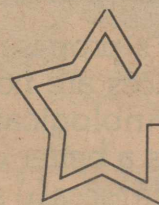

Report from the Chamber president

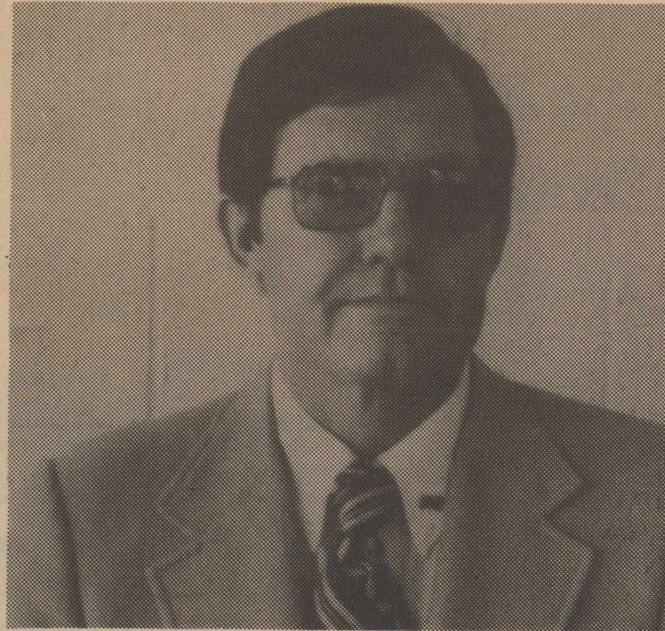

High-Speed Chase Ends in Town After Car Hits Tree

A fourteen-year-old Colorado boy was apprehended in Stratford after the stolen car he was driving struck a tree following a high-speed chase that began in Boise City, Tuesday, March 9.

At press time, the youth, who was uninjured in the accident, was being held in Sherman County Jail pending further investigation and possible juvenile charges in Colorado.

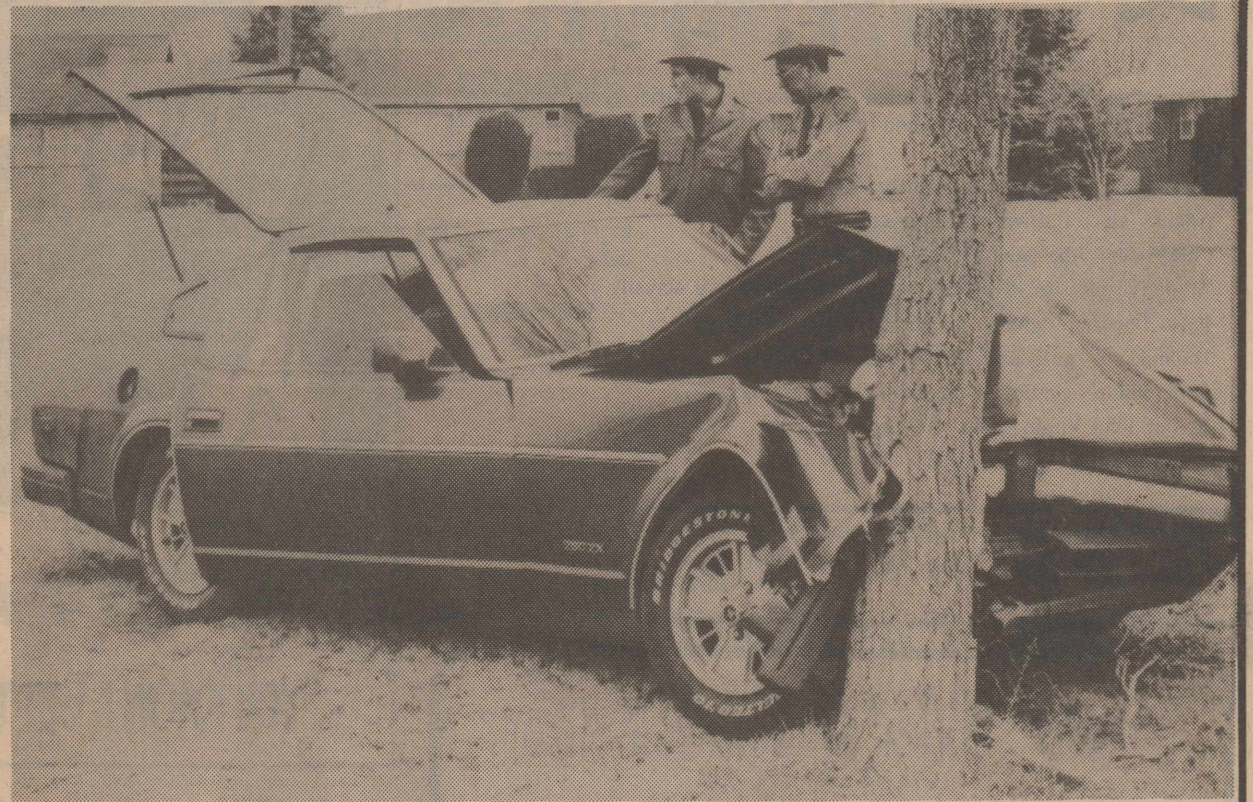
The accident occurred at the corner of Fulton and Purnell, near the First Assembly of God Church, at 10:07 a.m., following a nearly 30 minute chase south on Highway 287 that at times reached speeds well in excess of 100 miles-per-hour, according to Sheriff Clois Vaughn.

The juvenile, who was driving a 1980 red Datsun 280-Z, eluded local officers for several minutes in Stratford after turning off the highway at Ninth Street. He was finally stopped after being fired on several times by Highway Patrolman Gary Davis, prior to the accident.

"I felt that if he hadn't been stopped soon someone would have been killed," said Officer Davis, following the incident. He added that the shots were fired at the tires of the vehicle and had each struck the automobile.

Earlier, unknown to Officer Davis, it had been reported that the juvenile might be carrying a pistol, but that turned out to be an air gun found at the time of the apprehension.

"Throughout the chase he showed no

regard to anyone on the road and nearly struck one of our witnesses," Davis added.

Local law enforcement officers first became aware that the juvenile was headed to Stratford at 9:36 a.m. when

they were asked for assistance by the Boise City Police after the youth had outrun their officers after having failed to pay for gasoline in that town. Local police first encountered the vehicle about 11 miles north of town.

Further investigation showed that the car had been stolen in the Denver area. The Sheriff's Department said the youth had a history of numerous auto theft violations and was apparently headed for Houston.

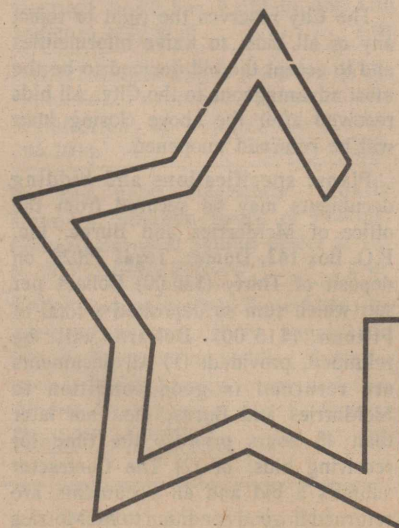

Hospital Hires Administrator; Nine File for Board Positions

The Stratford Hospital Board unanimously voted to accept the application of Mrs. Gennell York as the new administrator of Coldwater Manor at a special meeting, March 5.

York, who has an extensive background in hospital and nursing home facilities is from Canyon and will replace Jack Gore, who was asked by the board to resign at the Feb. 15 meeting.

Plans to present a petition signed by about 230 Stratford residents calling for the reinstatement of Gore at the March 18 board meeting were still in progress at press time, according to one of the

organizers. Ernestine Almqvist, chairman of the hospital board, said that York would probably start working at the Coldwater Manor facility prior to the March 18 meeting.

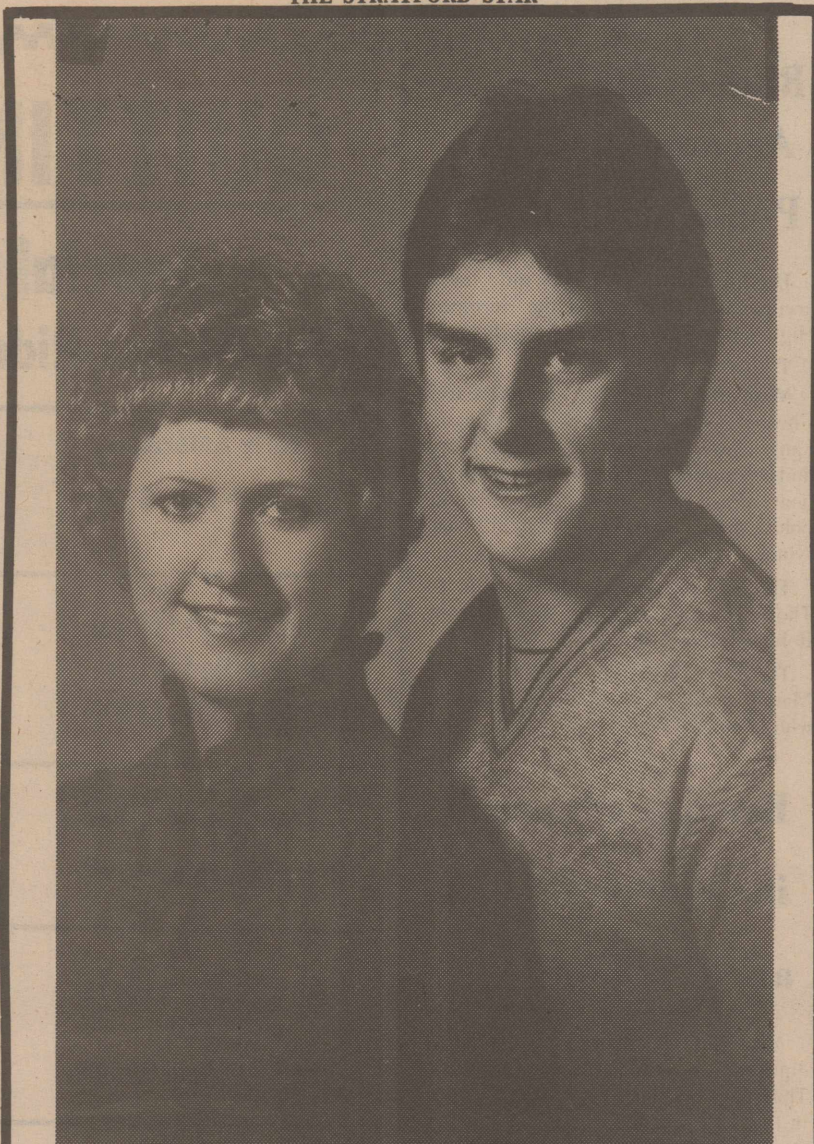
Pendoza is interested in the agriculture of this area and would like to attend an American college here. He says he likes Texas better than Ohio.

JEANS - WHICH ARE FOR YOU?

Whatever "jean look" you want to create, the jean-fashion "menu" at the market place has it--so choose those that flatter you.

To look your best and feel your best, consider how jeans make you look, and then choose the right ones for you. Think color first. Light colors generally make your figure look larger, while darker ones make you look smaller. One way to look slender starts with choosing traditional navy-blue denim. However, watch out for the non-fashionable bright, eye-catching colors, unless you want added emphasis.

Think texture next. Medium weights are the most flattering. On the other hand, today's shiny looks "Add" pounds.

Consider line and shape, too. They're created by seaming. Generally, the slimmer the leg cut, the wider the hips look. Also, for added height, look for lengthwise-up-and-down-topstitching, piping and slanted pockets.

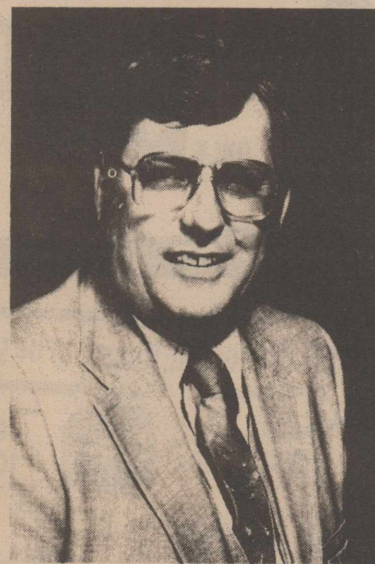

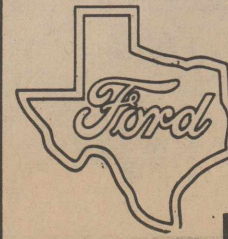

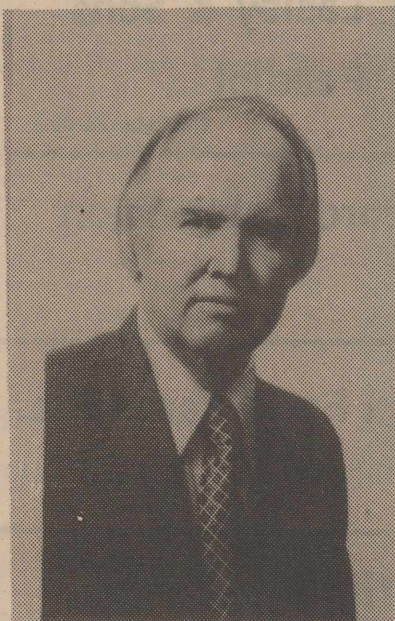
