COURT AWARDS \$150,000 TO WIDOW AND FOUR CHILDREN

A Munday widow and her four children received \$150,000 Friday in Fort Worth Federal Court resulting from a damage suit filed last June following the death of the husband and father, Wayne Josselot.

Mrs. Josselot and her children had sued General Motors, Chevrolet Division, for \$1,202,074, alleging that the death of her husband March 21, 1969, was caused by a fire which broke out in the cab of his pickup truck and that the fire was caused by faulty construction of the filter neck and fuel tank of the truck.

The incident occurred on a farm road three miles southwest of Weinert.

The award was made at a hearing before Judge Leo Brewster. The case had been set for jury trial in Abilene federal court June 1.

Mrs. Josselot was awarded \$110,000 in damages and each of her four children received \$10,000.

The Abilene law firm of Scarborough, Black, Tarpley and Scarborough and District Attorney Royce Adkins of Haskell, represented the Josselot family.

State Library Consultant Calls At Haskell

Miss Vanita Lee, Field Consultant on the staff of the Texas State Library met with the Library board members and friends of the library here, Friday, March 20th.

Miss Lee's office is in Stephenville and 58 counties make up this West Central Texas Region. New in the position of Field Consultant, Miss Lee came to gather information about the status of the Haskell County Library in terms of financial support and characteristics and interests of the patrons served by the local library. She also suggested various ways in which the local library could grow and suggested some standards it should strive to reach.

Miss Lee stressed one important point especially which will affect Haskell County residents seriously, for example that the new and presently separating statewide inter-library loan network, by mail and Telex, can give an individual access to tens of thousands of public and college library books in Texas, will not be open indefinitely to patrons of libraries which do not meet minimum state standards locally.

Clearly Haskell County residents cannot afford to fail to develop their public library, she indicated.

Opening of bids on a new fire truck was one of the main items of business on the agenda at the regular meeting of the city council, Tuesday night. Low bidder on the chassis was the Bill Wilson Motor Company of Haskell. Low bid on apparatus was Fire Appliance Company of Texas.

Belton Duncan reported that the Airport project was progressing about as fast as possible.

Council voted in favor of re-investing Water and Sewer Improvement Certified Deposit.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, and bills were presented from March 10, 1970 to March 24, 1970.

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City Sales Tax Goes Into Effect April 1

On December 15, 1969, qualified voters of Haskell marched to the polls and adopted the one per cent sales and use tax by a vote of 222 for, to 143 against.

Under the state law which cities are given the right to collect the one per cent sales tax, the levy here will become effective April 1, 1970.

The tax will be collected at the same time the state tax is paid. Merchants will remit all the money to the state, and the state in turn will pay the city.

Conservative estimate is that the city of Haskell will receive between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year from the source.

The additional one-cent tax will strengthen services and help finance much needed capital improvements for Haskell.

Dr. James Frank Cadenhead, Haskell, has been re-elected to active membership in the American Academy of General Practice, the national association of family doctors.

Re-election signifies that the physician has successfully completed 150 hours of accredited postgraduate medical study in the last three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, is the only national medical group that requires members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., has been instrumental in the establishment of a new primary medical specialty in family practice. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's postgraduate education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

In 1888 to 1923 Northwood turned his talents to developing colored glass for mass production. His first successful products were advertised as "Golden Iris," "Pomona," "Florentine" and "Venetian Blue." He used the grape pattern and peacock design. His glass was marked with the letter N (underlined). Some collectors mistake this mark to mean Nancy glass which was made in Nancy, France.

Mrs. Holt displayed a table of beautiful pieces of Carnival glass. She discussed each article explaining the design and coloring.

"Haskell County Conservation Needs" Inventory Completed," Yeary Says

About two-thirds of our state's land still needs soil and water conservation treatment. State Conservationist Clyde W. Graham of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, revealed this week.

Graham said that although many critical conservation problems have been solved in Texas in the last 30 years, some 103 million acres of the State's 360 million acres of rural lands still need conservation treatment. The figures came from county data prepared by state and federal agencies, then summarized by a state committee chaired by SCS.

"Much of this 103 million acres has had some conservation treatment, yet it still needs one or more conservation measures," Graham pointed out. "And most of this land needs treatment every year—especially cropland."

Graham said that in terms of acres, grassland improvement is still the state's biggest conservation problem. He cited these grassland needs: About 50.6 million acres need brush control followed by careful management, including periodic rests. Some 22.3 million acres of this land has deteriorated to the extent that reseeding is needed after the brush is controlled. Graham stressed, however, that when brush is controlled on grassland, wildlife needs should be considered carefully. He said strips or motts of brush should usually be left for wildlife food and cover.

Some 19 million acres of grazing lands need only improved grazing use. This is land that has been grazed too closely but still has a stand of desirable grasses; all it needs for improvement is better management.

About 13.2 million acres need both rest and better grazing use to let the base grasses improve in vigor and increase soil cover.

In addition to the 22.3 million acres of land that need seeding after brush control, there are some 4.3 million acres of other grassland that need seeding or sodding. There are also 1.1 million acres of cropland and 1.3 million acres of former cropland that need to be planted to permanent vegetation. This totals 29 million acres of land in Texas that needs planting to grass or trees.

The inventory breaks the state's 35 million acres of cropland down into dry cropland, irrigated cropland, and other cropland, such as orchards and land formerly cropped. Some 22.3 million acres of cropland needs treatment.

The state has 25 million acres of dry cropland, 7 million acres of which need protection with cover crops or crop residues. Some 5 million acres need terraces, diversions, or waterways as well as cover from residues or growing crops.

Out of 8.3 million acres of irrigated land, 3.7 million acres need an improved irrigation system to prevent erosion or water loss.

The survey shows Texas has 22.7 million acres of forest land of which 9.2 million acres need conservation treatment for soil protection and to improve forest stands.

The study also shows that pressure for urban growth is steadily cutting into the state's rural lands. During the 1958-1967 decade, agricultural land

in Texas dropped by some 780,000 acres, or an area bigger than an average Texas county. About 500,000 acres of this went to urban areas, some went to federal uses, and lesser amounts went under water in ponds and reservoirs.

Summaries of the state study are available from SCS offices, soil and water conservation districts, and from most other state and federal resource agencies. Local county reports are also being prepared by county inventory committees. The complete state inventory showing major land uses and conservation treatment needs by land capability classes for the state as well as each county will be published later this year, Graham said.

J. C. Yeary, Jr., District Conservationist, SCS, of Haskell, added that Haskell County Conservation Needs Inventory was completed and published this week. Not enough copies of the Haskell County Report were published for community distribution, but Yeary said that the data contained in the report was released to all governmental agencies in the county that deal with agriculture. Yeary said in the Haskell Work Unit of the report that the data was on file SCS, and would be made available to anyone desiring the information upon request.
