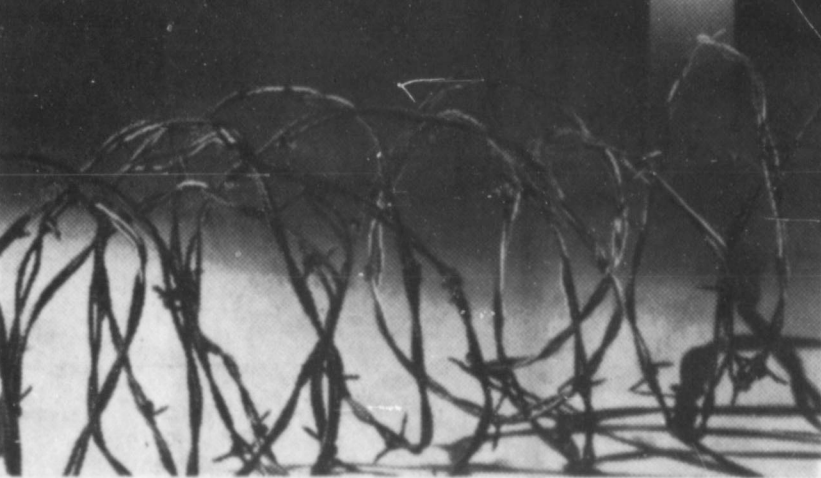

Guidelines Are Given For Voter Information

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or a General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974.

Blueberry Swirl Pie

1 10-ounce package frozen blueberries thawed
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
2 teaspoons lemon juice

1 8-ounce package cream cheese, softened
2 tablespoons sugar
-1-3 1/2 ounce package vanilla whipped dessert mix
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel

1 9-inch graham cracker crust, chilled
Mash undrained blueberries; add water, if necessary, to make one cup mixture. In small saucepan, combine the first 2 tablespoons sugar and the cornstarch; stir in blueberry mixture. Cook and stir over med-

ium heat till mixture is thickened and bubbly. Remove from heat; stir in lemon juice. Chill thoroughly. In mixing bowl, beat together cream cheese and the remaining sugar till fluffy. Prepare vanilla whipped dessert mix according to package directions; beat in cream cheese mixture and lemon peel. Spread half the cream cheese mixture in the prepared graham cracker crust. Carefully spoon on the chilled blueberry mixture, then remaining cream cheese mixture. With narrow spatula, swirl gently through cream cheese and blueberry mixtures to marble. Chill till serving time.



Italiane Broccoli

2 10-ounce packages frozen broccoli spears or 2 pounds fresh broccoli
1/2 teaspoon oregano, crushed
1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
1/4 cup shredded sharp process American cheese
1 tablespoon milk

Cook broccoli till tender in boiling salted water to which oregano has been added; drain. In top of double boiler, mix mayonnaise, cheese, and milk; heat over hot, not boiling water, stirring

till cheese melts and mixture is hot. Serve with broccoli. Makes 6 servings.
