Progress Towards Early Construction Of Water Reservoir Is Proceeding

Progress towards early construction of the water reservoir for area towns of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority is proceeding as rapidly as possible. This was the report released by officials of the Authority after a conference in Dallas, last Monday.

Engineers of the Authority are completing final plans and specifications, which include the necessary changes for water to be supplied to Knox City, which became a member town by election of its citizens and action of State Legislature.

Bond Attorneys for NCTMWA have informed officials of the Authority they are coordinating efforts and completing reports to the Texas Water Development Board for bond purchase by the State of Texas. The low-interest rate on bonds and participation by the State is a valued asset to the project for this area.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development, through whom the NCTMWA acquired a Federal grant of \$1,500,000, announced they are hopeful the project can proceed to the construction phase as soon as possible.

Personnel of the Water Authority office have worked through the summer completing ownership and property valuations. This work has been completed, with the exception of Equalization Board meetings which will be held in the near future.

NO TAX WILL BE LEVIED BY THE AUTHORITY FOR 1969, but an equalized, certified roll is necessary for bond procedure. Letters will be sent to all persons whose name appears on the rolls, stating the values set and the time and place of Equalization Board meetings. Legal notices will appear in local newspapers at least 10 days before such meetings will be held.

Further explanation of values and rates will be explained in subsequent issues of local newspapers.

Sub-Region 3 West Central Texas COG To Meet In Haskell, Monday

Sub-region 3 of the West Central Texas Council of Governments, comprised of Haskell, Knox, Kent, Stonewall and Throckmorton counties, will hold its yearly sub-regional meeting on Monday, October 27th, at 2:00 p. m. in the District Courtroom, Haskell County Courthouse, to select representatives to the Board of Directors and Executive Committee for 1970.

Sub-region 3 is entitled to Board of Directors representation from the following categories, some by appointment and some by election designated as follows:

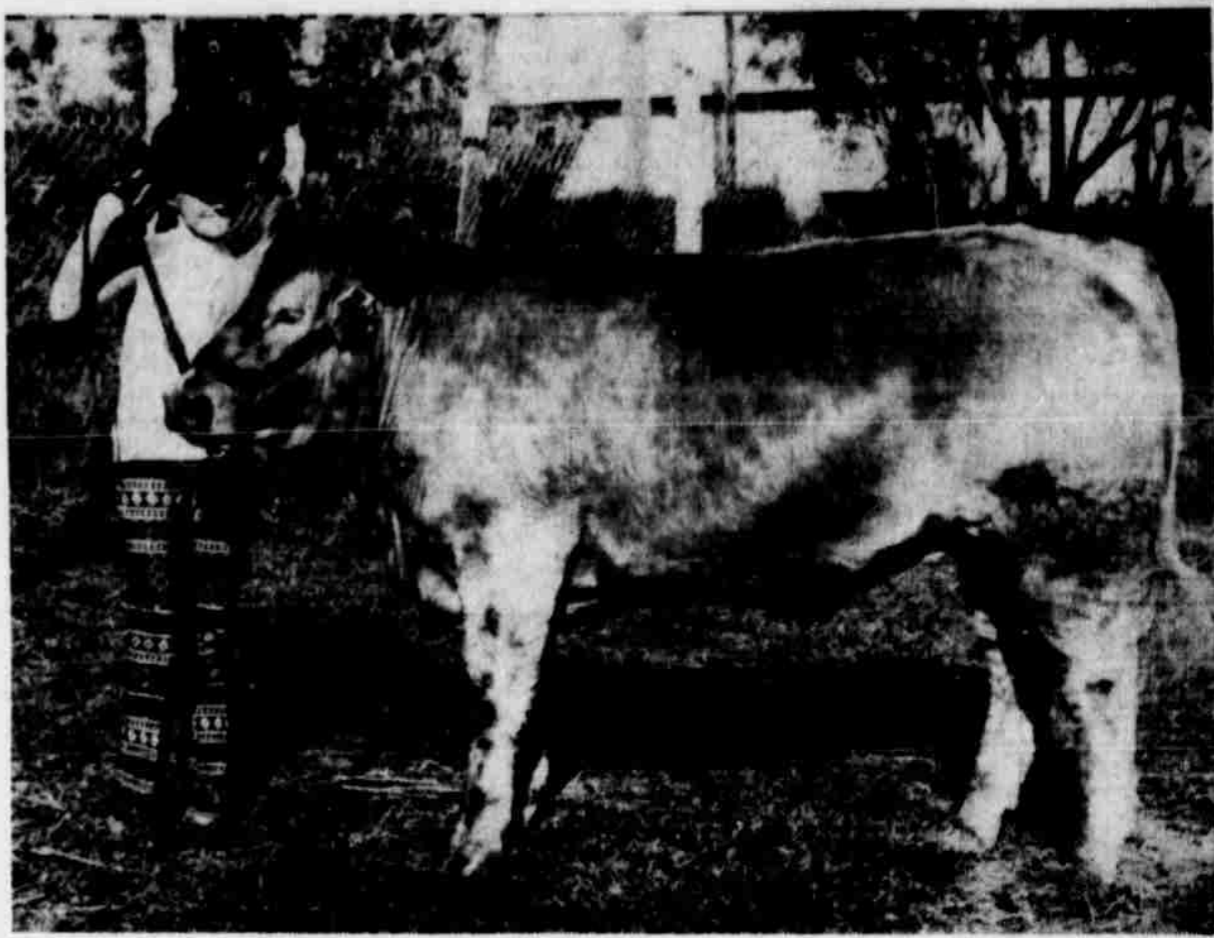
- (1) Each county member shall have one representative who is a member of the county commissioners court and appointed by the commissioners court.
- (2) Member cities shall be entitled to one representative for every five such cities or fraction thereof. This is by election and the representatives must be elected officials from the council or commission of such cities.

Sub-region 3 will need to send representatives to elect two Board members from the ten cities of Jayton, Gore, Haskell, Munday, O'Brien, Rochester, Throckmorton, Woodson, Aspermont and Weinert.

Reducing the number of boll weevils that survive the winter is the prime goal of a diapause control program, according to Emory Boring, entomologist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Vernon.

"To survive the winter, the boll weevil must attain a condition called diapause," Boring pointed out. "The weevil late in summer begins to add body fat, stops reproductive activities and goes through other physiological changes that prepare him for hibernation."

The diapause control program calls for continued poisoning in early fall until all bolls are

mature ... He pointed out that this procedure will reduce weevils entering hibernation more than 90 per cent.

With fewer weevils entering hibernation in the fall, far smaller numbers survive the winter and emerge into young cotton in the spring. This means that many cotton farmers do not have to poison for weevil control until August, which allows beneficial insects to increase and help control boll worms. Properly carried out, the program will result in a 30 to 50 per cent reduction in costs of insect control plus increased yields, Boring said.

"Boll worms have become a major threat to our cotton because we have in the past killed out natural enemies of the worms (beneficial insects) through early poisoning for boll weevils. If we can avoid early weevil poisoning, the beneficial insects will give con-



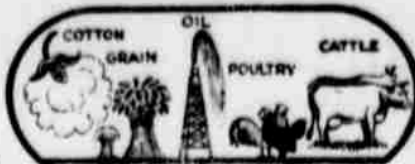

Rev. Pinkerton Baptist Church Ordains Pastor

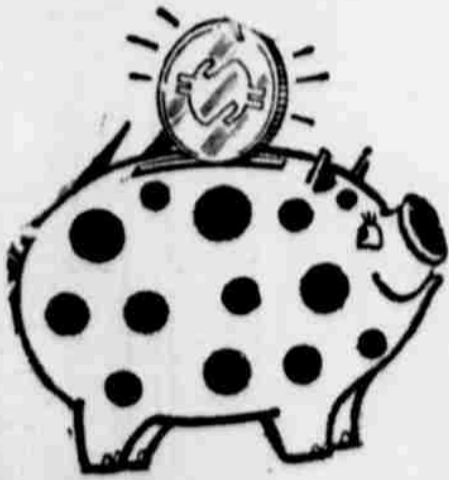

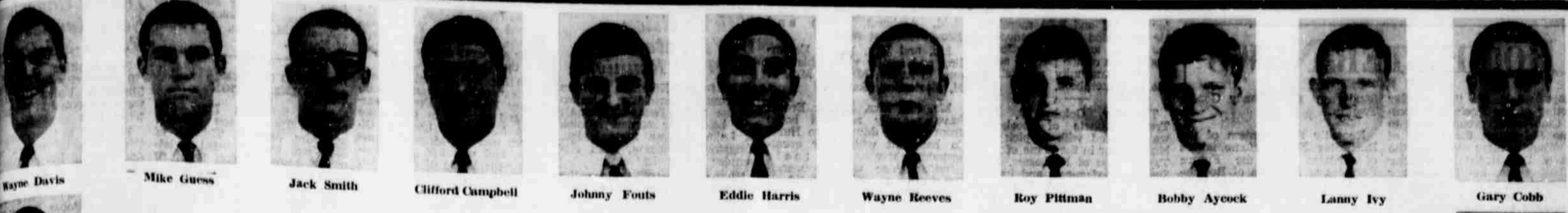

90th Division WWI Veterans To Hold Reunion

The famed Ninetieth Division Veterans of World War I, known as the "TO" (Texas-Oklahoma), will hold their annual reunion at Lake Texoma State Lodge, Kingston, Oklahoma, from November 6-9, inclusive.

Known as "TO" since the majority of men were from these states; however, many men were from North Central

States—Camp Dodge, Iowa. Organized at Camp Travis, San Antonio, Texas, in August 1917, Major General Henry T. Allen was the first commander.

The Ninetieth Division was a member of American Expeditionary Forces in France, participated actively in the Battle of St. Mihiel, the Lorraine Offensive and the Meuse-Argonne Drive, and was the pivot division in the Battle of St. Mihiel.

The Division received special citation from General John J. Pershing, Commander of American Armies in France, and was selected as one of the divisions in the occupation of Germany.

Over 50,000 men served in the Ninetieth Division... it is estimated that over 12,000 of these are still living. Over fifty per cent of them are living in Texas; over 2,000 are living in Oklahoma. Others live largely in the North Central States.

The Division was demobilized after World War I at Camp Pike, Little Rock, Arkansas, and Camp Bowie, Fort Worth, Texas, in June 1919 by Major General Charles H. Martin.

Among the men and women from over twenty states who will attend the reunion, will be Mr. and Mrs. Jno. P. Payne, of Haskell.
