### Haskell Among Area Cities, Counties Signed For COG Orientation Classes

Orientation classes will be conducted in this region by the West Central Texas Council of Governments during the week of January 5-8, to teach area law enforcement personnel procedures and operation of new teletype equipment which will be installed in 22 area cities and counties in mid-January.

The first class will be from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on January 5 at the Brownwood Police Station; the second class, on January 6, in the 90th District Courtroom at Breckenridge; the third class on January 7 at Stamford's City Hall; and the last class on January 8 at the Snyder Police Station. The classes will last from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. in all cases.

Instructors will be furnished by the Department of Public Safety and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Cities and counties already signed up for the system are: Haskell, Abilene, Ballinger, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Coleman Colorado City, Comanche, Cross Plains, Eastland, Snyder, Stamford, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Callahan, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Taylor.

The new non-voice communication equipment is available to the WCTCOG law enforcement agencies as a result of a \$39,857 grant awarded in August by the Texas Criminal Justice Council to establish the State's first regional law enforcement teletype network. This network equipment is the latest device

to control public offenders, providing area police and sheriff's departments with a direct connection with member units, local Department of Public Safety Patrol Units, the Texas Department of Public Safety headquarters in Austin and the State and Federal Crime Information Centers in Austin and Washington. This will also include a hookup with other regional council networks as soon as such systems are developed statewide. The machine is a print out model and operates on a 24 hour basis, sending out messages at the rate of 100 words per minute.

#### SEE SS REPS FOR ANSWERS TO 77'S ON MEDICARE 88'S!

How may I file a request for Medicare payment? When should I file for a payment? Where do I get the forms to file a request for payment? Where do I send the request for payment? What can I do if I can't pay the doctor bills? According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, these questions are commonly asked by persons covered by Medicare.

Medicare is now more than four years old and still there are those not fully aware of its protection. If you think you may be eligible for some Medicare benefits, or if you have a parent, relative, or friend who may be eligible, contact your nearest social security office. The trained representatives there will be glad to answer your questions and to help you file a request for Medicare payment.

Under the law there are some time limits for claiming a refund of your medical expenses. For example, if you received medical services between October 1, 1968, and September 30, 1969, you must file a claim for any payment due you by December 31, 1970. Medicare can pay you if your claim is sent in within the time limit, so do not lose money by waiting too long to send in your claim.

Remember, if you have any questions regarding requesting payment, or wish assistance in filing a request for payment, contact your social security office in Abilene at Room 2321 of the Federal Building or see a representative of that office when he is in a town near you. ### Attention Vehicle Owners: Important Mail Will Be Coming Your Way Soon

If you own one or more of the more than seven million motor vehicles in Texas, there is some important mail coming your way early in January.

It is your registration renewal application. This is the second year of operation for the new, easy computerized registration procedure devised by the Texas Highway Department.

Last year, the system greatly reduced bothersome waits and long lines which plagued vehicle owners at county tax offices and substations in years past.

Prospects are that the system will work even better this year.

Also, it is not necessary to present last year's registration receipt of the certificate of title. The renewal application you will receive in the mail is all you will need.

Registration begins February 1 and continues through April 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked, "Important... This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

The application is a three-part form with instructions printed on it. One important thing to remember is the card should not be torn apart.

After the registration period begins February 1 each vehicle owner can take the renewal application and the fee to his county tax office, or he can order his plates by mail.

If the owner wishes to register his vehicle by mail, he should send the entire three-part renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to the local county tax office as early as January with the understanding that his license plates may not be mailed until Feb-

ruary 1. The additional \$1 charge covers cost of handling and postage.

If owners are to receive their plates by mail before the April 1 deadline, then they must send the renewal form, fee and \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the local county tax office by March 1. This allows 30 days before the April 1 registration deadline.

If the owner desires to go to the county tax office or substation, he will find shorter waiting lines.

All he needs to take with him is the renewal application and the fee. He will then re-

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q**—The income tax surcharge expired in June. Does that mean that money earned this fall is not subject to it?

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**A**—No, you do not unless you paid \$50 or more to any one person during a calendar quarter.

**Q**—A couple of days after I paid my tax bill I got another notice on it. What should I do?  
**A**—The latest notice you received was probably issued before the payment was credited to your account. In a case like yours where the payment was made a few days before receiving a notice, ignore it.

**Q**—My store is up for sale and one person who wants to buy it has offered to make a down payment and to pay the rest in three years. Can I save on taxes by having the money spread like that?  
**A**—There could be a tax advantage of reporting profits

from a sale over a period of years. Whether it will benefit you depends on your tax bracket and other income.

**Q**—Is money given a maid for carfare subject to Social Security tax?  
**A**—Yes, the Social Security tax applies to the total cash paid a household employee, even though some is paid for transportation.

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**A**—There could be a tax advantage of reporting profits

**Q**—I've been given an expense account on my new job. How will it affect my tax return?  
**A**—If you account to your employer for those expenses, you will not have to report them on your tax return. An exception occurs when your reimbursement exceeds your expenses. The excess then should be reported as income.

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# New Year Will See Changes In The State Department Public Welfare

The new year will see three major changes in the State Department of Public Welfare operation.

Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney recently announced the following changes due for implementation on January 4:

1. Use of a simplified eligibility application in the adult programs of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; and a "client-completed" form in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program.

2. A switch in social services from meeting long-term needs to meeting short-range, specific goals.

3. A change in staffing patterns to allow the Department to meet the caseload explosion with available personnel.

The simplified method for determining eligibility works much like the declaration system for income tax.

The applicant fills out the form himself, eliminating the need for a face-to-face interview with a caseworker.

"The procedure has built-in controls to guard against error and fraud," said Anderson D. Shawver, region administrator in Jacksboro, Texas. "Extensive tests in three regions for approximately a year showed very little error. Less than one percent of those applying and approved for assistance actually were ineligible."

"This simplified application shows faith in the dignity and responsibility of those who must ask for assistance," Hackney said. "On July 1, 1971, this method will be a mandatory federal requirement. Sheer numbers of applicants gave us the impetus to implement it six months early."

Hackney explained that pilot tests on a similar AFDC application produced "disappointing results," but that the Department is still trying to perfect the form.

"However," Hackney added, "the new client-completed form will be a time-saver. Applicants can meet in groups in which one caseworker can instruct them all to supply the necessary information adequately."

"Then each client will be contacted and the information verified in the traditional manner. Of course applicants can still apply individually."

The change in philosophy on social services for families and children serves two purposes, Hackney explained.

It spreads the available staff farther by limiting the length of time in which specific services are given.

Comprehensive studies have shown that meeting a specific, short-range goal can be a more efficient way of providing services to families.

"The Department will still have primary responsibility for child protection, foster care and adoption services for all Texas children," said Mr. Shawver.

"Our new job is mainly a referral and counseling service to help people overcome the barriers that stand in the way of their reaching the community resources at their disposal," Mr. Shawver continued.

Examples of what the social worker might do now were given as these:

Help an expectant mother find the right kind of medical care and enroll in a pre-natal class. Help her contact an agency that will provide a home aide while she is in the hospital. Arrange for other older children to stay in a day-care center while she is in the hospital and the father is working.

Or help a 17-year-old drop-out enroll in the Work Incentive Program that will allow him to learn a skill and receive work-related expenses during the training period.

Explain state and federal medical benefits to eligible recipients. Help a disabled person find a spot in a rehabilitation program.

Direct those interested in learning about birth control to the most convenient center for medical advice and materials. "Social services for those in the pure adult programs will be greatly limited to emergency services," Hackney said. "For instance, if an elderly person in need of medical care is living alone and has no one to help him enter a hospital an emergency caseworker will assist him."

"Our main problem will be in the rural areas where our workers will have great distances to travel and where community resources are few," Hackney continued.

The Commissioner explained that the new staffing plans allow a great deal of flexibility

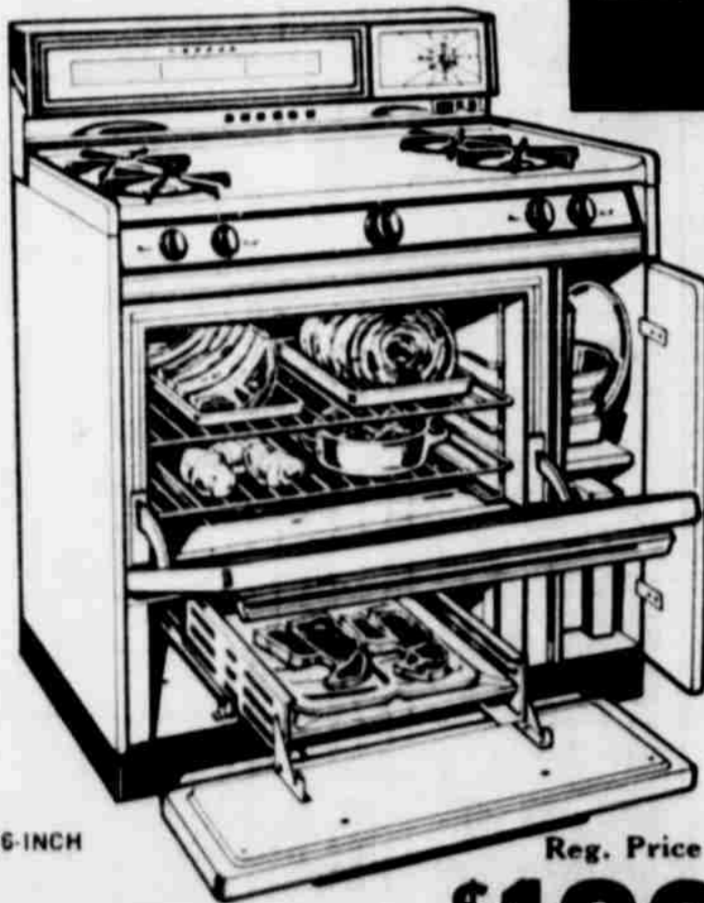

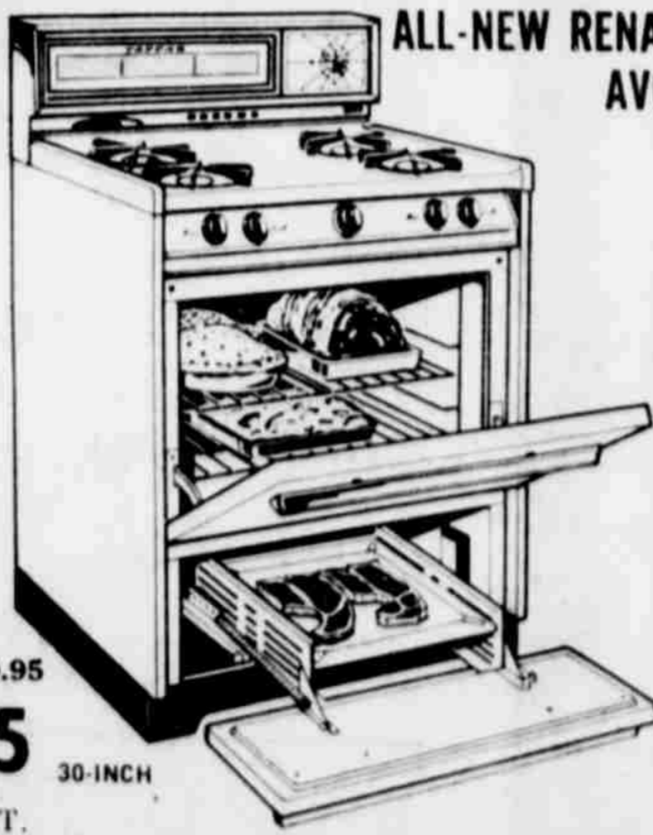

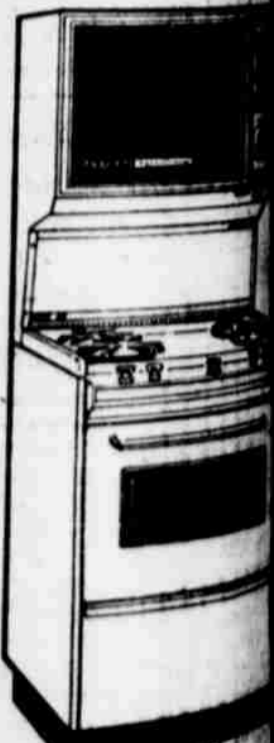
