A-The answer to both of your questions is "No." The amount of your wife's income has no bearing on your dependency status as far as educational assistance is concerned.

Questions & Answers On Haskell's **Penny Sales Tax:**

How Much is the proposed municipal sales tax?

A penny on a dollar's worth of certain purchases.

It is a 1\" limited sales and use tax on certain tangible property which is subject to the present State Sales Tax. The same exemptions allowed by the State Sales Tax would also apply to the City Sales Tax. Excluded from the tax are certain essential items such as groceries, drugs, automobiles and gasoline. All State and City sales taxes may be deducted on your Federal Income Tax return.

Why do we need the additional revenue?

As a growing city, Haskell needs substantially increased revenues for improving and strengthening services, and to finance much needed capital improvements. Present methods of financing and complete dependence on the ad valorem property tax for revenue are insufficient to provide for present needs and future growth.

Additional revenue is needed to hire more policemen; street lighting must be increased; street maintenance must be accelerated; pensions for firemen must be properly financed; vital City departments must be better manned and equipped; capital improvements must be made on a planned basis.

The question Haskell faces is not whether to increase taxes to raise the necessary revenue, but HOW the taxes should be increased. The City has only two alternatives - the penny City sales tax, or an increase in the property tax.

Can the City of Haskell increase the sales tax percentage?

No, the 1 tax is set by Texas law and cannot be increased.

Do other cities have a municipal sales tax?

Yes. Over 2,700 municipalities and some 700 counties in the nation have turned to the municipal sales tax as the best and fairest answer to their money problems. Cities in all of Texas' neighboring states and practically every other state have municipal sales taxes. Experience with the local sales tax in all of these states, according to their own reports, is that it has become an important source of local revenue, has eased the strain on the property tax, has not been unduly burdensome on persons of lower income, and has definiely not had any adverse effect upon local business.


