## Livestock Ordinance

The Stratford City council met in
regular sesssion Thursday August 1 and discussed the possibility of purchasing a used overhead water
storage tank. One has been located for $\$ 190,000$ for a 250,000 gallon
fork. A new 200,000 gallon tank tank. A new 200,000 gallon tank
would cost about 5210,000 . The price for the used tank includes it being torn down from its present location
in Sugarland, Texas, delivered, set up and painted.
About three years ago, the present overhead storage tank was fiberglass lined because it was rusting on the
inside. This should extend the life of nside. This should extend the life of
the tank for about 10 years. The Counsel was informed that this was Counsel was infrmed that his was done to the tank becuse of its age.
The present tank was built around 1900 or 1910 .
