Foregoing minutes read and approved.

After discussion and clarification with Judge Hart, an adjusted claim was submitted. Motion made by Commissioner Cummings and seconded by Commissioner Spurlock that the claim be allowed and ordered paid. All ayes; motion carried.

Shoplifting & Credit Card Abuse Program Monday November 24

The Stratford Police Department and Stratford Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a "SHOPLIFTING" and "CREDIT CARD ABUSE" Program on Monday, November 24 at 7:00 p.m.

The program, which will be held at the Farm Bureau Building, will be conducted by Stan Kropff, Regional Crime Prevention Officer.

"With the Christmas Season only a few weeks away, we felt that programs of this nature would be very timely," says Chief Davis. "The Police Department and Chamber of Commerce would encourage all owner or managers and Business employees to attend the programs," Davis adds.

The programs will teach business owners how to protect their inventory.

"Statistics show that eight million Americans shoplift ever year. They take more than three billion dollars annually. Statistics also

show that kids under eighteen make up a third of all shoplifters. The grab-and-run variety of shoplifter is made up of Gang kinds and drug addicts—some of them armed and dangerous. The true kleptomaniac is rare," states Davis.

Most shoplifting is done because people—The general public—want something for nothing. They shoplift a little at a time—to stretch their budgets. The program will cover shoplifter's tricks such as swapping price tags on merchandise and wearing good out of stores. Shoplifting Prevention Tips will also be discussed.

Those attending will learn to be aware of local shoplifting laws and citizen's arrest procedures, as well as how best to coordinate efforts with law enforcement agencies.

There is no charge for this program and it is open to the General Public.

Schoolboard Meeting

The Stratford Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session November 6th at 7:00 a.m. with all members present. The board approved the minutes of the previous meeting and approved the payment of the November Bills.

In other business the board approved the Textbook Committee for the current year. This committee is to look at all books that are up for adoption this year and make recommendations to the board in March for the Textbooks to be used next year.

The board accepted the lease of school land by Liberty Oil Company. This resolution will be sent to the Texas Education for approval. In other business the board raised the coverage of pledge securities by the first state bank of Stratford by \$300,000.00.

Superintendent Bass gave monthly reports on transportation, average daily attendance for the month of October 540, Tax collections 70% collected in the amount of \$979,874.00, failing list for the last six weeks, a report on where last years seniors are this year, this years speech tournaments schedule and what the state is looking at in terms of the vocational programs in the future.

Beat Check

The Stratford Police Department investigated a variety of calls during the past week.

The new four lane highway into the intersection of U.S. 54 and 287 seems to have mixed emotions, at least for truck driver's. While they enjoy the extra lanes, the parking restrictions now imposed has created a dilemma for them on where to park. Such was the case with a Colorado man who decided to park on private parking in spite of posted signs prohibiting truck parking on the property. The officer who answered the call, was informed that the owner of the property would sign a complaint on the truck driver. The Colorado man posted a bond and was released.

A relatively new resident of Stratford was charged with DWI after he was stopped by a Stratford Police Officer. The man had been arrested two weeks earlier and charged with public intoxication after an officer had to carry him a short distance to place him inside the patrol unit. The earlier incident had been reported by a citizen who stated that the pickup the man was driving was parked on or near the railroad tracks west of the intersection of U.S. 287 and U.S. 54. After the subject registered a 0.21 on the intoxilyzer, he was booked into jail, this time charged with DWI.

A series of car accidents continued into last week when a Stratford man backed out of his drive-way and into another car that was traveling south on Putman street. No injuries were suffered by either driver and only minor damage was sustained by the vehicles.

A routine check by a Stratford Police officer last week developed information for authorities in Colorado Springs, Colorado. An employee of a local business contacted the police department to report a man who was selling car radios. The officer stopped the vehicle and obtained information on the vehicle and the driver that later became more than routine. The officer, who had contacted a business in Colorado Springs to verify that the radios were not stolen, was later contacted by a detective from the Colorado Springs Police department requesting information on the subject. Although the Colorado authorities had the subject's name, they did not know a date of birth or other information sufficient to place the subject into the crime information computer. The subject was wanted by the department for investigation of a homicide that had occurred there.

A Stratford man was charged with DWI after an officer stopped him in the 500 block of north Maple. The subject, a Mexican National, was driving in an erratic manner when the officer stopped the 1976 Oldsmobile that he was driving. Aside from the DWI, the subject was cited with making an unsafe left turn and no driver's license. He was booked into jail and a hold was placed on him for the immigration service.

In another alcohol-related offense, a Stratford man was booked into jail for public intoxication after officer's responded to a disturbance in the northwest section of

Stratford. The man was released from jail the following morning after Judge Don Owens assessed fine for the subject.

The operator of another 18-wheeler was charged with disorderly conduct after he elected to stop in the middle of the intersection of U.S. 287 and U.S. 54 and urinate. The subject told the arresting officer that that spot looked "AS Good As any Other" to him. After posting bond, the man was released.

A Stratford youth was questioned in reference to an obscene telephone call that he made to a local business. The youth, apparently upset at an employee of the business, telephoned the employee and expressed his opinion! The youth was released to the custody of his mother.

Other investigations by the police department during the last week included: A report of a window peeker; a disturbance between an estranged husband and wife; an arrest warrant issued by Municipal Judge Don Owens being executed with the arrest of a Pampa man on charges of theft of services; and several other miscellaneous calls.

Did You Know ?

At least one business was victimized by a man posing as a sales representative for a label company in Chapin, South Carolina. The man sold a quantity of the labels to the owner of the business and received a check from the owner made out to him. The man then cashed the check at a local grocery store and absconded to parts unknown. Through the investigation that followed, the police department was able to obtain enough information on the subject to enter him into the Crime Information Computer. The Stratford Police department would encourage the business community of Stratford as well as residents to contact us immediately if you are approached by those selling their goods, unless you know them or have done business with them before.

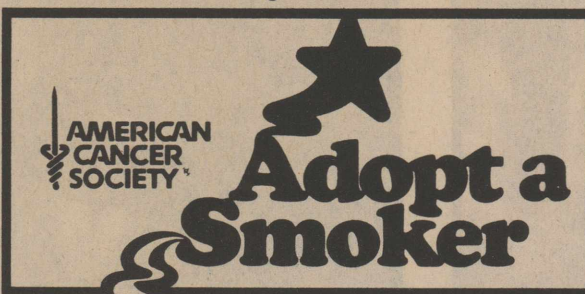

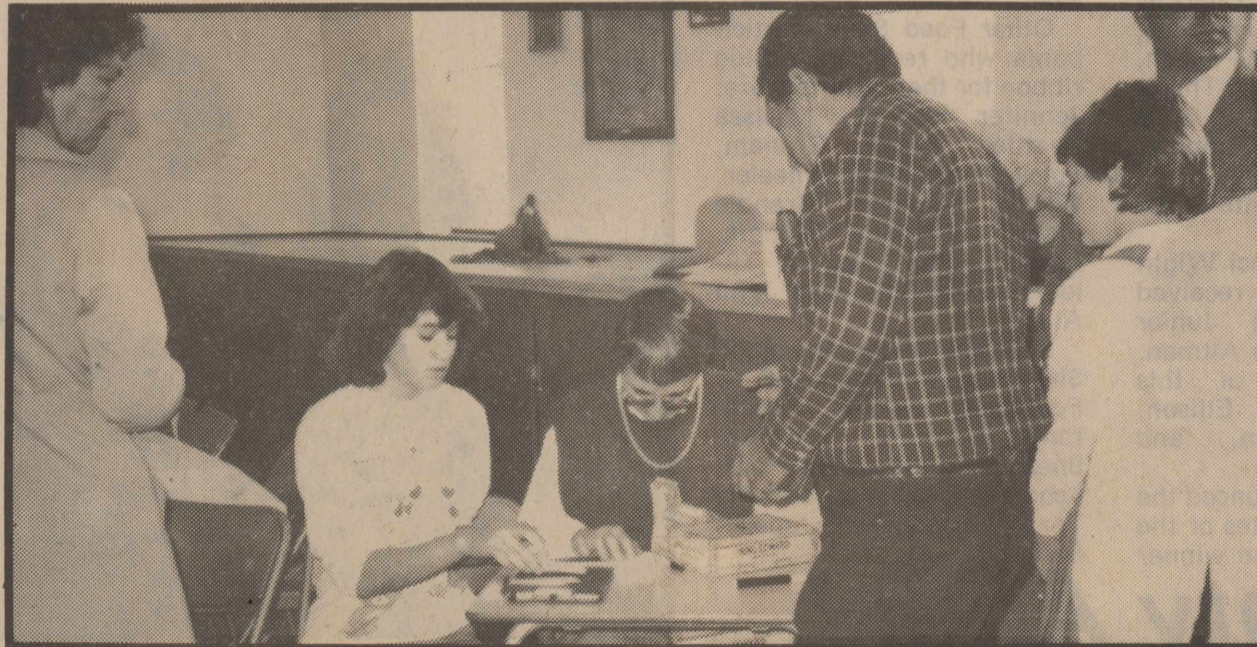

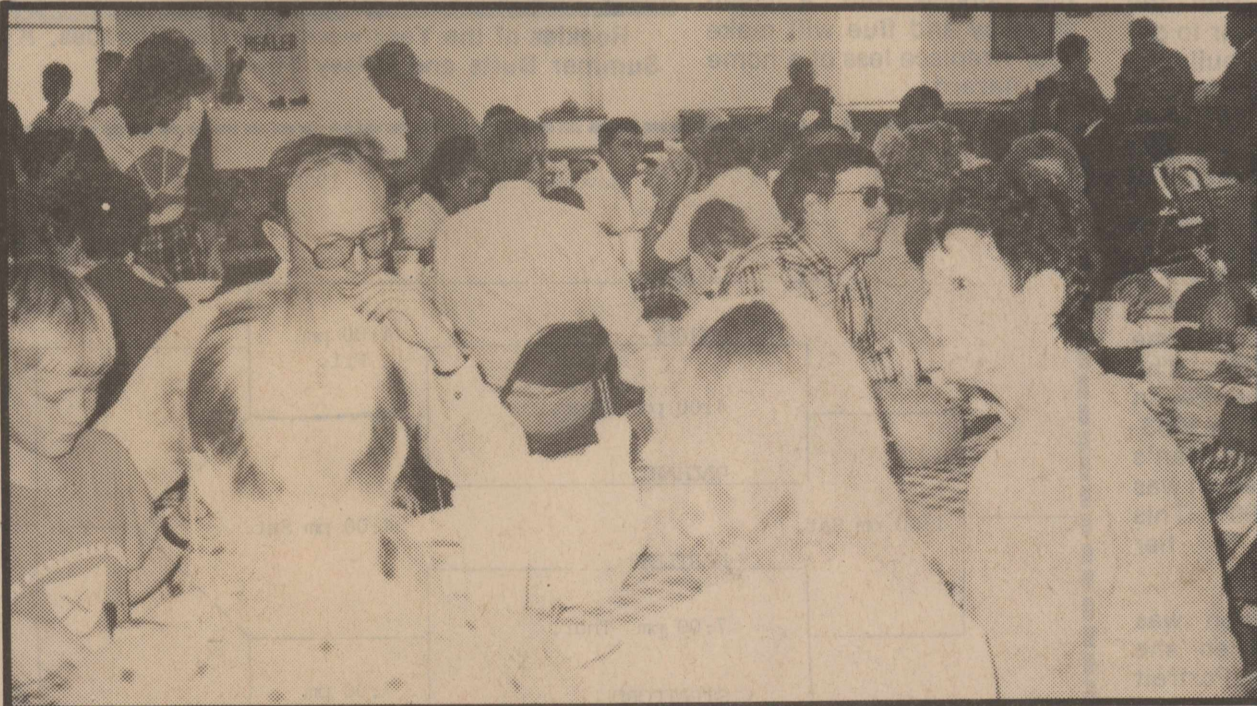

County Agent

Preventative measures can help reduce dangerous creosote and tar buildup in your fireplace chimney and flue.

Both flue and chimney units should be cleaned before the first fireplace fire of the season. It also may require cleaning again during the winter, especially if you burn wood that has not been air-dried or seasoned.

Our specialist says a fourth-inch accumulation of creosote indicates the flue needs cleaning.

Checking the fireplace by hanging a flashlight from the top of the flue to a third of the way down the flue is one suggestion. Then, look up the lighted flue from the fireplace with a mirror to get an estimate of the buildup.

Wood stove distributors and some home improvement stores sell wire and plastic cleaning brushes that

fit square, rectangular and round chimneys, for do-it-yourself cleaning. Or you can hire a professional chimney sweep to perform this service.

Every time you start a fire, allow a small quantity of dry wood to burn hot for at least 20 minutes before adding more fuel. This small, hot fire will burn off some of the creosote, reducing buildup.

Also check the chimney regularly for heat damage and deterioration. Repair any cracks in the mortar and places where the mortar has broken loose and fallen out.

Adequate maintenance many not make much difference in how it looks on the outside, but a clean chimney and flue will make your fireplace less of a home fire hazard.

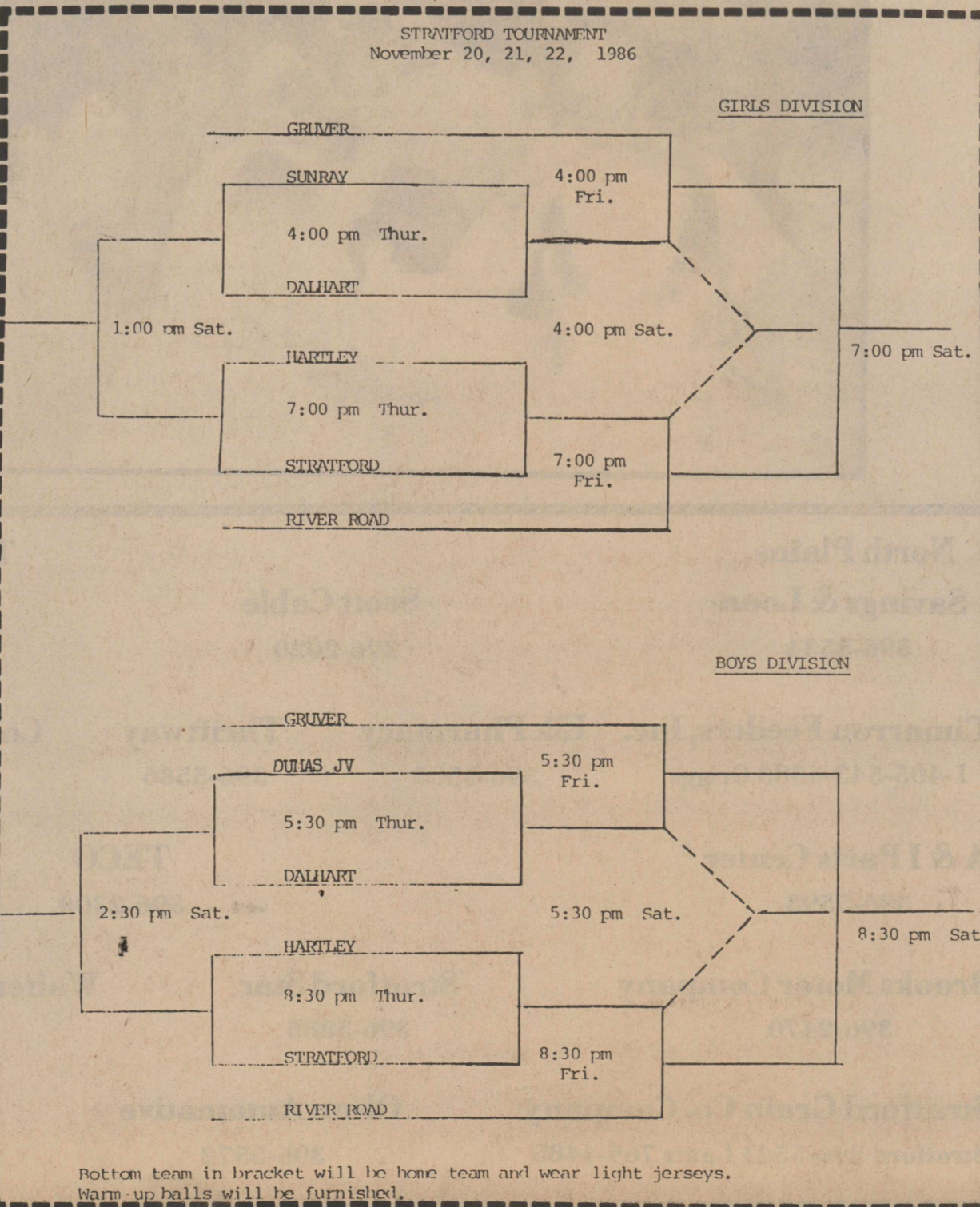
A lifelong ambition was fulfilled in 1969 when she established Hazel's Portrait and Art Studio, where she continues to teach classes to both children and adults.

Also known for her photography she served for many years as the Superintendent of the Photography Division for the Panhandle Exposition in Guymon.

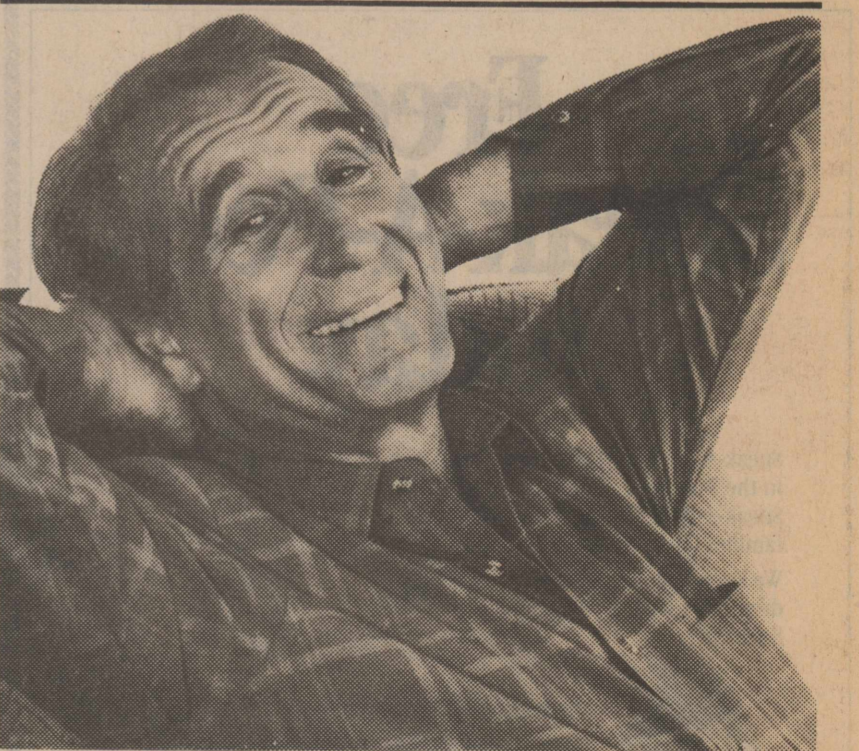
