Check Ends 15-Year Quest For Reservoir

AUSTIN—The voice of L. B. Patterson Sr., of Munday, broke as he was handed a check for \$986,250.00 Friday by Chairman Marvin Shurbet of the Texas Water Development Board.

The blue state warrant was a loan from the Water Development Fund to the West Central Texas Municipal Water Authority to finance land buying for the reservoir on Millers Creek.

The project has been before the Texas Water Rights Commission, the legislature, the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Water Development Board many times. It has been the subject of several elections in the cities involved.

Haskell Gets First Check City Sales Tax

The City of Haskell has received its first check in the amount of \$9,978.00 from the one per cent sales and use tax which went into effect April 1.

The above amount represents the quarter ending June 30.

On December 15, 1969, qualified voters of Haskell marched to the polls and adopted the tax.

Under the state law, which cities are given the right to collect the one per cent sales tax, the levy here became effective on April 1.

The tax is collected at the same time the state is paid. Merchants remit all the money from the sales tax to the state, and the state in turn pays the city.

The loan was to the West Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. The lake to be built will supply Haskell, Munday, Goree and Knox City.

Mayor Woodard stated that the City received a check Monday of this week in the amount of \$21,136.75 from the Texas Aeronautics Commission on the application grant for the Airport.

The speaker said the Planning and Zoning Committee is putting in a lot of time concerning planning and zoning to protect property owners and that further information concerning the work of this commission would be forthcoming.

In closing, Mayor Woodard urged everyone to take an active part in the upcoming Haskell County Fair October 1, 2 and 3.

Bud Pogue presided over the meeting. Gene Long led the singing with Suzanne Thomas at the piano, and the invocation was voiced by Rev. Aubrey Headstream.

Rites Are Held For Willard Jones, Former Haskell Free Press Publisher

Willard Jones, former Haskell Free Press publisher, passed away at 8:00 p. m., Saturday, of an apparent heart attack, at his ranch home, the Lazy J Ranch, north of Medina.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 a. m. Monday at the Hamlin Funeral Home in Hamlin, with the Rev. James Rogers officiating. Burial was at 5:00 p. m. in the Snyder, Texas Cemetery.

Jones entered the newspaper field in 1917 when he started as printer's devil (apprentice) on the Wise County Messenger at Decatur. He later bought the Messenger, then sold it to purchase the Lufkin Daily News in 1927.

In 1929 he sold the Lufkin newspaper and bought the Snyder News in 1929. The News was consolidated with the Scurry County Times, which was later sold.

While in Snyder he was named president of the Snyder Chamber of Commerce. In 1942 he was named a director in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

In 1946, Mr. Jones and his brother-in-law, H. G. Lackey, purchased the Hamlin Herald.

the Haskell Free Press and the Texas Spur. Jones and Lackey dissolved their partnership in 1950, with Jones taking the Hamlin and Haskell newspapers and Lackey keeping the Spur publication.

Jones sold the Haskell newspaper to Jetty V. Clare in 1950.

In Hamlin, Mr. Jones served as mayor, president of the Lions Club, a director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, director of the Hamlin Board of Community Development, and deacon and Sunday School superintendent of First Baptist Church.

Mr. Jones retired in 1960 after 43 years in the newspaper business.

His survivors include his wife; a son, June Jones of Abilene, who operated the Hamlin Herald until 1957 when he moved to Abilene, where he owns a commercial printing business and works for the Reporter-News; and a daughter, Mrs. Dick Rollins of Abilene.

(Cont. from Page 1, Section 1) James Nicolis of Fort Worth, engineer for the project; Peter M. Tart, of Dallas, bond attorney; and Frank McMahon, fiscal advisor for the authority.

Howard Boswell, executive director, Danny Burger, development and fund manager, and W. E. Tinsley, vice chairman, all of the Water Development Board, came to the new state finance building for the meeting.

It followed approval of the bonds as to legality by Attorney General Crawford Martin and registration by Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. Earlier the water rights commission had approved engineering feasibility and revised a permit for reduced size of the reservoir to fit financing ability.

The water development board will buy a share in the reservoir and make a loan for another portion. A federal grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development will also aid the project. The state portion of the reservoir will be available for purchase by the authority when needed for more water development.

Patterson said he had missed only part of one meeting since the first organization gathering. But he obviously is not calling the job finished. He told the group that four more towns may join the authority to get water supplies from the reservoir.

The area has to work together," he said. "If we do, we can build one of the best agricultural areas in the state."

Tinsley recalled that the Millers Creek project has been before the development board many times.

"Sometimes there were two delegations," he said. "One would sit on one side and the other on the other side."

The authority was created by the legislature in 1957. Then there were efforts in the legislatures and the courts to wipe out the authority. City elections in some of the cities turned on the issue on remaining in the authority.

Last year, the law was amended to allow Knox City to join. Engineering plans will be completed so construction contracts can be taken later this year or early next year. The loan completed Friday will pay for land for the lake.

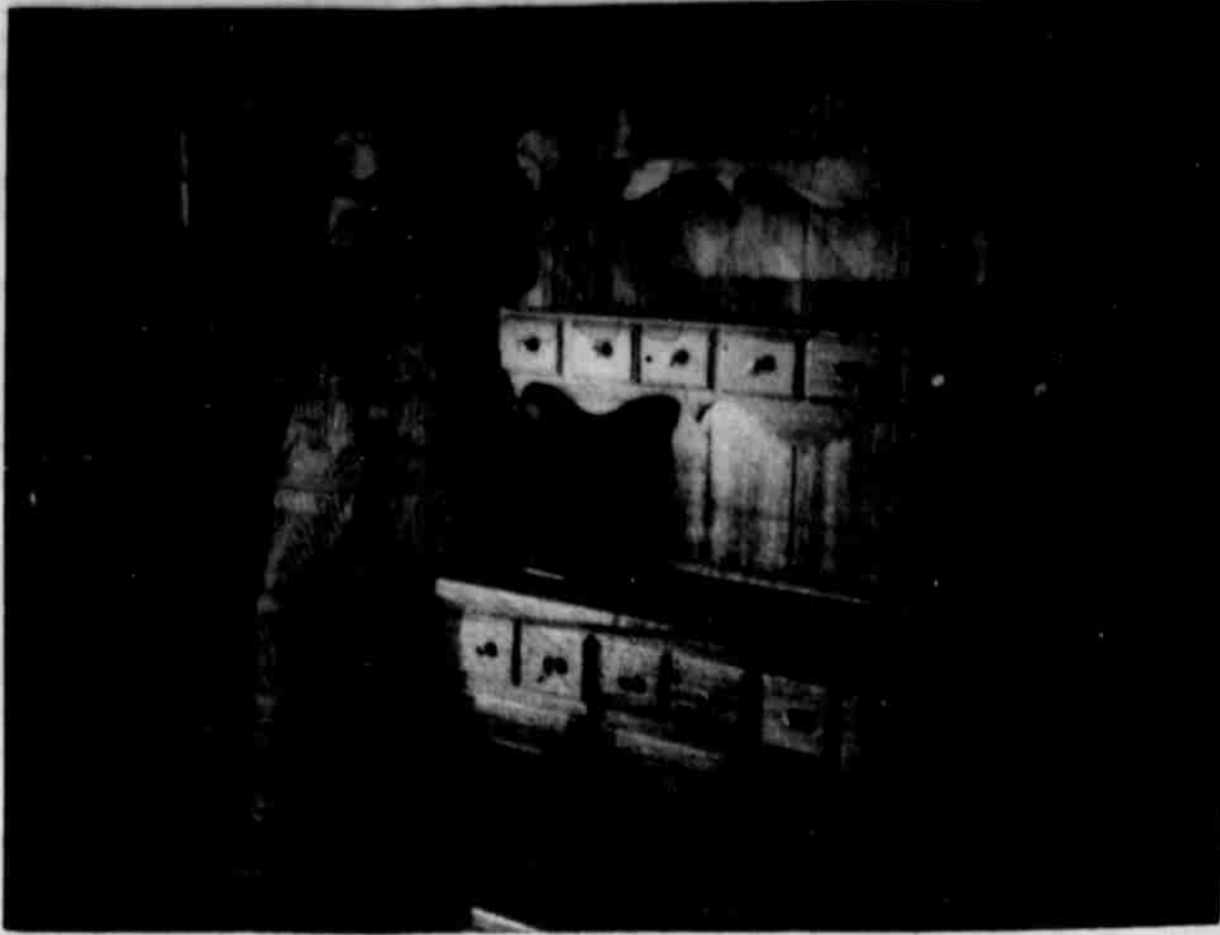

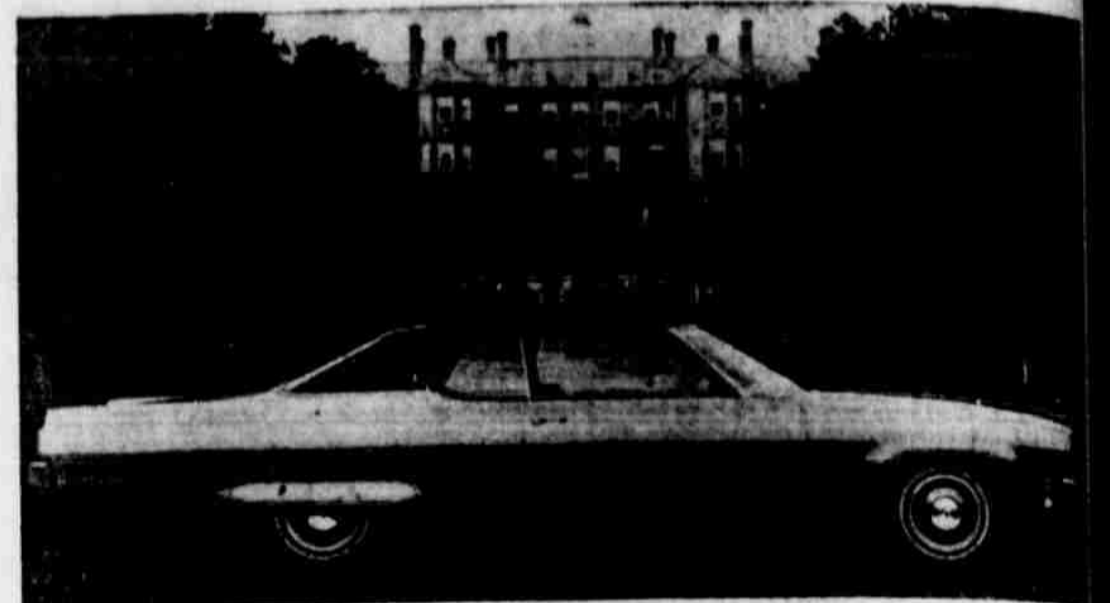

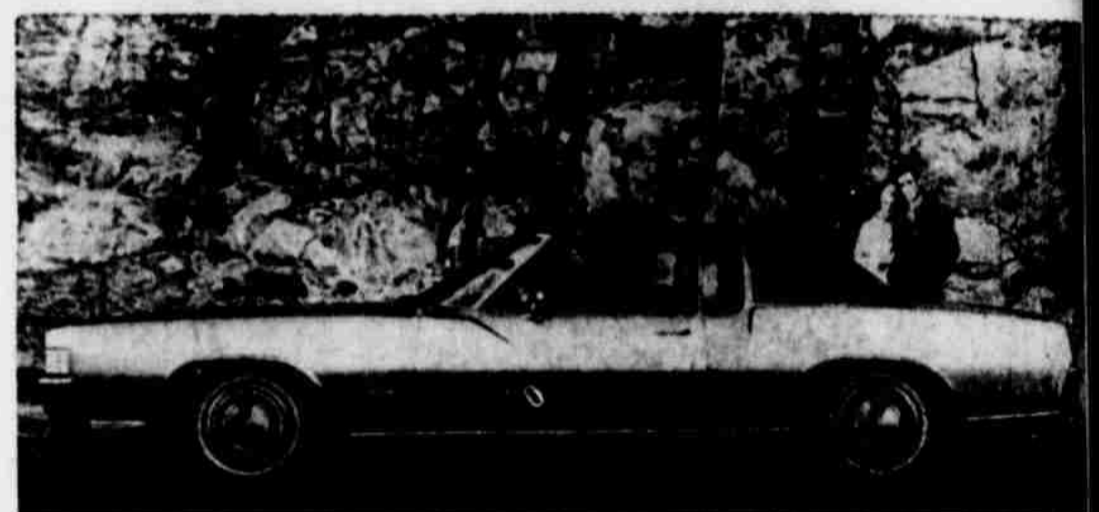
