It followed approval of the bonds as to legality by Attorney General Crawford Martin and registration by Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. Earlier the water rights commission had approved engineering feasibility and revised a permit for reduced size of the reservoir to

fit financing ability. The water development board will buy a share in the reservoir and make a loan for another portion. A federal grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development will also aid the project. The state portion of the reservoir will be savallable for purchase by the authority when needed for more water development.

Patterson said he had missed only part of one meeting since the first organization gathering. But he obviously is not calling the job finished. He told the group that four more towns may join the authority to get water supplies from the reservoir.


