### Longtime Haskell County Resident Passes Away

George Moeller, 84, longtime Haskell resident, passed away at 5:45 p. m. Sunday in Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient for the past four days.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, February 3, at 2:00 p. m. at the Trinity Lutheran Church, Haskell, with Pastor Sam Urrate officiating. Holden McCauley Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements, and interment was in Willow Cemetery.

Mr. Moeller was born April 22, 1885, in Roekensches, Germany, and came to this country with his parents at the age of 6 years. The family settled in Bartlett and in 1908 moved to Haskell County and settled in the Irby Community, where they farmed.

He first married Amanda Steiwert April 22, 1909, in Haskell. She died in 1925. Twenty years later he married Ella May White and retired from farming and moved into Haskell.

He was a charter member of Trinity Lutheran Church and the Sons of Hermann Lodge 241. Survivors include his wife; five daughters, Mrs. Edna Kubena of Munday, Mrs. Edna Thompson of Spur, Mrs. Alfon (Ella) Peiser of Haskell, Mrs. Felix (Lydia) Klose of Haskell, and Mrs. Eugene (Amanda) Teichelman of Sagerton; three sons, George J. and Walter, both of Haskell, and Edward of San Angelo; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Charley Redwine of Haskell and Mrs. Gaylon Head of Lubbock; two brothers, Charley of Haskell and Frank of Weinert; one sister, Mrs. Louise Brueggeman of China Springs; 20 grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

## Terry Kay Diggs Is Haskell High School's Betty Crocker Homemaker

Senior Terry Kay Diggs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry M. Diggs, on the basis of her score in the homemaking knowledge and attitude test taken by senior girls December 2nd, is Haskell High School's 1970 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. In addition to receiving a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the annual homemaking education program, Terry is now eligible for one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$110,000.

Other activities in which Terry participates are National Honor Society and Quill and Scroll Society. She was elected to Who's Who, Miss HHS, is editor of The Chieftain, and is the recipient of the 1968 Quill and Scroll English Sweater.

From school winners in the state, a State Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will

be selected within the next few weeks. The state winner will be awarded a \$1500 scholarship and the runner-up a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

This spring, the 51 Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join for an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. C. L. Max of the tour will be announced at the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Selected from the 51 finalists on the basis of original test scores and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will be awarded an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth-ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will also be chosen, and will receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Began by General Mills in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, the Betty Crocker Search is the only national undergraduate scholarship program exclusively for high school senior girls. During its 16-year history, more than seven million young women have participated in the program and scholarship awards, while this year's grants will total over \$1,700,000.

A record 656,041 senior girls in 15,040 of the country's high schools were enrolled in this year's Search.

## Texas Highway Dept. Planning To Proceed With Improvement On 277

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with development of the proposed highway improvements on U. S. 277 in Haskell County from F.M. 2163 in Haskell to the Knox County line.

Since the Bureau of Public Roads has approved the route proposed for this project, the Highway Department will begin work on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of the project.

The proposed improvement will provide for a four-lane highway. The usual construction will consist of an additional roadway of 24 ft. pavement, a usual 76 ft. depressed median, and right of way widened to 260 feet, except (1) on the section from F.M. 2163 to 1.5 miles North where the present highway will be widened to a 52 ft. pavement for a four-lane undivided highway with a 4 ft. painted median on the existing usual 100 ft. right of way, and (2) in the vicinity of Weinert where a

four-lane divided highway is proposed on a new location consisting of two 24 ft. pavements, a usual 76 ft. depressed median, and 260 ft. new right of way.

### Statement Issued By ASC Com. Chairman

William M. Reid, chairman of the ASC Committee of Haskell County, stated that the local office would not be mailing out 1970 cotton yield and payment notices as planned.

There will be an approximate 10-day delay, according to Mr. Reid. Producers will be asked not to sign-up in the 1970 cotton program until after they have received their notice.

Feed grain and wheat notices were mailed Friday, January 30, 1970. The 1970 period for these programs will be February 2, through March 20.

## Farmers And Ranchers Should Plan Minimum Tillage For All Cropland

"Frequent freezing of the soil during recent weeks has developed a powdered surface condition more subject to wind erosion," says Ernest L. Cowger, Soil Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the California Creek and Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

"Farmers and ranchers should plan minimum tillage for all cropland, leaving crop residues on or within the soil surface to reduce soil blowing to a minimum.

Tillage operations should be reduced to a minimum. Unnecessary trips over the land are expensive, compact the soil and break down the natural structure which results in loss of soil moisture needed for crop production.

Crop residues left on the soil surface or placed there, as a mulch, such as cotton burs, reduce wind and water erosion, increase absorption of rainfall, adds needed plant foods, in-

The Veterans Administration said today that thousands of disabled veterans are not taking advantage of valuable low-cost insurance available to them.

Administrator of Veterans Affairs, Donald E. Johnson, said that VA disability ratings result in more than 7,000 veterans being added to the rolls each month. When they are Johnson said, they are encouraged to apply for the special RH insurance with premiums so low that a 25-year-old veteran, for example, can start a \$10,000 insurance program for \$2.60 a month.

"Thus, \$10,000 RH and \$10,000 converted SGLI at standard rates allows disabled veterans an opportunity to carry \$20,000 insurance at comparatively low premiums. Many could not qualify for other insurance or could do so only at increased premiums," the VA chief pointed out.

RH National Service Life Insurance is available to veterans separated from service after April 24, 1951, who have been rated by the VA as having a service-connected disability.

Applications for RH insurance must be submitted within one year from the date VA establishes disability, and is available whether or not veterans have converted their Service-member's Government Life Insurance (SGLI) to a private policy after they got out of military service.

Disabled veterans are urged to get additional information from their local VA office as soon as possible after receiving disability rating. A legally appointed guardian or other person acting in a veteran's behalf may apply if the veteran is incompetent, Johnson said. VA insurance offices in Philadelphia or St. Paul inform

**THE LONG AND THE SHORT OF IT**

In a lifetime of experiencing changes in styles, I believe we have at the present time the most controversial ever. The criticism evolving from this controversy reveals most obviously the hypocrisy of some of our thinking.

The long of it, of course, is the long hair worn by many boys who are actually following a temporary trend or style as they have done through the ages. So why this resentment and even persecution on behalf of some parents, teachers and laymen? Some say it is because of the image it creates since it (the style) originated with, and among, the so-called hippies. We do know, however, that it did have a precedent among men. The Saviour of the world wore long hair and a beard. It was the custom of 'style' in that day. The Greeks, the Phoenicians, the Roman warriors of that day, the knights of England, the standard bearers, the representatives of justice in the 18th century, and even George Washington, the father of our country, along with our justities of that day wore long hair and in many instances, beards.

Now, let's analyze the 'short of it'. We refer to another popular trend or 'style', the mini-skirts and/or the 'bare look' worn by many mothers and most girls. Do we see and hear among these same parents, teachers and laymen the same

resentment? Do they prescribe the same persecution? If we are to qualify resentment of a style, by its origin, then from whence come the women's styles? We know no precedent of this style. Certainly it was not popular in Christ's time. It was not worn by mothers of great men of that day. It was not worn by the mothers of George Washington's era. In fact, there was no precedent unless it was worn by a certain element in Rome just before the fall of that empire almost 1,500 years ago.

This is certainly not meant as criticism, as such, of either men's or women's styles, but rather an evaluation of our biased and narrow views of one style as compared to the other. Simply because a few people wearing these styles have committed crimes or otherwise conducted themselves ungentlemanly or unladylike does not and certainly should not condemn all who wear them. We may remember Clyde Barrow, with Bonnie Parker, Pretty Boy Floyd and several outlaws of the time were wearing the styles of that day, which did not cause a general condemnation of that style. The knights of England, the standard bearers, the representatives of justice in the 18th century, and even George Washington, the father of our country, along with our justities of that day wore long hair and in many instances, beards.

When Ross Perot of Dallas was asked what he thought of long hair worn by men today, he said, "I believe every person

has a right to wear his hair as he likes it. As you know (and here he referred to his own crew-cut) my hair is considered just as extreme today as any other." We expect broad-minded statements from big men.

The over-all biased criticism from some areas, however, puts the boy, as well as the parents, in a defensive position of image projection in which the young man, sometimes, could care less; but the parents feel with acuteness, measured only in mores and bounds by the pressures, prescribed by some school teachers, Sunday School teachers, coaches and other people of personal influence in his environment. This is generally done in all sincerity by the ones 'dishing it out' for the good of the boy, and if carried out properly could accomplish just that, but so many times is applied so crudely it could be interpreted as nothing less than cruelty.

I just want us to ask ourselves a few questions like: Aren't we being a little unbalanced in the long and the short of it? Aren't we a little narrow and prejudiced in the realm of one extreme and maybe a little too tolerant in other areas? Are we really trying to help a young man through that awesome transition from boyhood or are we throwing debris in his pathway in the name of constructive criticism? If every young man is important in the eyes of God, why do some seem to delight in making some of these young men feel so insignificant? There is so short a time for the transition from boyhood to manhood, we sometimes wonder how they make it. In this day it is even harder than it was in our day because of the total involvement of every one in everything, there is this constant sense of pressures on a young man, which could be lessened by a word of encouragement from a teacher, a coach, a father's friend, or a neighbor.

A word of compassionate understanding at this period of a young man's life could possibly be the difference in his rebellion against, or his acceptance of, the establishment. The establishment, in most college student's minds, consists of all authority in general. The first seeds of resentment may be planted by anyone with authority who use it carelessly. Some people, in the position to do so, can't help showing contempt for some, preferential treatment for a few, and just average acceptance of the majority. In this area we could develop a sense of such importance, we might tend to 'play God', a role for which we are unquestionably unqualified and because of this malpractice of authority, a dormant urge to rebel, is built up within the young person to be released at the first opportunity which is sometimes as soon as he or she goes to college and feels he has the freedom to express himself.

We simply must revert to neighborliness in the area of concern for each other in every day life lest our living lives of competition, hypocrisy, and jealousy lead to a sort of 'dog-eat-dog' environment that can destroy us as a Christian nation. The real love in the hearts of the young has not been destroyed yet. Their frank and sincere honesty is almost embarrassing to some of us of the old school of deceit and hypocrisy, but maybe they will grow up some day and be able to project baseless values as we have done, then they will have bridged the generation gap.

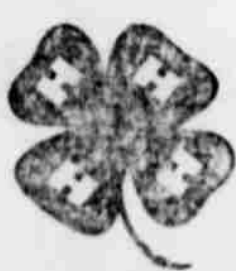
