Sewing Machine Should Be Given Routine Checkups

Do you ever sit down at your machine to sew and have everything go wrong? This dilemma can easily be avoided by giving your machine routine checkups, advises Mrs. Barbara Elliott, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Sewing machines should be cleaned regularly. To perform well, a machine needs to be kept lint-free and oiled.

To clean, use a soft brush to remove lint and loose threads. Then apply a drop of oil to all points which normally need oiling. Remove excess oil by stitching on scraps of fabric.

When the machine seems to be performing slower than usual, the gears may need lubrication. Apply the lubricant according to directions in your sewing machine instruction booklet.

When the top tension thread keeps breaking, re-thread the machine. If this doesn't help, check for correct needle size and length, then see if the needle was inserted properly. If you still have trouble, loosen the upper tension. Sometimes the thread is not the correct size for the needle or fabric.

If the bobbin thread breaks, the thread may not be wound evenly on the bobbin or it may be wound too full. Also, the tension may be too tight.

When the machine skips stitches, check for correct needle size and proper needle insertion. The thread may be too coarse for the needle. Again check the tension; it may be too tight.

Rotarians Hear Facts About New Farm Program

Members and guests of the Haskell Rotary Club met at the City Cafe at noon, Thursday, January 7, with president Bob Herrin presiding for the luncheon session.

The invocation was given by Rev. H. O. Abbott and the lively song session led by H. V. Woodard, with Gail Barnett,

club pianist providing accompaniment.

R. C. Couch was program chairman and he utilized the opportunity to present an interesting and educational talk on the new farm program which is in effect for the next three years. He explained that it is basically designed to give the farmer and rancher the privilege or opportunity of deciding for himself what to plant or sow on his farm acreage, and how much. Several technical differences in the new program over the one just discarded include the fact that prior to this year the farmers received 16.8 cents times 65% of the allotment and the new program will be 67.5% of last year's allotment times 15 cents. In his opinion the overall income from ranching and agriculture for Haskell County will be lowered by about 10% on the new program. This, he said, "as strictly a calculated guess, will mean

20% less volume dollars over the year." Farmers will simply have to reorganize their operations and plan on a three year basis, he said, and also will have to become better managers and try to lower the cost of production if they make money out of their operations." He also voiced a personal opinion that it would cause many farmers to operate on a larger scale to endeavor to make up the loss.

A short business session was held at which time "Prexy" Herrin advised club members that the Rotary Club had spent \$263.66 on the meeting hall, and that as soon as the utilities were provided, it would be available for the Scout Troop which is sponsored by the Rotary Club.

Robert V. Reynolds Named Deputy Director of FFA's Southwest Region

Robert V. Reynolds, formerly of Haskell, Assistant Administrator for General Aviation Affairs of the Federal Aviation Administration / Department of Transportation since 1965, has been appointed Deputy Director of the FFA's Southwest Region in Fort Worth. He has reported to his new assignment.

The appointment was announced by FFA Administrator John H. Shaffer, who said that Reynolds' more than three decades of experience "has justifiably earned him the title of Mr. General Aviation."

"He will bring to his new job assignment an unparalleled dimension of expertise at a time when general aviation (non-airline) continues to play a major role in the aviation industry," Mr. Shaffer said. "Our loss of his services in Washington, D. C. will certainly be a large gain for the Southwest."

The FFA's Southwest Region includes Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Reynolds will actually be returning to familiar surroundings. Not only is he a native of Texas, but he served as Deputy Director of the Southwest Region during 1961-63. He will be succeeding A. Leighton Coulter, who has been appointed Director of the FAA's Aeronautical Center in Oklahoma City.

In March 1968, Reynolds was honored at the International Exposition of Flight. Last March, he was given the DOT/FAA Meritorious Service Award. Two months later, in Sweden, he was presented with a Special Award for service to General Aviation by the International Council of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association.

Born in Haskell, Texas, Reynolds attended Baylor University

He was named Chief of the General Safety Division in New York City in December 1957 and was in charge of general aviation safety programs in FFA's Eastern Region. He was transferred to Los Angeles the following September to assume similar responsibilities for the

Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Can a child born before the end of the year be claimed as a dependent for the whole year?

A—Yes, as long as the dependency tests are met for the balance of the tax year in which the child was born.

Q—I didn't have a job when I moved here. Does that mean I won't be able to deduct my moving costs?

A—You may be able to deduct your moving expenses if you meet certain requirements. In fact, anyone moving to accept a new job as well as someone transferred to a new location by his present employer may qualify.

The first requirement is that your new place of employment be at least 50 miles farther from your old home than your previous job was.

The second requirement is that you be a full-time employee on your new job for at least 39 weeks during the 12 months following the move.

A—File an estimated tax declaration, Form 1040ES, as soon as possible and pay whatever should have been paid by this date. This will reduce the penalty for underpayment of estimated tax. Form 1040ES and instructions may be obtained from any IRS office.

SPACE AND AERONAUTICS

When the aircraft carrier USS New Orleans recovers the crew of Apollo 14 in mid-Pacific on Feb. 9, it will be the Navy's 24th recovery of a U. S. astronaut team. Alan Shepard, America's first man in space, will make his second venture into the wild blue yonder when he goes up in Apollo 14. It will be the first space flight for his crewmen, Ed Mitchell and Stu Roosa. The lift-off is now scheduled for 3:23 p. m. EST, Jan. 31, 1971.

Apollo 14 will be launched from Cape Kennedy with the mighty Saturn V, the world's most powerful rocket. Its first stage, propelled by five engines, generates 7,500,000 pounds of thrust. These kerosene burning engines share the weight lifting championship at 1,500,000 pounds each.

The lunar landing site for this launch, Fra Mauro, is the one previously selected for the aborted Apollo 13 flight which didn't make it to the Moon's surface. NASA scientists figure this location promises great scientific return. This hilly upland region is 50 miles north of the Fra Mauro crater. The crew plans to bring back lunar materials which scientists believe were tossed up from deep inside the Moon when a smaller moon or large meteorite impacted the area four to five

billions years ago. If all goes well with Apollo 14, Alan Shepard should set foot on the Moon at 9:10 a. m. EST, Feb. 5, and Ed Mitchell a half hour later for about a four to five hour stay on the lunar surface, and repeat this performance the following morning. This lunar landing will bring to six the men from planet Earth who have landed on the Moon, all Americans. The first two were Armstrong and Aldrin, the second pair was Conrad and Bean. The first two teams of lunar explorers had to tote their own equipment around. The next team will have the aid of a two-wheel cart with the unlikely technical name of Modularized Equipment Transporter (MET). Naturally, the boys at the Manned Spacecraft Center couldn't stand this for very long, so they have come up with their own name. Of course, it's the Shepard Rickshaw.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:
Come January 1st each year the Government or Internal Revenue Service owes about two-thirds of our Nation's taxpayers a refund. On the day after Christmas there are probably more than two-thirds of our taxpayers who owe more Christmas bills than they thought they did. The Internal Revenue Service is perfectly happy to get tax returns right after New Years and to start processing refund checks. Of course, some taxpayers have trouble in getting their W-2's from their employers before the end of January but there are a lot of folks who sweat over Christmas bills bankruptcy that haven't filed. Don't expect IRS to provide instant cash to help you kick the wolf from the door, but you may find the solution to at least part of your problem by filing for that refund as early as possible. Internal Revenue requires an average of six weeks to process refunds, but early filers usually get their checks sooner.

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Weinert Student At McMurry College Will Assist Handicapped Children

Four McMurry College students will spend much of January in Brownwood devising playground equipment for handicapped children.

One is a Brownwood resident—Charlotte Jo Adams of 2409 Southside Drive.

The others are Cecil Ray Davis of Weinert, Davela Ann Edens of Dalhart, and Laura Norton Guthrie of Abilene, formerly of Knox City.

All are enrolled in a directed studies course for physical education credit during the new January Term at McMurry. Dr. Ralph G. Hester, department chairman, is in charge of this learning-by-doing class.

"They will be developing a play program in the Little Flame School of the Central Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center," says Jackson King, MHE&MR director.

He explains that the students will not only set up playground equipment, but they will actually be improvising various play devices to further both physical development and social interaction.

Dr. Hester says they must first understand the movement problems of these children. "Many are physically as well as mentally retarded."

Next, the students will study the types of equipment which can be conducive to development of the children in a play setting.

"They will be visiting various surplus property places and looking into every possible way to improvise equipment in order to keep costs down," explains the McMurry professor. "This is part of the project—to improvise."

The students will have one other qualification to keep in mind. "The equipment is not only for the children ages three to eight who will use it now. It will eventually be used by children up through age 15 whom the administration plans to add within the next year or two. They must develop equipment for a widely varied age group."

Miss Adams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Adams of Brownwood, is a junior secondary education student with teaching fields in English and physical education. She graduated from Brownwood High in 1968.

Miss Edens, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Davis B. Edens of Dalhart, is a senior majoring in elementary education and minoring in physical education. She graduated from Denver City High School in 1967.

Mrs. Guthrie, whose husband is Gerald W. Guthrie, is majoring in elementary education and minoring in physical education. She was born in Knox City. She is a senior.

Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Davis of Box 94, Weinert, is a senior majoring in physical education and minoring in business. He graduated from Weinert High in 1967.
