



Pat Hale Is Elected President Of Haskell County Fair Association

The Haskell County Fair Association met at Felker's Restaurant at 7 p. m., Thursday, February 25, for the purpose of electing new officers to head the organization for 1971.

President C. A. Thomas presided for the business session, which covered numerous phases relative to the staging and promotion of the 1971 Fair which will be held on Thursday, September 30, and Friday and Saturday, October 1 and 2.

Pat Hale of the Hale Farm Supply was elected to serve as president for this year, with A. D. May of Rule, first vice president, and C. A. Thomas Jr., of Haskell, as second vice president. Rex Felker, Chamber of Commerce manager, was again elected to serve as executive secretary-treasurer and several new directors from the county towns and communities were appointed to serve with names to be publicized after acceptance of a place on the board of directors.

Thirty-one officers and directors selected on a county-wide basis comprise the board which has staged three annual fairs that have been most outstanding from the standpoint of all types of exhibits and entertainment as well as financial.

In the round table discussions last Thursday night, numerous added features were discussed with emphasis being placed on new facilities needed at the grounds and outstanding entertainment that will continue to draw the thousands of visitors to the annual fair.

Present plans call for the erection of new rest room facilities on the grounds before the opening date of this year's fair on September 30. Also discussed at length was the possibility of featuring what will be called, "The Children's Barnyard" as a main attraction for the small fry this year. The mother and young of many types of animals would be on display in a huge tent or building for the entertainment and education of the young folks.

Work has already begun on several phases of the fair to include the gigantic parade which will officially kick-off the county fair on Thursday and nightly entertainment features for each night of the Fair's three day and night run.

Division superintendents were also elected to head up the many different committees necessary to stage the type of fair which will continue to grow annually as a big attraction in the Big Country and for the education of the boys and girls of the area in farm and ranch products.

Several hundred men and women of Haskell County worked diligently on the fair for the past three seasons and all present for the meeting were in full agreement that each was thought to be the greatest success possible, yet the next production even exceeded the one of last year and that great encouragement was received by the workers to strive to make each annual fair better than ever.

The opinion of board members is that with Pat Hale, a tireless civic worker as president, along with A. D. May and C. A. Thomas, both ex-presidents, to lend assistance, that prospects are indeed good for the 1971 Haskell County Fair to be even larger than the previous one.

E. O. Morgan, president; O. E. Linton, vice-president and members Eddie Sanders, Len Tibbetts and Dan Griffith, who served as secretary in the absence of Jern P. Payne, convened February 18th in special session and called an election to be held Tuesday, March 16, throughout the Hospital District on the following two propositions:

Proposition Number One: Shall the Board of Directors of the Haskell County Hospital District be authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax at a rate of not to exceed seventy-five cents (.75) upon each one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within said District for the year of 1971 and for each year thereafter, for the purpose of (1) paying the interest on, and creating a sinking fund for bonds assumed or issued or to be issued by the Hospital District for Hospital District purposes, (2) providing for the operation and maintenance of the Hospital or Hospital system; and (3), for the purpose of making further improvements and additions to the Hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor, by purchase, lease or combination?

Proposition Number Two: Shall the Board of Directors of the Haskell County Hospital District be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of two hundred thousand and No/100 dollars (\$200,000.00), for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for Hospital purposes and for any and all of such purposes and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually Ad Valorem taxes on all taxable property in said district, subject to Hospital District taxation, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due (providing such tax, together with all other taxes of the District shall not exceed in any one year the rate of 75c on each \$100 valuation), said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues, to mature serially or otherwise not more than ten (10) years from their date and to bear interest at such rate or rates as the Board of Directors may determine in its discretion not to exceed six per centum per annum.

The Board of Directors felt it was necessary to define and outline its intention of applying the proceeds from the 75 cent tax provided for in Proposition Number One, should both of the above propositions carry.

Should the qualified voters approve Proposition Number One, it is the intention of the Board to increase the levy of 30 cents to 55 cents, for the purpose of maintaining and operating facilities in the district, and to reduce such tax levy when possible.

Should the qualified voters also approve Proposition Number Two, it is the intention of the Board to levy 20 cents, of the 75 cents, for a period of only 8 years, for the purpose of paying principal and interest of the \$200,000 expansion and improvement bonds authorized in Proposition Number Two.

It will be the intention of the Board to discontinue the levy of the 20 cent tax at the end of 8 years, or in the year 1979, for it has been determined that the \$200,000 bonds can be paid from tax levies in the years 1971 through 1978.

It will be the intention of the Board to transfer to the operation and maintenance fund of the hospital and all excess money above the total needed to pay all principal and interest of the \$200,000 bonds.

Qualified voters will receive fact sheets through the mail, concerning the upcoming Tax and Bond Election for the Haskell County Hospital District. Voters are asked to study the propositions, and then go to the polls, Tuesday, March 16, and vote.

Voting by absentee ends on Friday, March 12th. Absentee ballots may be cast at the County Clerk's Office, courthouse.

Murder Trial In Progress At Press Time

It required almost two days, Monday and Tuesday, to select the jury for the murder trial of an Abilene man, Robert Haas, 36. Testimony began about mid-afternoon Tuesday in Judge Ben Charlie Chapman's 39th District Court.

Haskell District Attorney Royce Adkins said 108 prospective jurors were called for questioning.

Haas is charged with the beating death of his six-year-old daughter, Teresa Ann. The child was admitted to Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene, in critical condition last September 17. After the child died September 20, a 104th District Grand Jury indicted Haas for murder with malice. In January, Judge J. Neil Daniel granted a defense motion to move the case from Abilene to Haskell.

Charges against Haas arose from an incident in which he allegedly struck Teresa Ann with his fist after a neighbor accused the little girl and her 2½ year old brother of drawing on her house with crayons.

Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter, of Abilene, is being assisted in the prosecution by 39th District Attorney Royce Adkins of Haskell.

A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes and Don Seamster, both of Abilene, and Dennis Ratliff, of Haskell, are Haas' court-appointed attorneys. Ratliff was appointed by Judge Ben Charlie Chapman.

The state is not seeking the death penalty.

Here is how the moisture came during February: Feb. 8, .01 (.1 snow); Feb. 19, .06; Feb. 21, .40; Feb. 22, .01; Feb. 25, .06. Total .54.

The lowest reading for the month was on February 8th when the temperature skidded to a cold 7 degrees above zero. Highest reading was 80 degrees on February 16.

"Politicians are like a cockroach. It's not what they eat and carry away that bothers you, it's what they fall into and mess up that gets to you," said Judge Truman Roberts, Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, as he spoke to members of West Texas Press Association at Abilene February 20. An entertaining speaker, the Honorable Truman Roberts could also get down to the basics of his talk, entitled "People, Law and Courts" quite effectively.

"The one cause of crime," he stated, "is not poverty, but the simple decision of the individual on whether or not to abide by the laws of the land—the laws our society has set up for itself to live by." He placed people, the law and the courts in a triangle operation, that works in a cycle to keep our people safe. "People wonder," he informed his audience, "just how much influence they can have on the people they've elected to run their courts. Logic tells us—these people

WANING WINTER WON'T WILLINGLY GIVE UP

Old Man Winter, to prove he's not dead, opened up a counter-attack Tuesday, and established a strong beachhead, producing a conglomeration of weather in the form of mist, sleet and snow.

The speaker stressed the fact that the present waiting room will only accommodate about eleven persons and was very inadequate. This would be remedied by enlargement in the new plans as well as having space allocated in another part of the hospital for the medical librarian who is now using a room which could be used for patients.

The present office has not been altered since 1929 and the new Medicare program causes many more files to be kept and more office employees on the payroll for office work. The office will also be enlarged if the voters favor the bond issue. Mr. Turnbow noted that the average patient load of the hospital was 15 per day annually and that a persistent check per day showed that about 12 on an average were elder patients, many of whom are on Medicare. 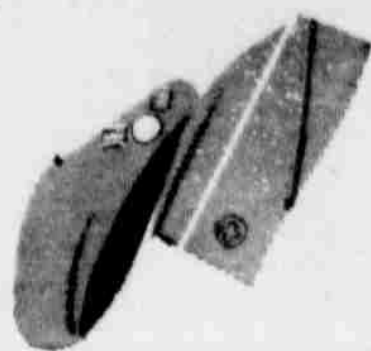

Luscious Coastal Bermuda Grass At Present Grows On Waterway

Where mesquite brush once blocked the water draining from 7000 acres of land and flooded the cropland on the farms of Billy Middlebrook and Ray Perry, living in south Haskell County, luscious Coastal Bermuda grass at present grows on the waterway which carries the water safely through their farms, stated Ernest L. Cowger, Soil Conservationist, of the

Soil Conservation Service. The mesquite brush was cleared from the intermittent drain and the waterway shaped and planted to Coastal Bermuda with technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and cost share assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program. This previously non-productive land, covered with mesquite brush is now considered the most productive and profitable land on the farm.

Waterways established to permanent grasses do not require annual seedbed preparation and planting. The grass plant is established and ready to produce when the growing season arrives and no moisture is lost by cultivation.

Many farmers cooperating with the Soil and Water Conservation Districts have waterways planted to permanent grasses, such as Coastal Bermuda grass, King Ranch bluestem, Caucasian bluestem, sideoats grama and other plants which are summer season plants. Others have planted western wheat grass which is a winter season, perennial grass that provides good ground cover.

These grasses may be grazed, cut for hay and some may be harvested for seed. Grasses should not be over used or grazed too short leaving a stubble of about six inches or more at all times. Sufficient leaves are needed on the plants to provide food for healthy, productive plants, Cowger said.

Grassed waterways fit well in a cropland grazing program of small grain and summer annuals filling in during spring and fall seasons. Proper fertilization is needed for maximum yields.

got elected — they want to be re-elected." He revealed the big problem was the man on the street — he cannot believe his voice will be heard. "And, it won't be," he said, "by sending form letters. They do not often say 'I am for' or 'I am against' and do not give the reasons for their thinking. They often ask 'you do this' but do not give the reasons that prove it will help the biggest percentage of the people in the affected area."

Only six publishers present had a copy of the proposed revised Penal Code in their possession. (The Free Press was one of the six newspapers who did) and Judge Roberts said there were very few copies at this time, that it had not yet been made available to all. He emphasized that it was the duty of each publisher to read the entire proposal with one thought in mind — how will it affect MY people and their rights in the criminal courts.

"Then," he urged, "write to your Congressmen and your Representatives. Tell them your views. Let them know how you feel. It WILL affect the decisions on this. THE COURTS MUST FOLLOW THE LAW AS IT IS WRITTEN."

He challenged all publishers present by saying, "Will Rogers once said, 'All a man knows is what he reads in the paper.' It is our newspapers' duty to inform their readers factually on matters of this kind. In his final plea to newspapers, he said, 'Please familiarize yourself with this proposal. Talk to your legislators. Talk to your people. Then, let your legislators know the feelings of your people. Your voice WILL be heard.'"

The proposed penal code changes are in a large, 498 page volume. Even though we have not yet read it in its entirety, at the present time the main objection found is that it takes out the set legal verbiage that has been used in our land since its beginning, and replaced it with

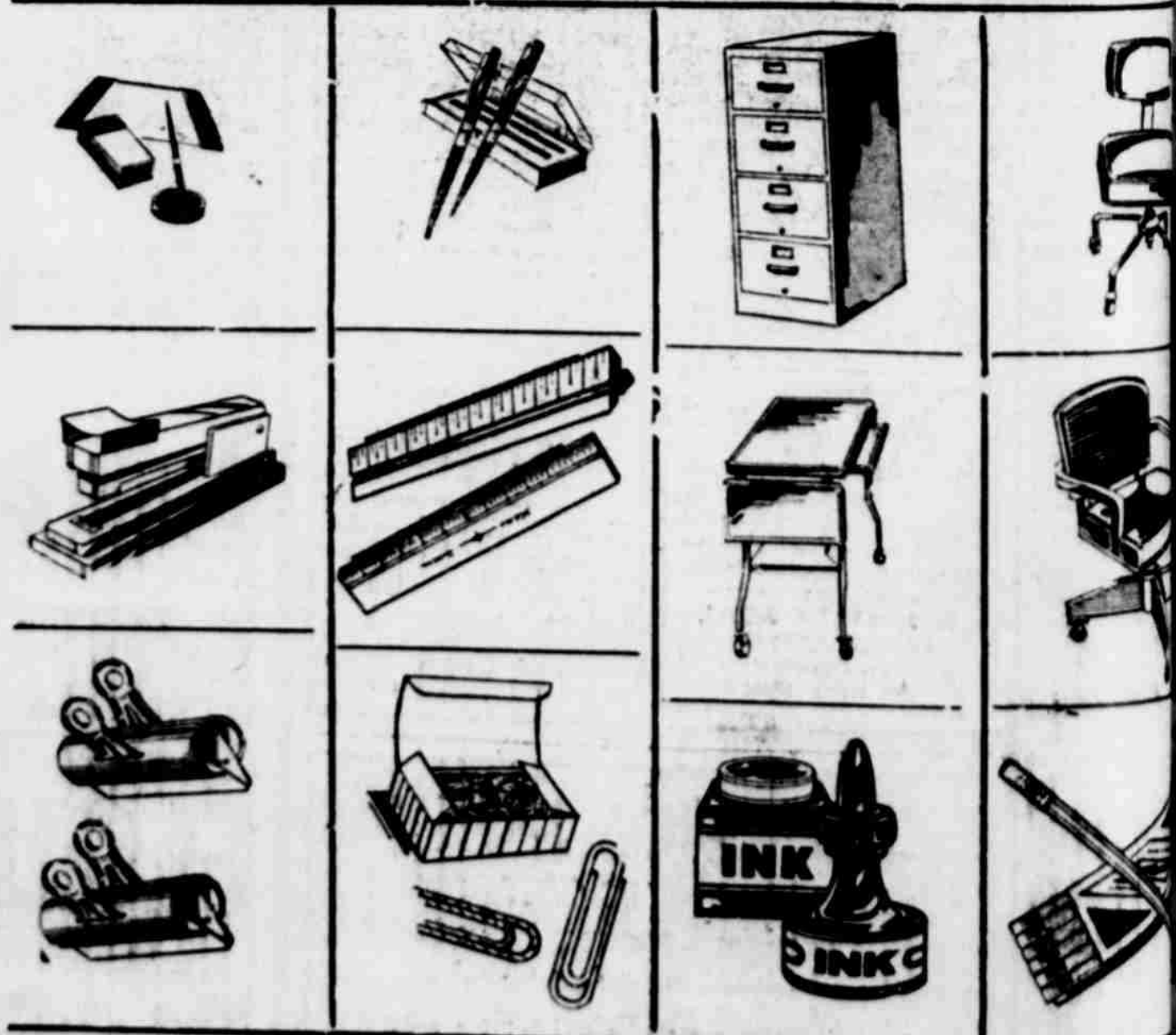

First Defensive Driving Course For 1971 Set Tuesday, March 19th

A Defensive Driving Course, the first for 1971, will be offered to those 55 years old and over, beginning with the first two-hour sessions Tuesday, March 9, from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m., in the Gold Room, First State Bank Building, South 4th

and Oak Streets, Abilene; the second will be held Thursday, March 11; the third Tuesday, March 16; and the fourth two-hour sessions will be on Thursday, March 18. The theme of the course will be: Reduce accidents by learning how to control your driving.

The course will consist of classroom training in modern driving techniques, including visual aids and films. Each session will be for approximately 50 minutes, with a "coffee break" between. Bob Hutchins, Texas Department of Public Safety, will address the group at 10 a. m., Thursday, March 11, on the subject "New Driving Laws for Texas Motorists."

Presented as a public service, the course is sponsored by the Abilene, Texas Chapter, American Association of Retired Persons, and by the local chapter of National Retired Teachers Association, both non-profit, non-partisan organizations, in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Abilene Corporation Court Driving Improvement School, and the National Safety Council.

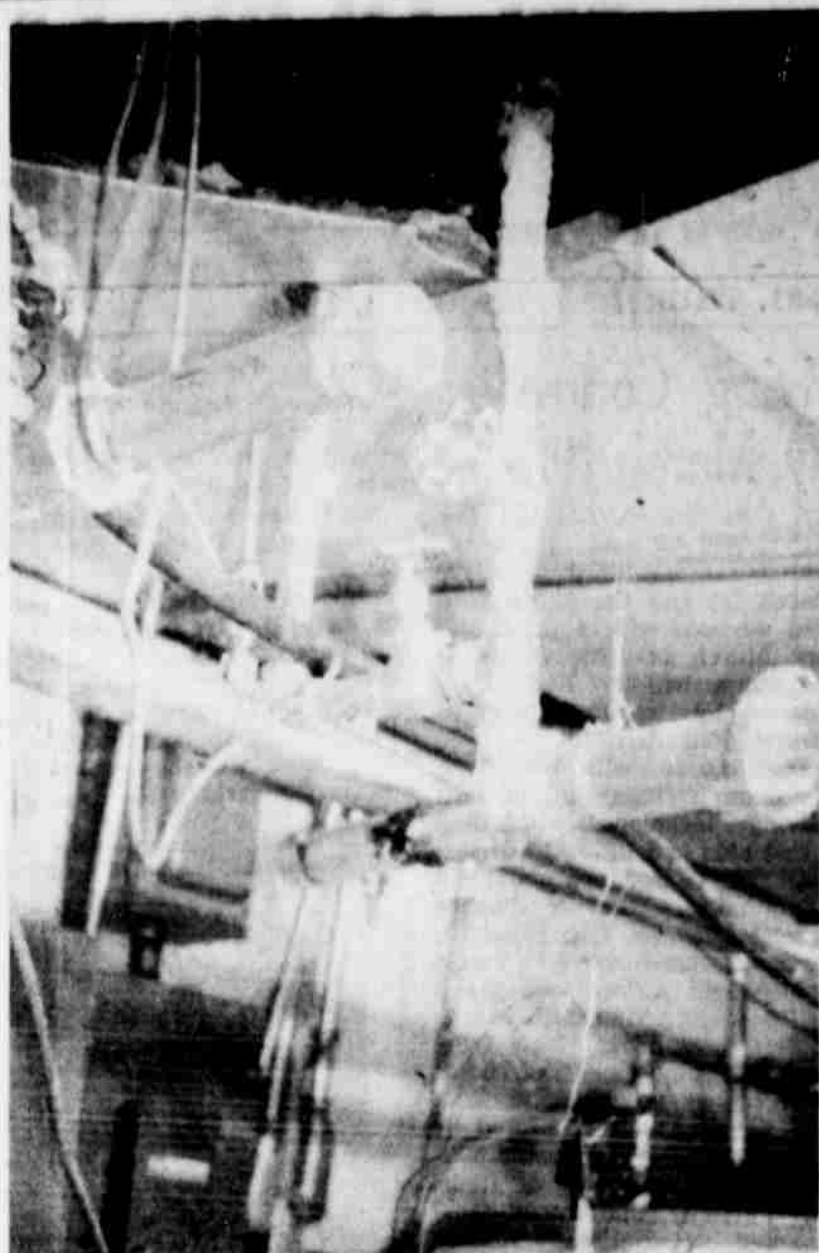

3. In election precinct No. 3 in the Lobby of the Home State Bank in Rochester, Texas with Felix Mullino as Presiding Judge and Tolbert Beason as Alternate Judge.
4. In election Precinct No. 4 in the office of the O'Brien Gin in O'Brien, Texas with Ford Waldrip as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Lee Cox as Alternate Judge.
5. In election Precinct No. 5 in the School Auditorium of the High School Building, in Weinert, Texas with J. C. Dunnam as Presiding Judge and C. C. Campbell as Alternate Judge.
6. In election precinct No. 6 in the Agricultural Building in Paint Creek, Texas with Albert Thane, as Presiding Judge and Roy Medford, as Alternate Judge.
7. Clay Smith, Jerry McCall and Joe Harper are hereby appointed as a canvassing Board for the purpose of canvassing the absentee ballots.

On election day the polls shall be open from 8:00 O'Clock A. M. to 7:00 O'Clock P. M. Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified clerks to serve and assist

in holding said election; provided that if the respective Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge of his polling place shall be one of the Clerks.

Mrs. Lee McKelvin is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee ballots and absentee voting for said election shall be held in the County Clerk's Office in Haskell, Haskell County, Texas. "(9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

"(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission, empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

"(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary.

"(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State.

"(a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless dis-

posed before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.

In addition to the per diem, members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

"(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission, empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

"(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary.

"(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State.

"(a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless dis-

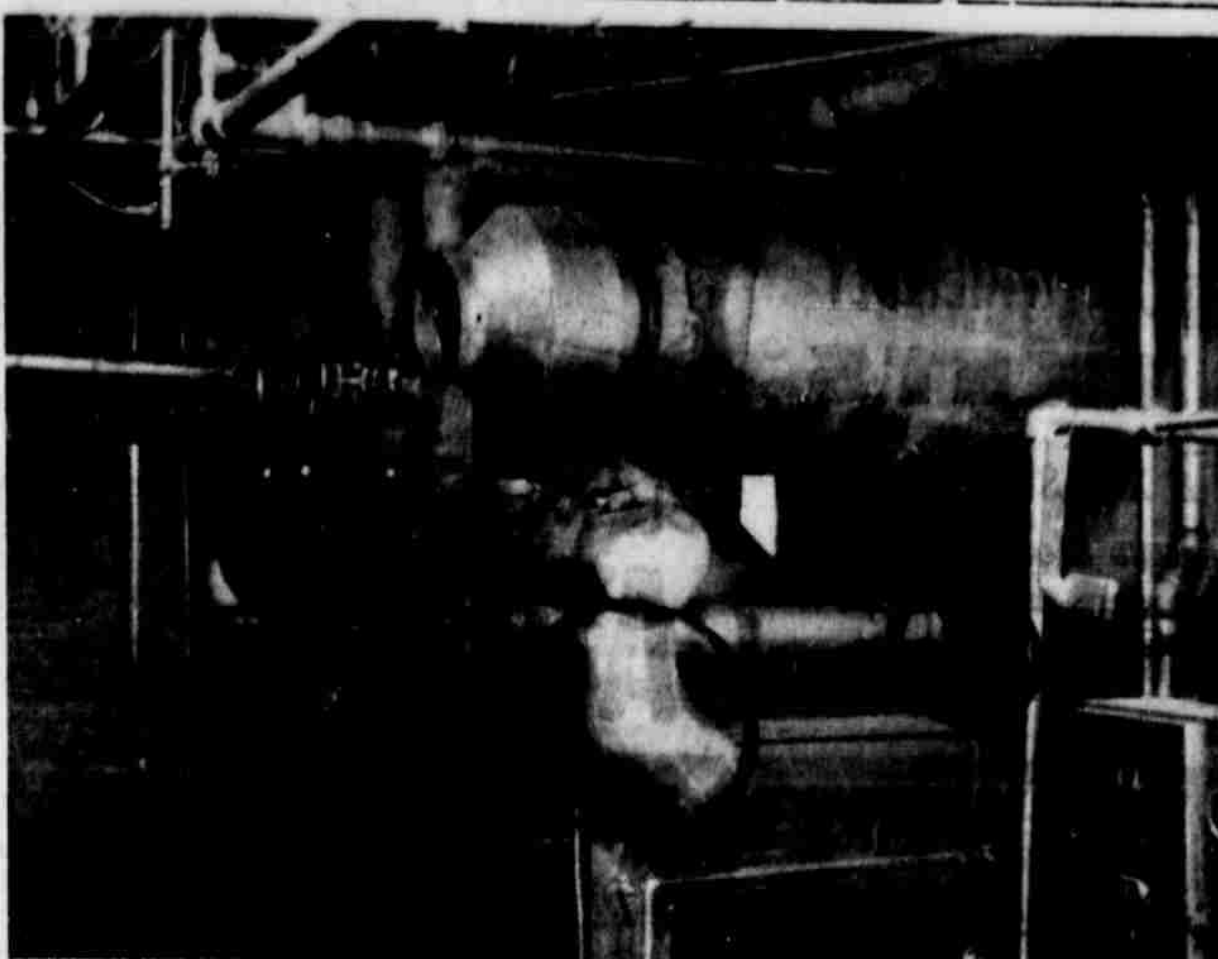
