## Haskell Fire Rate Is Hiked; Effective Nov. 1

AUSTIN: Haskell will have one-cent increase in fire insurance key rate, the State Board of Insurance announced, with the new rate going into effect November 1.

The State Board of Insurance set the key rate of Haskell at 32 cents, up from the present 31 cents.

The state agency arrives at the key rate through a system of charges for fire hazards and credits for fire prevention practices in the cities.

Haskell had a total of 36 cents in charges, due to deficiencies in the water works, water supply, tank and mains, fire department apparatus and alarm system, building laws and structural conditions and specific fire hazards. This was offset four cents by credits for a 100-gallon booster tank above requirements, a night watch service and arson reward, and for teaching the methods of fire prevention and principles of fire insurance in public schools. This brought the key rate to 32 cents.

## Routine Agenda For City Council

Haskell City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with a routine business agenda on tap. Attending were Mayor H. V. Woodard, W. O. Holden, Bud Ghoslon, Belton Duncan, and City Attorney Joe Williams, City Secretary Treasurer Ira Hester, and Roy Oliphant, City Water & Sewer Superintendent.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. On the agenda was hearing a report on a 1951 Dodge pickup; discussion of the lot near City Hall, presentation of the bills from October 13 through October 27; and looking into the possibility of renting or selling a place in the southwest part of the city.

No definite action was taken on the discussions. Bills were presented and approved for payment.

## Final Report Of Haskell Fair Reveals It's Biggest Success

A group of happy Haskell County Fair workers and their wives gathered Tuesday evening at 7:30 at Felker's Restaurant for a melt-in-your-mouth steak dinner, and one of the most successful financial reports ever given on the three-day event.

C. A. Thomas Jr., president of the 1970 Fair, and Rex Felker, executive secretary-treasurer for the organization, presided at head table. Invocation was given by Tom Kutch.

Thomas thanked each division head present for their fine help and cooperation and stressed that without the work of each individual in attendance, the Fair could not possibly have been a successful one. He emphasized the growth of the Fair,

and the desire for it to become—and continue to be—an event for the entire County, and area. Especially were Fair officials pleased with the willingness and thoroughness of the work done by helpers from every town in the County, and the many entries from the surrounding areas.

A complete list of all income and expenses on the 1970 Fair was distributed to those attending. Total receipts of \$5,944.06 were reported, and expenditures were \$3,827.43.

Plans were discussed on increasing premiums in some categories for next year, and other plans of expansion and improvement were suggested.

Forty people attended the dinner.

## Heavy Vote Expected In Tuesday Election

Haskell County voters will ballot Tuesday in the final major election of the year, when they will mark their choice for all nominees for public office nominated in the May and June primaries.

Turn-out of voters is expected to be fairly heavy, but is not expected to reach a record level since this is not a presidential election year; however, a couple of the seven proposed amendments to the constitution seem to be drawing quite a bit of interest.

Potential vote in Haskell County, based on registrations is 4,319, according to figures from the office of Jimmy Owens, Tax Assessor-Collector. Voting by absentee which began October 14th will end Friday, Oc-

tober 30.

The ballot carries three columns... Democrat, Republican, and Write-In. Then seven proposed amendments to the Constitution are listed in the "for" and "against" forms.

Balloting in Tuesday's election will be at all regular voting boxes in the county, with polls opening at 8:00 a. m. and closing at 7:00 p. m.

Election judges are asked to bring, or telephone the results as soon after the polls close as possible to the office of County Clerk, Mrs. Lee McKelvain. The telephone number is 854-2451.

### Amendments

The seven proposed amendments to the Constitution follow:

Amendment No. 1: Amending Article V, Section 1-a, of the Texas Constitution, relating to removal, retirement, or censure of justices, judges and justices of the peace under prescribed circumstances.

Amendment No. 2: Amending Article XVI, Section 20, Sub-section (a), to authorize the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis.

Amendment No. 3: Authorizing the legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment or ranch, farm, and forest lands to support the raising of livestock or to produce farm and forest crops.

Amendment No. 4: Amending Article III, Section 5-b, Sub-

section (a), to reconstitute the State Building Commission as a three-member appointed commission.

Amendment No. 5: Authorizing any county to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county under certain conditions.

Amendment No. 6: Amending Article XVI, Section 51, to increase the value of the homestead exempt from forced sale from \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Amendment No. 7: Authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating offices and functions by contract between political subdivisions in any county.

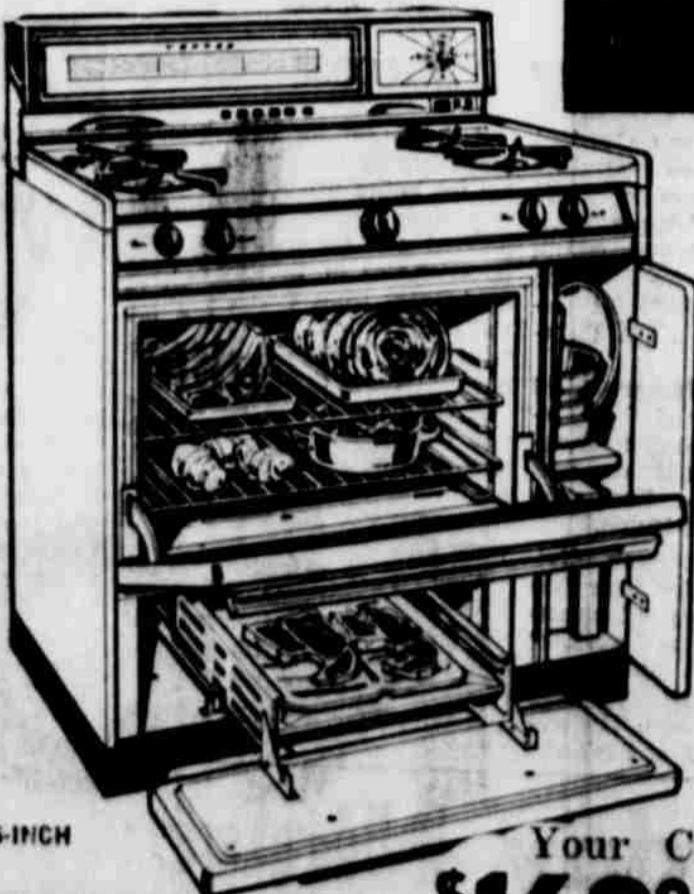

### Eight Rural Accidents Investigated In Haskell County During September

Total number of persons injured in traffic accidents has increased from 69,000 in 1959 to 223,000 in 1969. Total number of persons killed in traffic accidents has increased from 2,410 in 1950 to 3,551 in 1959.

### County Bond Sales Reach 42% Of Goal

September sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Haskell County totaled \$9,280,000 according to a report from R. W. Herren, Chairman of the Haskell County Savings Bonds Committee. A total of \$92,779.00 has been purchased in this county since January 1. This figure represents 42 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$220,000.

Texans purchased \$15,033,393 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to \$14,480,583 for the same period a year ago—an increase of 3.8 per cent. Sales for the nine-month period were \$136,303,218 for 76 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million.

Nationally, new purchases of Series E and H Bonds totaled \$351 million, 9.4 per cent above 1969 sales of \$321 million. The first nine month sales were \$3,501 million—3.9 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$182 million were reported for the first nine months—a 29 per cent increase over the \$141 million exchanged during 1969.

The speaker urged those present to write to the presidents of the various Asian countries asking them to abide with the rules of the Geneva Convention relative to prisoners or war. He read and distributed sample copies of letters which could be used as a pattern.

Lt. Commander Ogle concluded his presentation by showing a five-minute film based on the prison camps of North Vietnam and stated that to date fifteen hundred men are reported to be missing in action, but that we only have knowledge that some four hundred of these men are actual prisoners, some as long as six years duration.

Invocation was given by Bill Ratliff and the singing was led by Prexy Bob Herren, with Gail Barnett at the piano.

Abe Turner introduced the guests who were John Parish of the Ford Motor Company, guest of J. B. Gipson; John Cooley, guest of Roy Wiseman, and student guests, Dale McFadden, Gerald McDonald and pianist Gail Barnett.

## Forms For Retired People Are Now Available At The IRS Offices

The form for retired people and others to request withholding of Federal income tax on pension and annuity payments is now available at Internal Revenue Service offices, Ellis Campbell, Jr., IRS District Director for Northern Texas, announced.

New IRS regulations permit retirees to request withholding on annuities and pension payments made on or after January 1, 1971.

The withholding provisions do not apply to annuities that are wholly exempt from Federal taxation, such as social security benefits and Veterans Administration pensions, Mr. Campbell said.

Form W-4P, Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding, should be filled out by the retiree and sent to the bank, insurance company or other payer from which he receives his annuity or pension payment.

Since payers do not have to begin withholding until three months after the Form W-4P is filed, retirees who want withholding to begin next January should file Form W-4P with the payer of annuities and pensions by October 1, 1970. Payers may

begin withholding anytime after they receive the Form W-4P but not before January 1, 1971.

Mr. Campbell said withholding must be in a whole-dollar amount and must be at least \$5 a month. Withholding, however, cannot reduce below \$10 the amount of pension or annuity payment which the retiree person receives.

The firm making the payment is required to withhold income tax if the retiree requests that it be done. However, withholding is optional on the part of the retiree.

A firm that withholds tax on an annuity will give the IRS and the retiree a special withholding form showing the amount of the annuity and tax withheld. This form will be available after January 1, 1971, Mr. Campbell said.

Through voluntary withholding, retired persons will be able to avoid having to make quarterly payments of estimated tax to keep their tax payments current.

### INCOME TAX WITHHOLDING

It is a pretty good idea to sit down now, before the end of the year, and figure out whether your income tax withholding is going to cover you on April 15. The tax folks say that most taxpayers prefer for the government to owe them, rather than take any chances on having to pay extra. Many families are faced with a real tragedy when they find that both Mom and Dad claimed the same dependent on their Form W-4. On the other hand, it is not too late to cut down the excess refund by reducing your withholding now. If you have had a major increase in your itemized deductions, if you have already had a hurricane or tornado loss, paid for a major medical expense, or paid an unusually large contribution to your church, you may want to reduce your withholding by see-

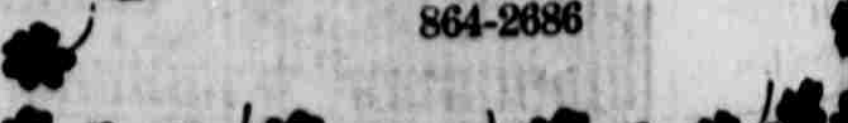

**BEHIND THE MIRAGE**

Remember the good old days when glib economists and money managers spoke of a "little inflation" as a good thing? Not so surprisingly, this kind of economic quackery appears to be passing out of vogue, and for good reason. People are beginning to realize where a little inflation can lead.

A recent authoritative projection based on trends of the last year or so has come up with the following figures: "If inflation continues to run at six per cent a year (compounded) for the next 30 years, a person earning \$10,000 today will need \$57,000 for the same standard of living then. Today's \$20 bag of groceries will then cost \$115. A TV set now selling for \$500 will cost nearly \$2,900. An auto with a current price tag of \$3,000 will go over \$17,000. A \$25,000 home will jump to more than \$147,000."

This is the hard-rock reality that lies beneath the purple mirage of a little inflation. It can wreck the financial security and independence of everyone except the few who always manage to survive and thrive in the chaos of monetary disaster.
