The right circle contains the Eagle, our national emblem, symbol of strength and victory; the shield signifies self-reliance; the bar of the shield stands for

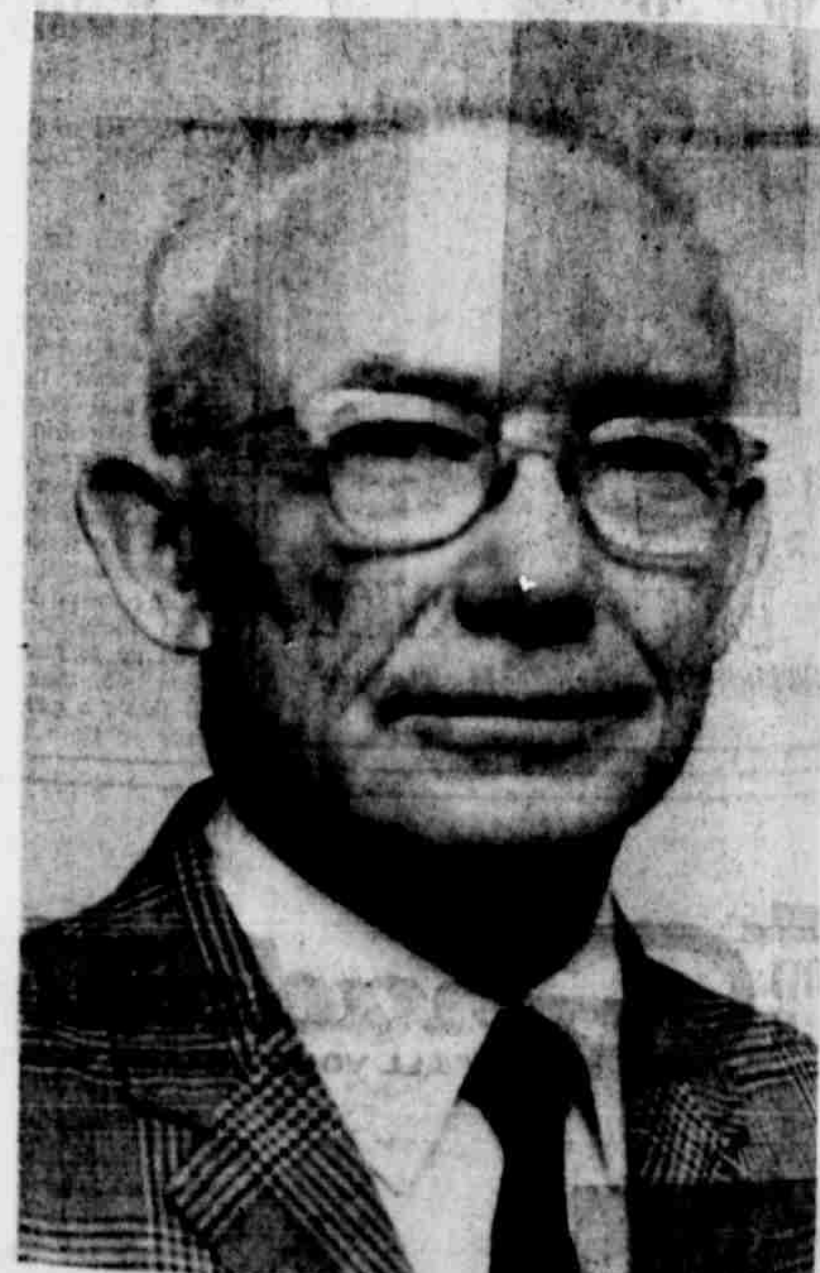

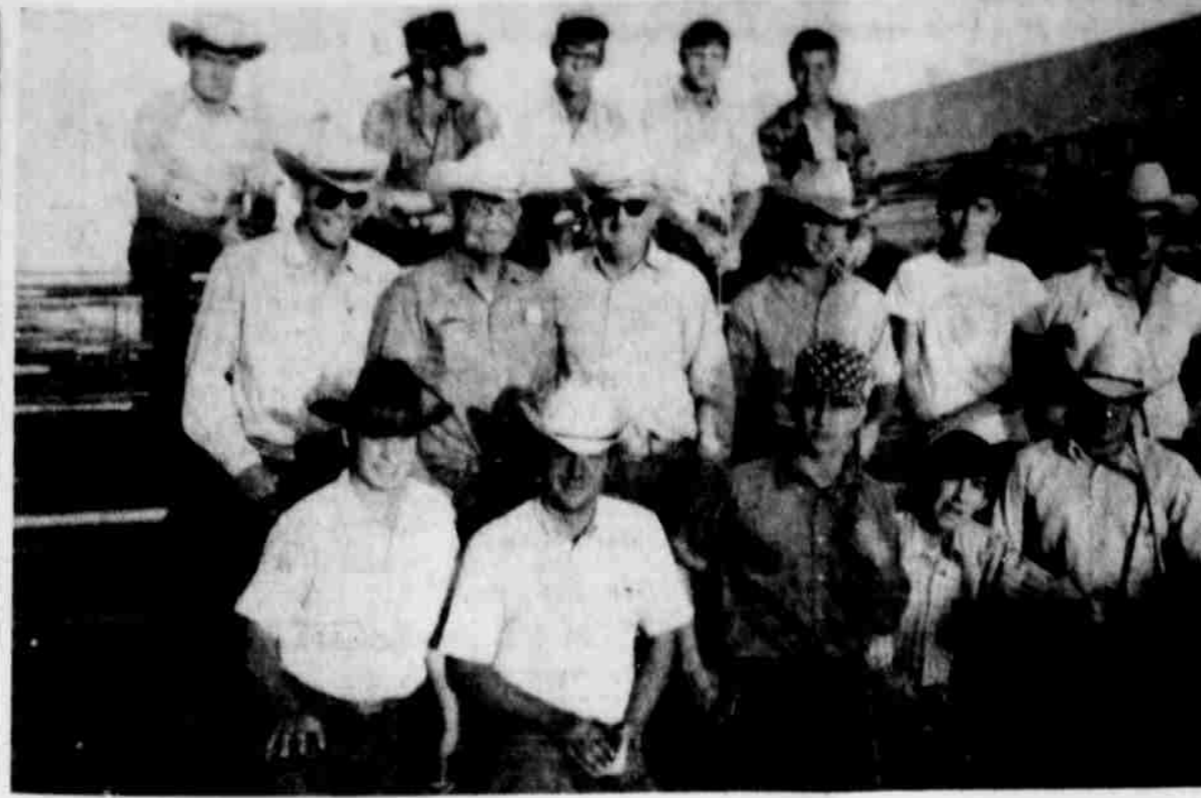

Scotty is a student in agricultural engineering, and will be a senior in the fall. He graduated from Seymour High School in 1968.

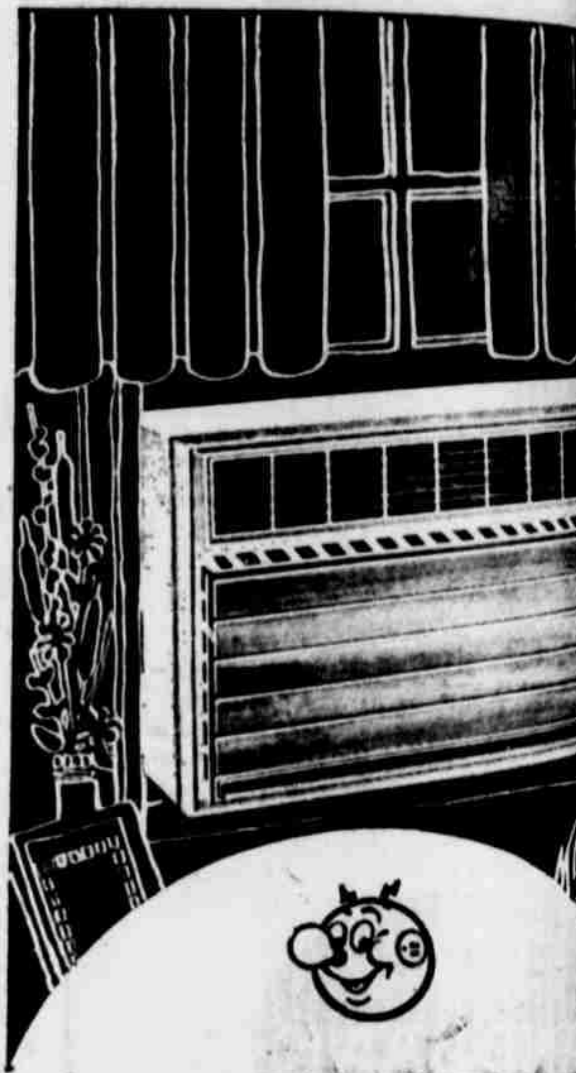

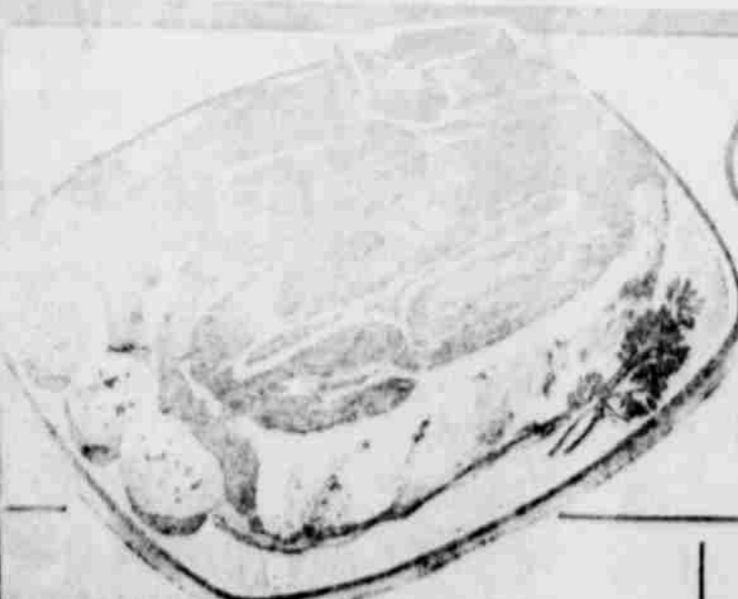
