



Area Foundation Big Success



They are asked how they have fulfilled the four qualities of a DAR Good Citizen, which are Dependability, Service, Leadership and Patriotism. A transcript of their grades and letter of recommendation are also included. Finally, each student is required to write an essay without assistance or reference material on Our American Heritage and Our Responsibility for Preserving

Being a DAR Good Citizen is an honor that the recipients can include on resumes or applications to college or employers. The National Association of Secondary School Principals has approved this program and has placed it on the Advisory List of National Contests and Activities.

The DAR Good Citizens will be honored on Sunday, April 5, 1987 in the auditorium of the Dallam-hartley County Museum. This will be a reception and patriotic program and the honorees will each be presented with a Good Citizen Pin and a Certificate from the Molino de Viento Chapter.

Helpful Hints

For a syrup to eat with bread and butter, heat one pint of sorghum molasses to boiling, watching so it does not boilover, add four or five well beaten eggs, cook a minute stirring constantly after stirring eggs in. Add cinnamon, nutmeg or ginger if desired.

If cured meat begins to grow mold, it can be removed with vinegar causing no damage to the meat itself.

When boiling meat or poultry a tablespoon vinegar added to the water will insure tenderness.


To remove ink stains from a carpet sprinkle the spot with table salt, then wash with vinegar.

When you scorch a place when ironing, do not panic, dip a clean cloth in white vinegar and rub the spot away, rinse in clear water and iron again.

Immediately after dishwashing while hands are still moist pour some lemon juice in hands and rub over hands to keep them soft and white.

A few drops of kerosene added to starch water will keep the starch from sticking.







In the last two weeks, the Stratford Police Department has responded to or

investigated the following: A Stratford woman, who stated that her child grabbed her arm, was issued a citation for failure to control a motor vehicle when the vehicle that she was driving collided with a parked pickup. The investigating officer reported that the woman was travelling west-bound when the incident occurred. There were no injuries reported to either the driver or passengers. The officers report reflected that the occupants of the automobile were wearing their seatbelts.

A Pampa man was charged with the offense of driving while intoxicated after being stopped by officers of the Police department. The man, who had been the cause of a disturbance at a local cafe, was reported to the Police Department as possibly being intoxicated. After several blocks of attempting to get the pickup stopped, the subject did indeed appear to be intoxicated to the officers. The subject did submit to a series of field sobriety tests but refused to submit to an intoxilyzer test. Due to the advanced condition of his intoxication and failure of the field sobriety tests, he was booked into jail charged with the offense of driving while intoxicated. The subject did have previous convictions for DWI in other Texas counties. Ironically, the subject was enroute to a facility in Colorado for treatment of

alcohol abuse. What started out to be a simple investigatory stop of a subject in response to a reported disturbance at a southside residence, turned out to be an all night ordeal for officers of the police department. An officer of the Police Department had been stopped and told that there was a disturbance at a residence. The officer advised the other officer on duty to meet him a short distance from the residence in question. Just moments before the other officer arrived to where the first officer had requested him to. two vehicles left the residence of the alledged disturbance. (The first officer had intended to wait for "a back-up" officer before going to the residence and when the two vehicles left the house, the officers

A Stratford resident, who lives in the southeast section of town, contacted the police department to advise that unknown teenagers were on top of a semi-trailer rig that he owns and operates. He was not able to identify the youths but stated that they left the scene soon after he detected them atop the trailer. The officer was unable to locate

juveniles. The driver of a continental Trailways bus made a "donation" to the city of Stratford when he ejected a subject from the bus he was driving for creating a disturbance on the bus. The disturbance reportedly had occurred in Colorado. However, the bus driver decided to wait until his arrival in Stratford to expell the subject. An officer of the police department ran a routine check on the subject to determine if the subject was wanted for any reason-the subject did not have any wants or warrants on him. The subject stayed in Stratford until the following morning but was carefully monitored by the police officer.

Another in the saga of disturbances occurred when 2 subjects that shared the same apartment became angry with one another over some money that one owed to the other. Both subjects, who were intoxicated, were given a 'Sermonett' by the officer explaining how important it was for them to stay out of their vehicles and not to disturb the peace of others. Upon the officers departure, the problem seemed to be under control.

Another automobile accident in the 400 block of south Maple was investigated by the police department. It seems that one vehicle backed into another causing minor damage. The parties agreed to work the matter out between themselves.

Another vehicle, which was parked in the 800 block of North Chestnut, was apparently sideswiped by an unknown vehicle. The police department investigation was hampered somewhat due to the vehicle that was hit already being repaired at a local body shop. The report is still under investigation by

the police department. Other investigations or

reports responded to by the police department included: A report of a prowler on Putnam street where fresh footprints in the snow indicated that unknown person(s) had walked on the side and at the back of the residence; a report of a stolen bicycle-later recovered by the police department; and a van fire in the 1300 block of Purnell street.
