Only a small number of Haskell voters marched to the polls Monday; however the 1 per cent sales and use tax was adopted by a vote of 222 for, to 143 against.

In a called meeting of the city council Monday night, returns were canvassed and a certified copy of the results, along with a map of the city, and other papers have been forwarded to the State Comptroller's office.

Under the state law by which cities are given the right to collect the 1 per cent tax, the new levy, here, however, will not become effective until the first of April, 1970.

The tax will be collected at the same time the state tax is paid. Merchants will remit all the money to the state, and the state in turn will pay the city.

Conservative estimates is that the city of Haskell will receive between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year from the source.

The additional 1 cent tax will strengthen services and help finance much needed capital improvements for Haskell.

Children anticipate Christmas and Santa Claus all year and as the time comes closer, it may be more difficult to maintain order and peace in the home.

Avoid this tension, but not by threatening, "If you aren't good, Santa Claus won't bring you..."

Try to stick to regular routines as much as possible. Children need their regular sleep and eating times.

Children build up excitement quickly, making life unpleasant for parents around Christmas, if they have no outlets for energy and anticipation.

- Orange Candy Slice Cake
- 2 sticks butter, soft

- 4 eggs

- 1 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1 t. soda
- 1/4 t. salt
- 2 cups pecans, chopped
- 1 cup coconut, flaked
- Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well. Add 1 c. buttermilk. Beat well. Add soda to remaining 1/2 cup buttermilk. Add to mixture. Combine dry ingredients. Add to mixture. Beat well. Add orange candy slices, dates, nuts and coconut and blend. Line tube pan with well greased brown paper. Bake 275 degrees F. for 2 1/2 hours or 300 degrees F. for 1 1/2 hours.
- TO ICE:
- 1 can small frozen orange juice (thawed) add 1/2 c. light brown sugar. Let stand while cake bakes. Pour on cake while hot. Let cake cool in pan before removing.

## Spanish Teacher From South America Visits In Haskell

kell this past Saturday spending the day visiting. Mr. Bhatt and Miss Ambrosi were entertained in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Howell Greene.

Mr. Bhatt prepared some typical Indian dishes for the noon meal, and there was time for an exchange of ideas concerning culture, politics, education, etc., of the two countries compared with their experiences here in the U. S.

Miss Ambrosi has given a program for the Rotary Club in Stamford, attended and spoken to the B&PW Club in Haskell, attended a textbook meeting and dinner in Abilene, attended a Stamford classroom teachers' social, along with having gone horseback riding, visited several ranches and farms in this area and gone deer and quail hunting on Mrs. Morales' part of the Coody Ranch.

Miss Ambrosi will leave this Saturday for Lubbock.

Norma Mabel Ambrosi Per-tierra is the daughter of Sr. Jose Agustine Ambrosi y Sra. Pilar Per-tierra de Ambrosi, her mother being of Spanish descent and her father of Italian origin. Norma was born and has lived all of her life in Argentina. She is from the town of General Via Monte, province of Cordoba, Argentina, South America. She is living in the home of the R. L. Morales' while serving as an assistant or aide helping Mrs. Morales with her Spanish classes in Stamford. Norma tells us that she shortens her name to Norma Ambrosi. She says that some in her country still use the double last name which has been traditional for so long in Spanish-speaking countries but that also many in her country have modernized and are using just the father's last name as we do.

Norma has attended both public schools and private schools while obtaining her elementary and high school education. She finished through her 5th year in public school in General Via Monte — her hometown mentioned above — where her father is a rancher and farmer. She then began her traveling at an early age. She went to Buenos Aires, the capital of Argentina, La Carjota, and Rosario, second largest city in Argentina, attending Nun's schools to complete her high school education. Since completion of her secondary work, she has traveled throughout most of her country. However, this trip and experience in the U. S. is her first trip out of her country. She visited Mexico on her way to Texas, and we here in Haskell and Stamford are the first to enjoy her company here in the U. S. Her plane landed in Houston where she boarded a bus immediately and after riding some 18 hours she arrived at the bus station in Haskell at 3:00 one Monday morning.

After finishing her high school or secondary schooling as they call it in Argentina, in 1959, Norma was prepared and qualified to be an elementary school teacher. In 1959 she returned home to General Via Monte which she tells us is just about the size of Haskell. Here she worked as a secretary in the high school for 3 years before beginning her university level studies. She describes her hometown as being a ranching and farming part of her country. In Argentina they raise Angus, Herefords, and Shorthorns, as well as a breed of cattle known as Cebu which Argentina brought from Brazil, but this breed originates in India. These Cebu are found in the northern part of Argentina. These seem to adapt better to the climate there, and also they were first introduced by a Brazilian who has a big ranch (the large ranches in Argentina are called estancias) in the north of Argentina. We might mention here that as dairy cattle, they use the Holstein. Also in the south of the country in a region called Patagonia, one finds a sheep-raising area.

As far as cultivation, one may find nearly all the crops which are grown locally around here — such as wheat, barley, oats, cotton, corn and some rice in parts. Argentina also has many natural resources and some oil production. They have a fruit growing region around Mendoza, and many good vineyards from which come good wines.

In 1963, she went to the city of Cordoba in the province of the center of Argentina or the heart of the country where she began her university studies. She studied in three different schools while there: the B-National Center, which is an American sponsored institution, and these are found in other South American countries also, the Alianza Francesa — a French school, and the Universidad Nacional de Cordoba. After the equivalent of 5 years of university study, Norma graduated as an English teacher ... her major field of study having been in English literature and history of England. She had also studied 4 years of French. She then took a job in the south of the region known as Patagonia on the Rio Negro (Black River) where she taught English as a foreign language, English literature, English history and a special course on Shakespeare in the Instituto Superior de Profesorado in the city of Rio Negro, Patagonia, which is situated on the Rio Negro River. This institute was a small college of some 300 students.

Norma then got word that she could have an opportunity to come to the U. S. with a program sponsored by an Institute called Amity in Del Mar, Cali-

WASHINGTON, D. C.—There is little doubt and, in most instances, well documented, that there has never been a war in which there have not been atrocities committed on both sides of the conflict. This has been especially true in civil and revolutionary wars when one side fights with underground guerrilla type tactics. In these cases it becomes impossible to always distinguish between friend or foe or sometimes between men and women, children and adults. It is known that in the guerrilla type operation combatants often use civilians as suppliers, spies, shields and assassins. A mine laid by a school boy shatters the body as if it were laid by an adult soldier.

History mentions that the Bolsheviks in the Russian Revolution of 1917 had women out in front of them to first face the Cossacks.

In World War I the British were accused of conducting terrorist campaigns in which atrocities were committed before joined by the Americans against the Germans.

There is, however, usually a great deal more added than facts support. This may be called the "campaign" of atrocity accusations for propaganda purposes. There were the horror stories about the Nazi, the French in Algeria, the Kuomintang in China, Batista in Cuba and the accusations against the United States that germ warfare was used in the Korean war. The fact remains that there has been some truth about atrocities by the very nature of war. The exception—the germ warfare in Korea.


The news media around the world described French atrocities during the Algerian war but from all accounts the Algerian revolutionaries were many times worse and were experts at atrocities. Terror inevitably invokes counter-terror whether committed in prior centuries or in the 20th Century of Algeria, Vietnam or in the Middle East between the Israelis and Arabs.

It is possible and likely that some American soldiers in Vietnam have committed acts that, whatever the provocation, must be defined as atrocities. The truth should be faced and the individuals judged. It is another thing, however, for American soldiers, whether individually, by platoons, companies or on up to every boy in Vietnam to be judged by ugly sensationalism and used as a front for an attack on US policy and leadership. This type of propaganda is grist for the propaganda mill up our friends who support our position in Vietnam.

It is difficult for anyone who has not been there to know what they might do under a given circumstance. The individual soldier coming out of the jungle into the clearing of a village known to be occupied by the Viet Cong, weary and afraid, may not always be able to identify an enemy ready to take his life. These overwhelming conditions may well cause an

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APPLE CENTERPIECE

Apples and evergreens from your own garden will make the perfect centerpiece for your holiday dinner table.

Remove the stems of eight shiny red apples and scoop out holes large enough for 5-inch candles. If you want your centerpiece to last through the holidays, coat the apples with a clear lacquer to prevent shriveling.

String the apples on a piece of heavy wire (14 gauge) about 38 inches long, spacing the apples evenly. Bend wire into a circle and secure both ends in one apple. You could, of course, just stand the apples in a circle. But the wire holds them securely, so that if something should bump into them they won't topple over.

Fasten the candles with a few drops of melted wax. Cover wire with sprigs of evergreen or strands of pine.

For the center, choose the largest apple you can find, scoop out the stem, and wedge a tall candle in the hole by using sprigs of evergreen.

You can achieve a color scheme to suit your holiday decor by the kind of apples you choose — red or yellow, or even green; by the kind of evergreens you use; and by the color of candles you select. Use red apples with red or white (or both) candles and evergreens such as cryptomeria, white pine, balsam; use yellow apples and yellow or white candles with yellowish-green foliage; green apples and blue candles with bluish-green evergreens.

If there is a flickering in your fireplace, toss in a few scraps of apple peel and some twigs of evergreen — they will give a lovely aroma!

**SOME SOCIAL SECURITY WORK IS STILL NOT PROPERLY CREDITED**

Some people are still not getting social security credit for their work, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene. These

are usually people who work as babysitters, housekeepers, yardworkers, and as other types of household employees.

He said anyone who hires a household worker must report the employee's wages if he pays the worker a total of \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter. He added that many persons seem to be unaware of this responsibility even though it has been required by law for many years. Failure to make these reports on time and to send in the required taxes with the reports, may result in the employer having to pay all the back taxes, plus interest and penalty. This could amount to hundreds of dollars.

Employers of household help may obtain instructions and reporting forms by calling or writing the Abilene social security office and asking for Form SSI-21, he concluded. The address is Box 3258, Abilene 79604.
