School Board Accepts Resignation, Approves Annual Band Trip

The Stratford School Board met in regular session February 4. At this meeting the Board called a school board election for Saturday, April 3, 1982, with George Jeffcoat named as the election judge. The terms of Don Riffe, Rex Christian, and Don Dietrich will expire in April. Marihoward Engelbrecht was appointed to the Board until this election. This means there will be an election for three 3-year terms, and one position for a one-year term.

The Board in other action decided to leave vehicles on the tax roll for the 1982 tax year and to continue giving the \$5,000 Homestead Exemption to those under 65, and \$15,000 to those over 65, and not to give additional exemption to homesteads, due to the loss in tax values on cattle and farm machinery.

The Board also approved the Band Trip to compete in the Music Festival in Phoenix. The expenses for this trip will be paid by the proceeds from the Band concession stand and the money made by the Band Boosters.

In other business the Board extended

the contracts of Sam Brite, Middle

School Principal; Steve Haynes, Mary Allen Elementary Principal; Jack Needham, Athletic Director; and Delvin Howard, Assistant High School Principal. The Board accepted the resignation of Dale Prescott, High School Principal, as he is going into private business.

Superintendent Bass gave his monthly report involving tax collections, transportation, Public School Week March 1-5, computer instruction in the lower grades, attendance for the last six weeks and the Superintendent's meeting held in Austin last week.

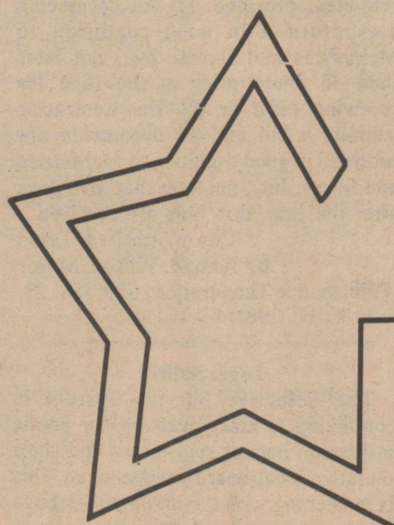
The blood drive was sponsored by the Stratford Lions Club and conducted by the Coffee Memorial Blood Center of Amarillo.

County Wheat Producers To Meet at County Barn

Sherman County wheat producers, faced with reported record state wide acreage plantings, market uncertainties, and continued low prices have set a county-wide meeting to study their plight and map strategies for future production and market decisions.

Cagle Kendrick, County Director of the Texas Wheat Producers Association

said the meeting, open to all producers, is scheduled for Thursday, February 18, 7 p.m. at the County Barn in Stratford.

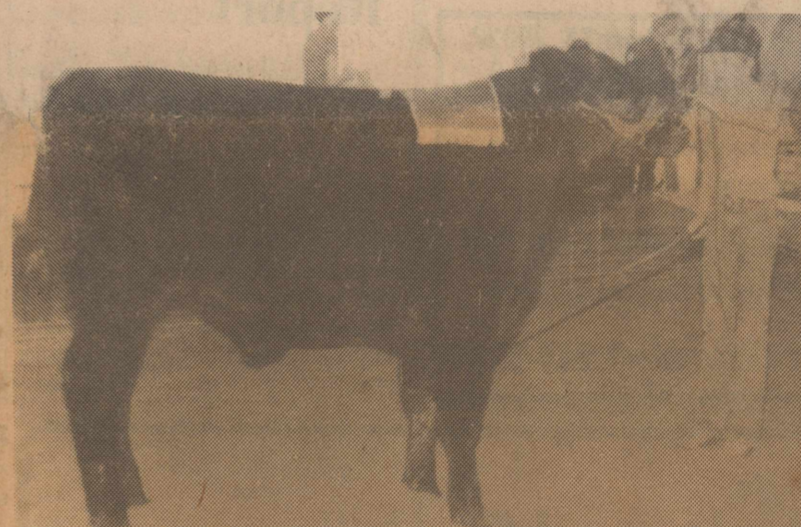
The county director said that staff and/or officers of the state-wide organization will be on hand to discuss emerging information related to the program provisions of the 1982 wheat program, political uncertainties and impact on wheat markets related to the continuing review of the U.S.-U.S.S.R trade relations and crop situation and market outlook for the coming months as harvest approaches.

Kendrick said that this is a particularly important meeting for producers to attend in that the market and price picture for the new crop marketing period may be directly related to what action.

About 150 exhibitors participated at the Show and Sale, according to the organizers of the event.

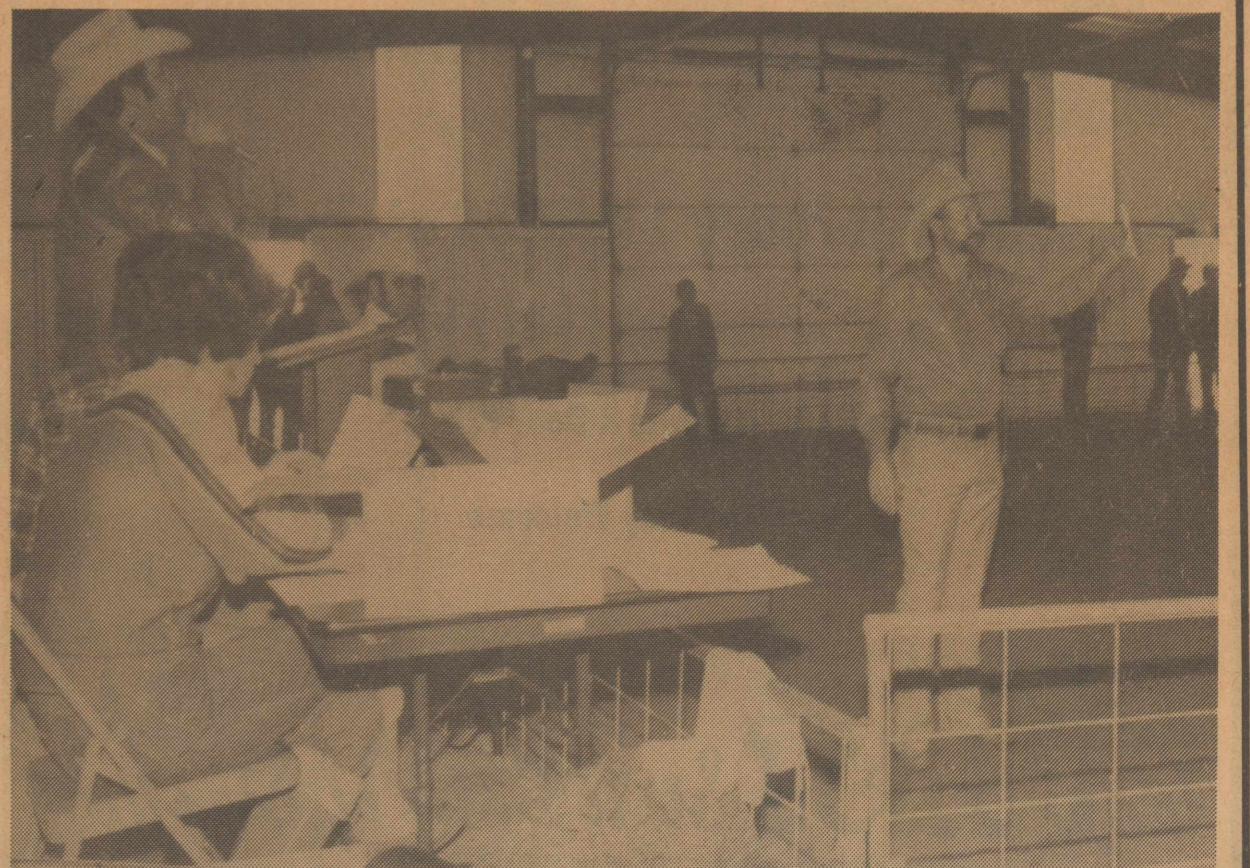

The Star Editorial

The following article comes from the Lydell Williams, executive vice president of the Texas Press Association. I thought you might enjoy knowing someone is having more trouble with the winter weather than you are.

They told me I could save if I heated with a wood stove. So here is a brief list of the expenses incurred in the project:

Stove pipe, installation, etc., \$458; six round trips to town for supplies, 40 miles at 20 cents per mile, \$48; chain saw, \$149.95; gas and maintenance for chain saw, \$44.60; four-wheel drive pickup, stripped, \$8,379.04; four-wheel drive pickup maintenance \$438.

Replace rear window of pickup twice, \$310; fine for cutting unmarked trees in state forest, \$500; fourteen cases of beer, \$116; littering fine, \$50; doctor's fee for removing splinter from eye, \$45; safety glasses, \$29.95; emergency room treatment (broken toe from dropped log), \$125.

Safety shoes, \$49.95; new living room carpet, \$800; paint for walls and ceiling, \$110; chimney cleaning brush and rods, \$45; log splitter \$150; fifteen acre woodlot, \$9,000; taxes on woodlot, \$310; replace coffee table (chopped up while drunk), \$75; divorce settlement, \$33,678.22.

Total first year's cost, \$54,970.81; savings in conventional fuel, first year, \$107.37.

Net cost, first year's woodburning, \$54,836.42.

SEWING WITH SILK, SILK-LIKE FABRICS

Fantasize yourself in an exquisite garment of fabulous shimmering silk, silk taffeta, satin or crepe--sewn by you.

When sewing with these luxurious and delicate fabrics, keep in mind the type of material used, nature of the fabric and special sewing and care techniques.

SILK FABRIC TYPES

Today's silk and silk-like fabrics are made of 100 percent silk fibers, synthetic fibers or blends of both.

Knowing how the different fabrics "behave" helps homesewers choose the right fabric for each particular garment design.

For example, if a garment design calls for soft gathers, look for a fabric that will "drape" easily rather than a stiffer fabric which would make the gathers too rigid.

Here is a list of some popular silk or silk-like fabrics--and their "behavior" traits:

- 1) charmeuse--fine, very soft satin-faced crepe with a lustrous surface and beautiful "drape"
- 2) crepe de chine--fine, lightweight crepe with a smooth, lustrous surface and soft "drape"
- 3) georgette--lightweight, semi-sheer crepe fabric with a grainy surface which "drapes" beautifully and resists wrinkles
- 4) noil silk--soft, slightly nubby fabric having a cotton-like appearance. "Noil" yarn comes from the inner part of the silk cocoon and is shredded, combed and spun like cotton thread. This sportier fabric is less expensive than most silks. It "behaves" as pongee and other medium-weight fabrics. It acts a bit stiffer than other silks.

In choosing fabric for a certain garment design, remember that weight of the fabric determines its "behavior".

Lightweight silk, such as organza and crepe de chine, "drapes" gently and gather softly, while medium to heavyweight silks, such as silk taffeta and brocade give a crisp tailored or full look.

For a graceful, loose flowing effect, choose soft sheers, such as georgette, chiffon, batiste or organza, as well as crisper sheers, such as organdy.

PRESHRINK SILKS

Before sewing silks, preshrink them. To preshrink handwashable silk, dip the fabric in warm water. Then roll it in a towel to remove excess water. If fabric is off-grain, adjust or straighten it while it's damp. Dry it unfolded over a shower rod. Then press with a dry iron. To preshrink dry-cleanable fabric, steam it on the "wrong" side with a press cloth to protect the finish and avoid spotting.

CUTTING AND SEWING

Before cutting fabric, observe pattern layout instructions and keep the proper grain direction. Fluid fabrics, such as crepe de chine or chiffon show uneven grains easily.

To prevent fabric from slipping when pattern pieces are laid out, cut on a cork or felt surface or stretch a sheet tightly across normal cutting surface. In addition, fabrics won't slip if you place them between layers of light weight

paper--shelf paper or tissue. This prevents slipping while cutting.

When pinning, use fine silk pins only in seam allowances so pins won't leave marks on silk fabric.

Cut nubby fabrics one thickness at a time since folded fabric sticks to itself and doesn't lay smooth. Pattern matching is easier, too, when you cut single layers instead of double layers. Leave larger seam allowances for fitting or special seam finishes.

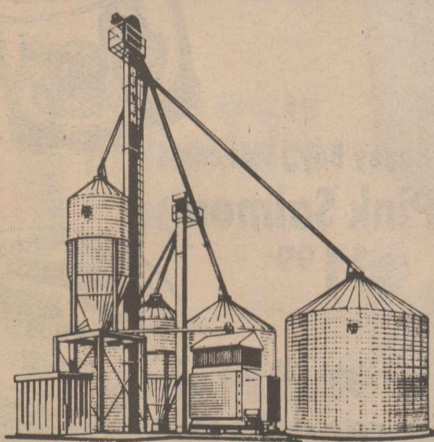

FmHA Hopes to Help in Cost-Price Freeze

Although many farmers are facing financial difficulty because of today's cost-price squeeze, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) intends to do all it can to help its borrowers stay in farming, FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said today.

"We recognize there are problems, problems with high interest rates, inflation, a grain embargo, adverse weather and other causes," Futch said. "And these have been intensified by overall bumper crops that have affected prices."

"As Secretary of Agriculture John Block said recently, our farm economy is in a valley right now and needs some help to move on up the hill on the other side."

Futch said Block had instructed FmHA to explore the use of private

credit to supplement its own lending resources whenever possible. In addition, existing legal authority to reschedule or defer payments is to be used where practicable.

"We intend to be reasonable, just as Secretary Block ordered," Futch said. "Our objective is to keep farmers in business. That isn't to say there won't be some who go out of business, because there will be, but we are going to use the best judgment we can and reasonable criteria in making our loan decisions."

Secretary Block said that borrowers who have made good faith efforts to pay their loans, who have maintained their loan security in good condition, who follow sound, recognized management practices, and who have a reasonable chance to succeed can reasonably expect FmHA to stay with them.
