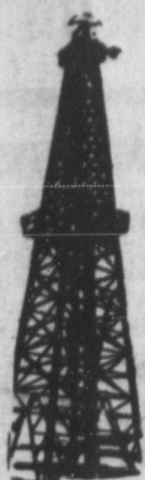

Commissioners Court Has Monday Meeting

In a meeting of the Kent County Commissioners last Monday, the following orders were passed, according to the minutes in the office of the county clerk:
On motion by Parks, seconded by Taylor, the county Treasurer's report was approved. This was for the period from July 1, to Sept. 30th.
On motion by Taylor seconded by Byrd, an order was passed to purchase two pickups for the road department.
On motion by Carriker, seconded by Byrd, a pickup was purchased from Robert Hall Chevrolet for the road department on low bid of \$4,072.66 each.
On motion by Carriker seconded by Parks, an order was passed to purchase additional shelving for the clerk's office on low bid of \$1,339.32.
On motion by Byrd, seconded by Carriker, voted to hire Don Benningfield road department employee, at a starting salary of \$583.00 per month.
George Taylor made a motion to hire Clifford Scott road department employee at a starting salary of \$3.00 per month. This motion died for the lack of a second.
Sarah Byrd made a motion to hire William Edwards road department employee at a starting salary of \$3.00. This motion died for the lack of a second.

A group of criminal justice experts meeting in Washington recently agreed, generally, that crime in the United States will not significantly decline until families and churches do a better job of teaching young Americans to obey the law, and until society is willing to give up some individual rights in exchange for a safer nation.
The courts are now so overly concerned with the rights of criminals, in a well-meaning crusade against injustice for the lawbreaker, the rights of victims are often overlooked in the process, it was noted.
And the demeaning of normal home life, wifehood and motherhood, and the declining influence of the churches, mean less moral indoctrination and teaching for more and more youngsters—who instead get their ideas and morals increasingly from commercial television, which, of course, teaches crime in color for hours every day of the year.

The Jayton Jaybirds Win Impressive 41-0 Victory Over Hawley

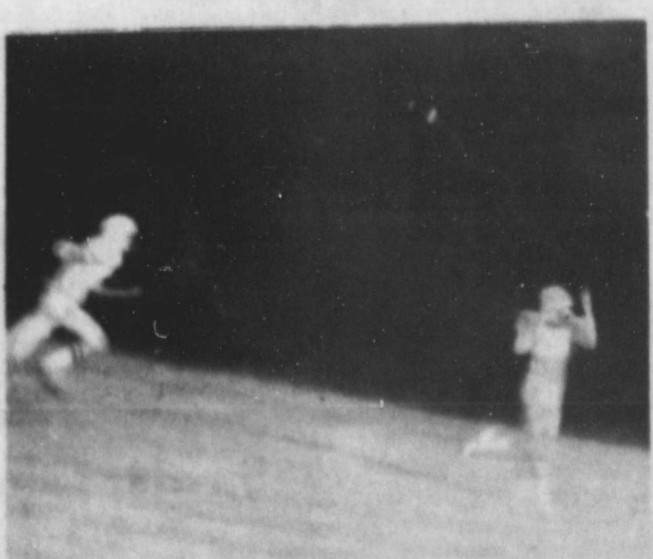

As one famous comedian would put it, Jayton had one boy in the Jayton-Hawley game Friday night who did not want to play with the others. Every time they gave him the ball, he stuck it under his arm and ran to the other end of the field with it.
In beating Hawley 41-0, the Jaybirds mixed things up pretty well, using the pass, and other runners, to take part of the load off All Stater Mark Fincher.

Fincher scored three times, on 2, 58, and 15 yard drives.
Quarterback Bobby Kelley threw scoring aeriels for three touchdowns, once to Deral Cox, once to Billy Wilson and once to Gene Cleveland. Also in the scoring Fincher added three extra points by the kick, and 2 points running.
Once Hawley got into the end zone as they broke loose their big 240 lb. fullback, but a clipping penalty brought it back.

Once Hawley completed a pass deep in Jaybird country, but after the completion there was a fumble and the Jaybirds took over again.
In statistics, Jayton led in first downs 19-10. Jaybirds rushed for 277 yards, against 98 for the Bearkats. In the passing department, Jayton picked up 128 yards and Hawley moved for 43 yards.
They Jaybirds lost two fumbles while the visitors were losing 6.
Jayton is now 4-1 for the season and 2-0 in district. The Jaybirds will be on the road the next two Fridays, going to Sands this Friday, and to Roby next week.
Kickoff time at Sands Friday night 8 o'clock.

Representative Otis Pike (D-NY) has charged that the Central Intelligence Agency is so bogged down in upper-level infighting and bureaucratic indigestion it can't function effectively to safeguard national interest. Pike has suggested it's incapable of warning the nation against a surprise attack.

No one can be sure whether the CIA could warn of impending attack or not. In 1941 our intelligence services, admittedly less grandiose than today, failed to give warning even though there were strong indications of Pearl Harbor, and even though at least one enterprising junior officer knew what was about to happen and found himself unable to convince superiors.

Pike's attack is welcome because a hard look at the CIA is obviously in order in the light of certain nefarious operations it has carried out in recent years. The former chairman of the House committee checking on the CIA resigned, frustrated, and Pike, something of a sharp-edged sword among his fellows, is out to fight the battle.

The issue is whether Congress should be given access to all the secrets and secret operations of the CIA. The President and CIA chiefs in the past have greatly feared this—since politicians have a notorious habit of spilling the beans for headlines and publicity. Yet if Congress is to oversee the agency, it must have the facts.

The answer probably lies in both giving the President added responsibility and giving Congress more information. At a White House confrontation with President Ford, Pike agreed, in effect, to go slow if the President personally checks on issues at hand and assures Congress all is well. (Pike has threatened to take his case to the courts, in contempt of Congress actions, and may still do so.)

Checking on the CIA is a difficult responsibility. Top secrets cannot always be turned over to Congress; yet there must be effective supervision and control. The President and Congress must, cooperatively, devise a workable system in the national interest without regard to politics.

which is an enemy sub killer, or an attack submarine, rather than a missile carrier.
But even though this is a year when new ships begin to arrive, the Navy is watching a greater expansion of the Russian Navy with uneasiness, especially in the missile ship and submarine categories.
The Air Force, on which so much depends, and which gets more money than the other two services, has turned to lightweight fighters (which some feel may not equal the MIG-25) in addition to very costly fighters. It is still promoting the B-1 and the close-support A-10, both of which are suspect in the eyes of many in Capitol Hill.

The critical question is whether NATO and U.S. forces in Europe could stop those 20,000 to 30,000 tanks the Russians and eastern Europeans could launch across the North German plain if a showdown crisis arose.

There are reports the Air Force has no plans to put the highly-publicized A-10 close support aircraft in Europe, which is a puzzle, if this aircraft is all it's been cracked up to be. The Army's helicopters certainly can't stop such a number of tanks.

That leaves the U.S. in the dubious role of either using tactical nuclear weapons first or being chased out of Europe. Until NATO has more tanks, and necessary numbers of expensive, tank-killing aircraft and missiles in place in Europe, the odds get steadily worse for NATO in a conventional confrontation.

Dining In Smoke

On the west coast a number of restaurants have begun seating non-smokers in areas where smokers won't be able to becloud the atmosphere. It's welcome progress to all irritated by tobacco smoke.

In light of recent revelations that smoke which has not been inhaled is more harmful than that inhaled (filtered), the practice of setting aside non-smoking areas in restaurants should become widely utilized.

Many times a conflict of interest causes problems, when you have two groups of people, each trying to do a good job in its own area of operation—but this conflict of interest creates a real problem, and hinders each in his activities.

This is a situation very apparent right now in Lubbock. The police department has its hands full, investigating crime within its borders, including burglaries, rapes, and murders. The police department seems to think the right thing for them to do is to "sit on" any information they may have in connection with their investigations, and particularly to withhold any information from the daily newspaper.

One of their cries, and sometimes the cry of the prosecutors, and the judges, is not to let the cases be tried in the newspapers.

On the other hand, the prime, number one dedication and motivation of the Lubbock Avalanche Journal, and any newspaper for that matter, is to get all available news and give it to the people. Their number one concern, and their very lifeblood is hinged on "the public's right to know."

About six weeks ago there was a brutal bloody murder in south Lubbock. The policemen, charged with the investigation of this murder have refused time and time again to comment on the evidence in the case to reporters from the daily paper.

The newspaper, not to be outdone, has had an article on the murder and its investigation on page one of its paper every day since the murder. Day after day their reporters contact the police department detectives, to hear them say day after day "no comment."

If the police really feel it is in the interest of criminal investigation and justice to withhold their evidence from the news media, that is their prerogative. But as it has been said in a cliché now very common "if they can't stand the heat they had better stay out of the kitchen!"

Facing up to the conflict, the Avalanche Journal is pushing them to the very hilt, and reporters have orders, we learn, to not miss a day, but to constantly keep the story before the people.

Recently Lubbock chief of police Alley, told a group of people the publicity given the case, is demoralizing his department, and possibly hindering the investigation. Maybe that is true, but I have nothing but praise and admiration for the newspaper for their dogged day after day pushing the issue.

My guess is that the newspaper staff knows much more about the evidence in the case than has been published—information which they gained, not from the police, but from their investigation, and it may well be that when the case is broken, it will be the news hounds at the Avalanche-Journal that bust the case, rather than the police.

In years past, it has been facts that have been dug up by reporters, who refuse to quit when the police tell them "no comment" but continue and actually dig up the facts that lead to arrest, trial and conviction.

When the Avalanche Journal does dig up the information that will spell guilt for someone, the police will anxiously take the information—and then list this case in its history book as one which they solved.

Newspapers have to be able to take the raps from public officials who don't want to cooperate with them, and keep on pounding away, and it nearly always proves out that the papers have been right all along.

Do you remember how the Nixon Administration howled and whined about the Washington Post and "its insistent lies" in the Watergate exposee? And how the newspaper just kept on writing, and charging—and then when the truth is out, it proves they were right all along. Just think what a great coverup it would have been, if the Post Writers had ducked their tails and quit when the Nixon People tried to intimidate them.

Yes, the police and the prosecutors may be right in contending it is in the good of justice to withhold evidence from the press—but you may be sorry for the day when the newspapers back off, and let them get by with it.

When this day comes, we will be very nearly approaching a police state.

Our free society hinges on the freedom of the press, and the fact newspapers will not relent, regardless of what the provocation may be when it comes to the public's right to know.

Hats off to the staff of the avalanche Journal. It may be the same old stale story every day, but I shall continue to look for the discussion of the Williamson case every morning, while I drink my coffee, until the police either comes out with the facts, or solves the mystery.

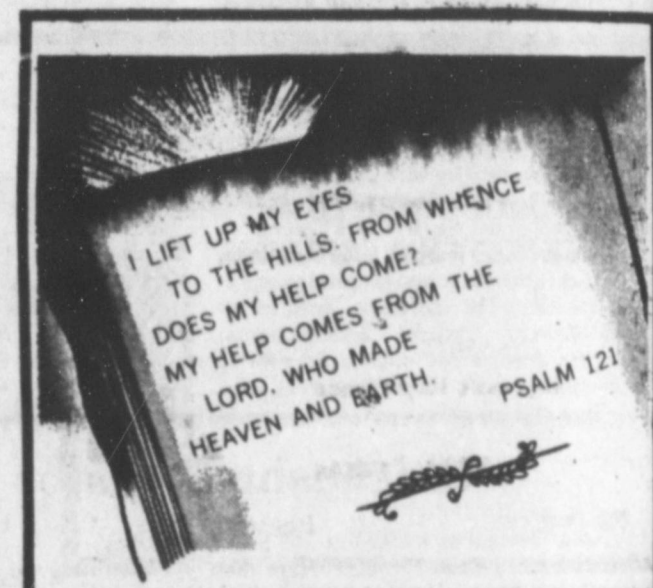

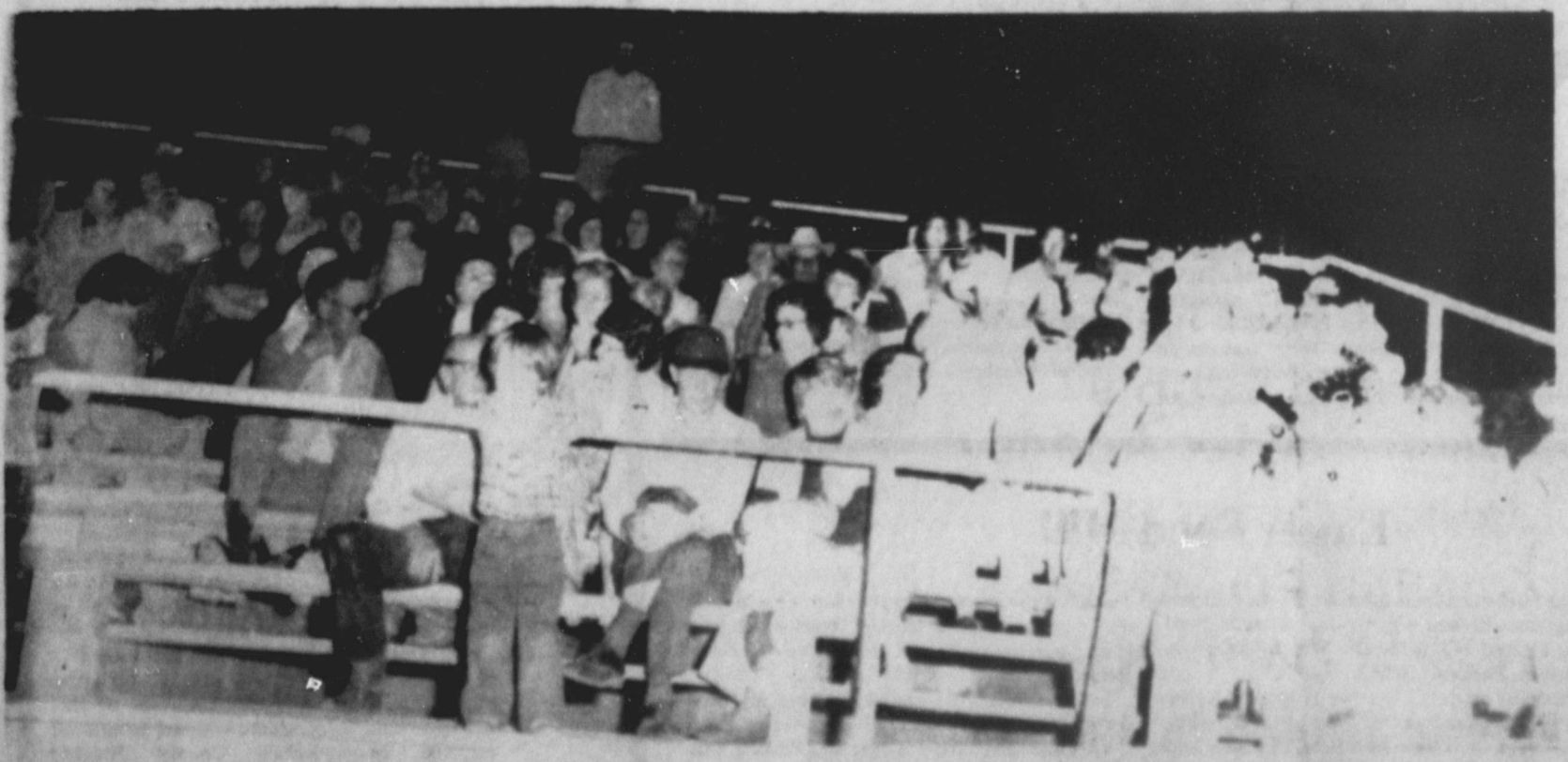
NEWS REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

U.S. & Russia-Arms Production-Arms in Being-The Future-

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Despite the fact that the Defense Department is getting more of the budget pie than any other federal agency, the United States is falling further and further behind Russia in conventional and nuclear arms.
Though the U.S. Army has improved in morale and organization since the Vietnam war, and the new Ranger brigades are considered highly capable, still U.S. tanks lag in production, and probably in quality.
U.S. tank production is, at best, about 500 a year. The Russians are thought

to be producing 8,000 tanks annually, and theirs may be better tanks. The U.S. Army still has not standardized its rifle with NATO forces. It's helicopter concept is good for supply and in time of complete air superiority but the helicopter is highly vulnerable and the Army's tank destroying missiles are still far from what they should be.

The Navy this year is accepting from various building yards several new kinds of frigates, destroyers and missile ships. It is also taking delivery of a new type submarine,

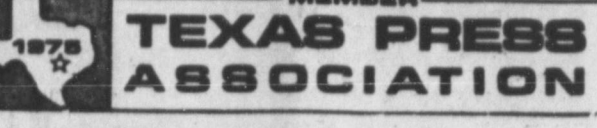
