

Selection, Crowning Frontier Day Queen Set Tuesday Night, May 12

With only two weeks left on the calendar until the opening day of the Frontier Days Celebration and Rice Springs Rodeo, plans for all phases of the three day and night celebration are progressing on schedule, according to Chamber Manager Rex Felker who is acting as co-ordinator of the annual event.

Hundreds of riders representing colorful riding clubs and Sheriff's Poses from over a wide area of Texas have already indicated by letter that they will be here for the big western street parade scheduled to kick-off at 5 p. m., Thursday, May 14th, under the direction of Dale Lawrence and C. O. Holt as parade chairmen. Riding Clubs will be guests of the Chamber of Commerce for a chuckwagon supper which will be held in the corral building immediately following the parade.

However, prior to this date, another interesting and novel feature of the celebration will take place at 8 p. m., May 12, in the Texas Theatre. This will be the selection and crowning of the Frontier Days Queen who will reign for the three days and nights as special program

of activities. This event is under the direction of Mrs. Robert Wheatley who reports that several entries have already been received and that they are expected to number at least 20 or possibly more before the deadline of May 11th. Contestants who live in Haskell County are eligible to enter with an age limit of 25 years up to any age. They are to be dressed in long, old style dresses which were the vogue 50 years or more ago and they will be judged on their ensemble and poise. All Civic organizations of Haskell County, clubs and etc., plus business firms are encouraged to have an entry. No entry fee will be charged to enter and women desiring to participate may contact the Chamber of Commerce or Mrs. Robert Wheatley.

In conjunction with the Pioneer Queen Contest a highly entertaining program will be presented by several song and dance groups with the theme of the night's production designed to recall memories of days gone by.

The price for admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Mr. Connel's interesting and informative talk on the problems of the children in all schools of the type of which he is Superintendent, held his listeners spell-bound. Some of the highlights of his discussion are the facts that they are no longer called orphans as in other days and in reality only a very small per cent of the boys and girls are from homes whose parents are dead. Instead, the speaker said that over 90 per cent of the children were from broken homes and that all of them, regardless of age, had problems which needed the guidance of trained workers to overcome, and to give their assistance toward making their life as much like the normal home as possible.

He further stated that to accomplish this to a greater degree they have set-up what is called "Cottage Homes" where a man and wife team live in homes with two or more children where they have their own meals, do their own chores and live as normal a life as possible.

Haskell County's Share \$83,955 For CAP Program

A \$282,786 allocation to the Community Action Program in Abilene to carry out the poverty war in Haskell, Taylor, Mitchell and Stephens counties has been approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The grant was announced Friday in a telegram from Congressman Omar Burleson to the Haskell Free Press.

According to CAP executive director, Joe Ramon, the funds are for one year beginning May 1, and are the same amount granted for the year ending April 30 of this year.

The funds will help pay for program administration, planning, community organization and services, family planning and special summer programs for low-income residents.

According to the telegram, the local share is \$83,955.

Main objective of the CAP program is to educate the low-income families to help themselves, and in obtaining assistance for their problems and break down the barriers between racial groups.

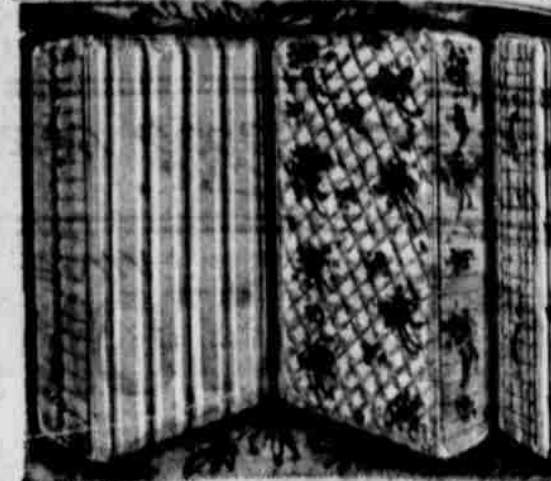
